## 14 Candidates File for Election As Members of New School Board

7 TO BE ELECTED ON DAY OF ANNUAL MEETING JULY 25

Tuesday, July 5, at 5 p. m. was the deadline for electors of the new Kewaskum Community School, Jt. District No. 2, recently reorganized into a K-12 district, who wish to be candidates for the board of education to file a statement of candidacy with William Martin at the municipal building.

Fourteen candidates for the board, including six who were members of the former high school and elementary school boards, filed declarations for the new seven-member board. Listed alphabetically, they are as follows:

When the new board of education of seven members is elected, the three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will have three year terms, the two next highest candidates will have two year terms and the next two will have one year terms. In case of ties, the winners will be chosen by lot.

Although area representation is not a part of the reorganization order, electors have been requested by the five school boards now comprising the new district to consider areas in casting their ballots. The new board faces many important decisions and membership is a very time consuming position.

The election of board members will be held at the Kewaskum Community High school gymnasium from 1 to 8 p. m. on Monday, July 25, the date of the annual school district meeting. The first meeting of the new district and board will be held at 8 p. m. at the high school on the same day, July 25. Candidates for the board were required to file at least 20 days before the date of the above annual meeting.

## Seven Injured in Weekend Crashes

Two Milwaukee young women were injured at 5:23 p. m. on the Fourth Monday when a Volkswagen driven by Patricia D. Grover, 19, 3162 S. Clement, got off onto the shoulder of the southbound lane of traffic on Hwy. 45 about a mile south of Kewaskum, swerved back onto the highway and went end over end and came to rest right side up on the east side of the highway.

Miss Grover suffered neck and back injuries and her companion, Kathleen Ann Nitz, 19, 3167 S. Burst ave., Milwaukee, incurred shoulder abrasions and cuts on the arms. Both of the injured girls were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance. The car was wrecked.

Injured were Steve Anderson, 13, and Susan Krause, 21, both of R. 3, West Bend. Ann E. Schneider and Mildred Backhaus, 53, West Bend, all of whom suffered bruises.

He began active duty at the U.S.P.H.S. hospital, Baltimore, Md., on July 1. Dr. Wesenberg will be the fourth staff radiologist at the Baltimore hospital, which is affiliated with the Johns Hopkins Medical Center.

Dr. Wesenberg received his M. D. degree in 1962 from the University of Wisconsin. He then served an internship at Hartford hospital, Hartford, Conn. Following 2½ years of specialty training in radiology at the University of Wisconsin Medical Center, he sub-specialized in pediatric radiology at the Children's Hospital of Los Angeles, Los Angeles, Calif. 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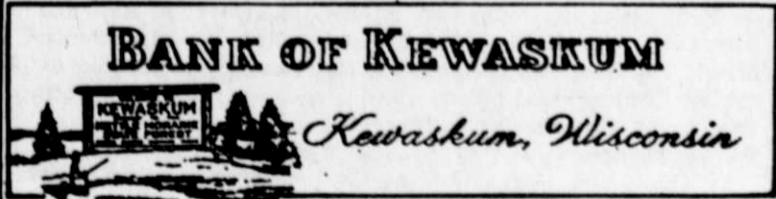

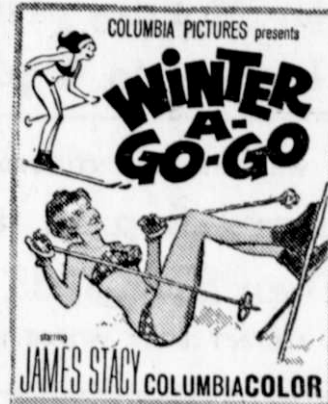

## Pick Miss Erdmann To Attend Seminar

Three Lakeland college, Sheboygan, students were among the 30 selected to attend a vocational rehabilitation counseling seminar at the University of Wisconsin this summer.

They are Almira Tiedke, Brookfield, and Carole Erdmann, Kewas-

kum, both juniors, and Dianna Stoebner, Tripp, S. D., a senior. The trio received tuition and grants totaling over \$750 apiece.

The seminar is being held June 20 - Aug. 13 and concerns itself with academic and clinical experience, including principles and practice of rehabilitation counseling and on-the-job experience working with handicapped people. Credit for the seminar work can

be applied to the students' undergraduate or graduate records.

All three Lakeland co-eds are majoring in sociology. They had to have 2.75 grade point averages or higher to qualify for vocational rehabilitation counseling seminar.

Miss Erdmann, daughter of Mrs. Ralph Erdmann, R. 2, Kewaskum, is active in Campus Players, was co-chairman of Winter Carnival this past year and also served on

## Name Local Teacher To Attend Institute

Forty high school history teachers from Wisconsin and ten other states have been selected to participate in a National Defense Education Act institute in history at Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh June 13-Aug. 5, according to Dr. Lee N. Newcomer, director of the institute.

Among those chosen is Dean H. Roe, Kewaskum Community High school, and instructors from other Wisconsin communities of Wittenberg, Shawano, Ripon, Delevan, Wauwatosa, Chippewa Falls, Kenosha, Hartford, Marshfield, Waukesha, Cedarburg, Sheboygan, Che-tek, Rhinelander, Kimberly, Oregon, Waupun, Brown Deer, Mt. Calvary, De Pere, and Wisconsin

Rapids.

The institute, in contemporary American history, is sponsored by Wisconsin State University-Oshkosh in cooperation with the U. S. Office of Education. Purpose of the institute is to update teaching proficiency in handling American history since 1945. Each person selected receives a weekly stipend plus an allowance for dependents.

Special lectures and discussions led by outstanding resident and visiting professors are a feature of the institute. Dr. Newcomer said. Eight hours of graduate credit may be earned during the institute.

WSU-O professors assigned to the institute include Dr. Virginia L. Glenn, Dr. Justin E. Walsh, Dr. Newcomer, and Dr. Henry Wagner.

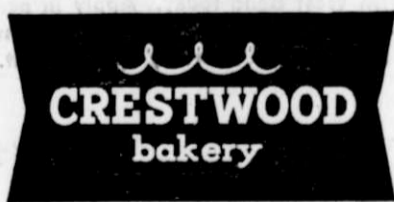

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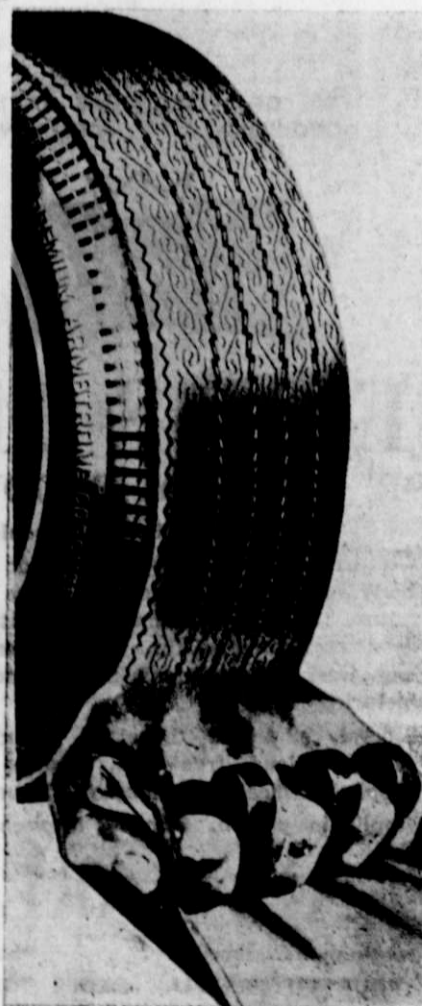
