Seven Members Elected to New District School Board; Marshall Boyd Selected As Superintendent

Richard Edwards Named Director Of New Board

BUDGET OVER \$1 MILLION IS APPROVED; 174 ATTEND

The first annual meeting of newly created Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint District No. 2, was held Monday night, July 25, in the high school gymnasium. Under the newly formed K-12 system which consolidated five area schools, seven persons were elected to the board of education. The election was held from 1 to 8 p. m. and was followed by the budget hearing at 8 p. m., the annual meeting at 9:30 p. m. and later by the organizational meeting of the new board.

A total of 521 electors of the district turned out to cast ballots for members of the new school board. This number amounts to just over one-fourth of the total electors in the district.

In the election of seven members to the new board out of a field of 14 candidates, the three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will have three year terms, the two next highest will have two year terms and the next two will have one year terms. Elected to three year terms were Allen Tessar 331, James D. Reigle 328 and Jack Jadro 309. Elected for two year terms were Anne Panzer 303 and Richard Edwards 252. One year term members are Mrs. Zona Miske 247 and Harry Oehlhafen 226.

Defeated in the race for school board posts were Fred Spoerl 224 (former member), Daniel Rodenkirch 214, Raymond Schaefer 214 (former member), Gerald Secor 200, Leo Bingen 187 (former member), Burns R. Nelthorpe 174, and Gilbert Korth 143.

At the budget hearing in the evening, attended by 168 electors, the electorate approved the budget of \$1,054,090.08 as presented with \$790,830.68 to be levied for taxes at a rate of \$19.82 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation. The tax represents an increase for all areas except Beechwood, ranging in amount from a few cents to approximately \$3. It was indicated, however, that without switching to the K-12 reorganization plan, the tax rate would have increased approximately \$1 more for all areas above the increase now required. Thus the K-12 reorganization is being credited with saving the district taxpayers money.

A proposal on whether children not participating in the hot lunch program should be given free milk was rejected. The vote was 44 yes and 73 no.

At the organizational meeting of the newly elected board, following the regular annual meeting attended by 174 electors, members selected Marshall Boyd as superintendent of schools for the new district. Boyd has served as principal of Kewaskum Community High school for the past two years. He holds a bachelor's degree from Luther college, Iowa, and a master's degree in school

administration from the University of Wisconsin. He is married and has four children.

Also during the organization meeting, the new board elected Richard L. Edwards as director of the school district for one year, Mrs. Zona Miske was elected treasurer for one year and Jack Jadro was named clerk for a three year term.

Minutes of the budget hearing, annual meeting and organizational meeting follow.

BUDGET HEARING

Kewaskum Community Schools
Jt. District No. 2
July 25, 1966

The budget hearing of the Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint School District No. 2, of the Village of Kewaskum, Towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington, and Wayne, County of Washington, State of Wisconsin, Towns of Ashford, Auburn, County of Fond du Lac, State of Wisconsin, Towns of Mitchell and Scott, County of Sheboygan, State of Wisconsin, held in the Kewaskum High School gymnasium on Monday, July 25, 1966, at 8:00 o'clock P. M. was called to order by Richard L. Edwards, Director of the Board of Education, with 168 electors present.

Roger McKenna nominated Richard L. Edwards as Chairman, Marriner Frank seconded. John Battaglia moved and August Bilgo seconded to cast a unanimous ballot for Richard L. Edwards as Chairman. Motion carried.

Roger McKenna moved and Roger Schleif seconded to nominate Fred J. Spoerl as Clerk. There being no further nominations, the motion was carried by a voice vote.

Richard L. Edwards opened the Budget Hearing. The proposed budget for the 1966-1967 school year was read and explained to the electors. Discussion was held on the various categories of the budget.

Elroy Egerer moved to add \$2,800.00 to the Food Services portion of the budget in order that free milk be provided for students of the district. Melvin Moths seconded. Motion defeated in a hand vote—44 YES and 73 NO.

Mr. Boyd explained an error in the proposed budget on the anticipated Federal Revenues and that the proposed levy would therefore be increased by \$20,548.60.

Burns Nelthorpe moved and Art Terlinden seconded that the proposed budget in the amount of \$797,830.68 covering operating expenses and debt service be presented at the annual meeting. Motion carried.

Mrs. Marie Dei moved that the budget hearing adjourn. Marvin Martin seconded. Motion carried.

ANNUAL MEETING

July 25, 1966
The annual meeting was called to order at 9:30 P. M. by Richard L. Edwards with 174 electors present.

Mrs. Marie Dei nominated Richard L. Edwards as Chairman.

Carl Meilahn, Sr. Dies at Age of 95

Carl Meilahn, Sr., 95, one of Kewaskum's oldest residents, and a resident of this area all of his life, passed away early Sunday, July 24, at the Beechwood Rest Home, where he stayed for the past three years. He was a retired farmer of the town of Kewaskum.

Mr. Meilahn was born Jan. 30, 1871, in the town of Kewaskum, a son of the late Carl and Caroline Meilahn. His marriage to the former Amanda Kuecker took place in Milwaukee on May 6, 1905. She predeceased him on Sept. 21, 1956.

Mr. Meilahn was the father of six children, two of whom, Henry and Erna, preceded him in death. Surviving are three daughters and one son, Alpha (Mrs. Bernard Novotny) of Sheboygan Falls, Carl Meilahn, Jr. of R. 1, Kewaskum, Agnes (Mrs. Ray Schaefer) of R. 2, Kewaskum, and Amanda (Mrs. Lester Firme) of rural Adell. He also leaves 12 grandchildren, three great-grandchildren, one daughter-in-law, three sons-in-law, nieces and nephews.

