## Seven Members Elected to New District School Board; Marshall Boyd Selected As Superintendent

#### Richard Edwards Named Director Of New Board

BUDGET OVER \$1 MILLION IS APPROVED; 174 ATTEND

The first annual meeting of newly created Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint District No. 2, was held Monday night. July 25, in the high school gymnasium. Under the newly formed K-12 system which consolidated five area schools, seven persons were elected to the board of education. The election was held from 1 to 8 p. m. and was followed by the budget hearing at 8 p. m., the annual meeting at 9:30 p. m. and later by the organizational meeting of the new board.

A total of 521 electors of the district turned out to cast ballots for members of the new school board. This number amounts to just over one-fourth of the total electors in the district.

In the election of seven members to the new board out of a field of 14 candidates, the three candidates receiving the highest number of votes will have three year terms, the two next highest will have two year terms and the next two will have one year terms. 