Mr. Meilahn was a member of St. Lucas Lutheran church in Kewaskum for many years.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday, July 27, at St. Lucas Lutheran church. The Rev. Wayne Bartelt officiating. Burial took place in the parish cemetery. Friends called at Miller's Funeral home from 4 p. m. Tuesday until 11 a. m. Wednesday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services.

County Democrats Hear La Follette

Attorney General Bronson C. La Follette Thursday night said that the state anti-secrecy in government law is weak because it did not provide sanctions for violations and called for legislation to strengthen the law.

La Follette spoke at an evening meeting of the Washington County Democratic Party at West Bend Thursday.

"In recent months we have seen several government agencies conduct meetings in violation of the spirit if not the letter of the anti-secrecy law—meetings in hotel rooms at night and on the roofs of boat houses.

"If a meeting is held at a remote place or at unusual hours without advance notice then even though the doors may be open, the meeting frustrates the purpose and intent of the anti-secrecy law which is that public business must be conducted in an open and public manner.

"Clearly, legislation is needed to require that meetings be announced at least 24 hours in advance so that the public and the press may attend if they wish and that failure to provide such notice makes void any action taken.

"Legislation is needed to clearly define what constitutes a meeting. Some agencies say they are not having a meeting, merely an informal discussion. Such informal discussions are merely a dodge and should be brought within the ambit of the open meetings law.

"At present there is no penalty

Taxes which are not paid before the deadline are subject to interest at the rate of eight-tenths of one percent per month or fraction thereof retroactive to Jan. 1, 1966, until paid or until the property upon which such taxes are levied is sold at the next sale as provided by law.

Checks are to be made payable to Robert J. Klein, county treasurer. Payment by check through the mail, including description of property or first payment receipt will eliminate waiting at the treasurer's office, Klein stated.

impossible if the meeting violates the law. The statute should clearly provide that any action taken at an illegal meeting is void and should provide for official actions.

"Legislation should provide that where closed meetings are authorized a transcript must be taken so that when the reason for secrecy no longer exists then the public may have a permanent record to examine.

"Legislation should clearly place the burden of proving the valid-

ity of a closed meeting on the government agency as does the recently enacted federal law.

"Democracy works best when the public is fully informed. We as a state and nation pride ourselves on our open society. Legislation to strengthen our anti-secrecy law is in accord with these fundamental principles."

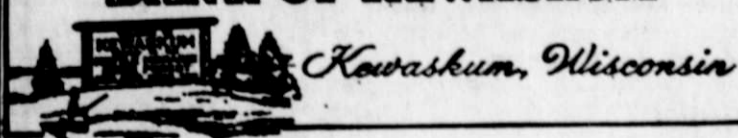

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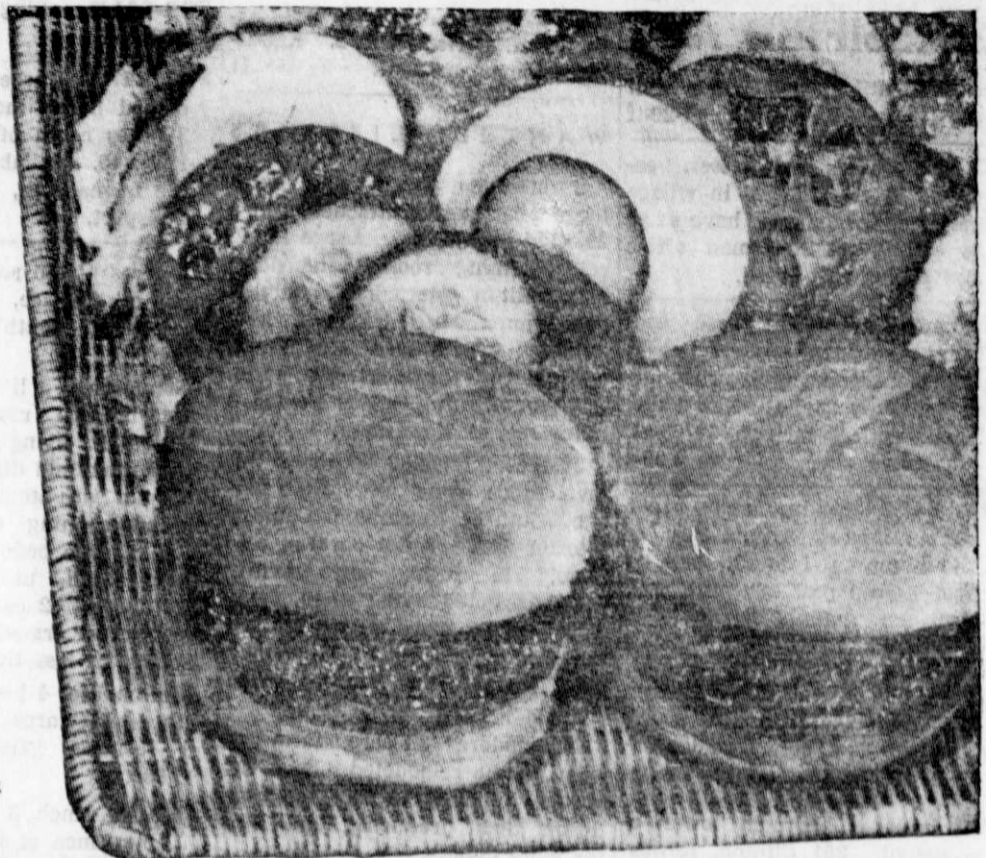
