School Board Offers Mitchell, Zarling Positions As Principals

A special meeting of the Board of Education, Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. District No. 2 was held at 8:00 p. m. at the Kewaskum Community High School. All members were in attendance.

An inspection of the building addition of the Kewaskum Community High School was made.

Richard L. Edwards, Director, opened the meeting in the Home Economics Department at 8:30 p. m.

Minutes of the meetings of July 11, July 13 and July 25, 1966, were read. Anne Panzer moved that the minutes be accepted as read. Zona Miske seconded. Motion carried.

Kindergarten registrations for the district were reported at a total of 136—Beechwood 17, Farmington 27, Kewaskum Elementary 72, and Wayne 20.

James D. Reigle moved that the Board verify the approval of the interim Board action wherein authorization was given Mr. Boyd to have concrete walls, instead of block because of the masons' strike, in the amount of \$2,252.79. Harry Oelhafen seconded. Motion carried.

Discussion was held on the bids for a scrubbing machine. James D. Reigle moved that a 30" West machine at the price of \$2,120.00 for wet and dry process be purchased. Allen A. Teessar seconded. Motion carried.

Bids for the language laboratory were tabled for a future decision.

Discussion of line and staff responsibilities, as well as salaries for the Superintendent of Schools, High School Principal and Kewaskum Elementary Principal-Director of Elementary Education was held.

The Board authorized Mr. Boyd to offer the position of High School Principal to Mr. C. Ernest Mitchell and the position of Kewaskum Elementary Principal-Director of Elementary Education to Mr. Richard Zarling.

James D. Reigle moved to expand the Blue-Shield and Blue Cross insurance coverage to employees of the entire district. Zona Miske seconded. Motion carried.

The Board authorized Mr. Boyd to contact Eugene Bohn for information on a package insurance policy covering all schools of the district upon a motion by Allen A. Teessar and second by James D. Reigle.

Rental of church facilities was discussed and Mr. Boyd mentioned that it might be best to hold grade school classes in those buildings, rather than high school classes, because of the movement of high school students from class to class each period of the school day.

It was decided to hold a meeting at the Beechwood Elementary School on Monday, August 1, 1966, at 8:00 p. m.

Jack Jadro moved that the following salaries, operating expenses and building fund invoices

Fire Destroys Abandoned Home

Members of the Kewaskum fire department answered a call at approximately 8:40 p. m. last Friday when fire broke out and completely destroyed the home on the former Louis Backhaus farm property about a mile east of this village.

When firemen arrived the old home was enveloped in flames, which had gained too much headway to control. Firemen devoted their efforts to keeping the fire from spreading to adjacent farm buildings. The home, which has been abandoned for some time, burned to the ground. The property now is state owned and is in the state forest preserve area.

Firemen remained at the scene for more than an hour. Cause of the blaze was not immediately determined.

Four Teenagers Hurt in Mishap

Four area teenagers were injured in an accident shortly before midnight Friday when a car driven by Kenneth O. Kirchner, 19, of R. 1, Allenton, rolled over on Hwy. 175 about 700 feet north of the intersection of STH 83 when the northbound vehicle apparently got onto the shoulder of the highway and struck a guard rail post and rolled over several times and landed on its top. Five of six passengers in the car were reported thrown from the vehicle according to the sheriff's office report.

Injured were Frederick A. Krieser, 16, Kewaskum, who incurred a fractured left elbow, scalp laceration, bruises and abrasions; Alan R. Bohn, 16, Kewaskum, multiple bruises and abrasions, possible fractured ankle and back pains; Karl R. Brath, 17, R. 1, Allenton, possible fractured ankle, bruises and abrasions; Dave Ramthun, 17, Kewaskum, severe chest and scalp lacerations, multiple bruises and abrasions and possible internal injuries.

Richard Pesch, 22 of R. 2, Kewaskum, suffered bruises to his left leg when a car driven by Merlyn E. Krueger, 36, of Oakfield, reportedly veered over the center line and collided with a car driven by Robert P. Kreif, 21, of R. 1, Kewaskum, at 10:49 p. m. Friday. The mishap occurred on STH 33 about 1½ miles west of West Bend.

Retired Merchant, Village Official, John Marx Dies

John Marx, 85, prominent retired business man and village official, a lifelong resident of Kewaskum, passed away Thursday evening, July 28, at St. Camillus hospital in Milwaukee following an illness of six months.

Mr. Marx, who was in the food retailing business for many years, formerly owned and operated the Marx IGA store (now Sentry Foods). For many years he served as treasurer for the village of Kewaskum and as secretary of Holy Trinity parish. Mr. Marx also pioneered telephone service in the Kewaskum area. He was a 50-year member of the Catholic Knights of Wisconsin, a member of the Knights of Columbus and Holy Name society of Holy Trinity parish many years, and a charter member of the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum.

Mr. Marx was born in Kewaskum on April 21, 1881, a son of the late Nicholas and Mary Rempel Marx. His marriage to the former Augusta Schmidt took place in Holy Trinity church, Kewaskum, on June 12, 1906. She preceded him in death on June 29, 1957.

Surviving are three sons and a daughter, Sylvester of Waukesha, Kathryn (Mrs. Carl Malischke) of Wauwatosa, and Harold and Ralph of Kewaskum; 12 grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, three daughters-in-law, one son-in-law, three sisters, Miss Helen Marx of Milwaukee, Mrs. Nicholas (Dela) Stoffel of Kewaskum and Mrs. Imelda Kastenholz of Milwaukee, and two brothers, Nicholas Marx of Milwaukee and Joseph Marx of Pine Ridge, So. Dak.

Funeral services were conducted at 9 a. m. Monday, Aug. 1, from Miller's funeral home and at 9:30 a. m. at Holy Trinity church, the Rev. John T. Budde officiating. The Rev. Roman Stoffel of St. Cloud was also present in the sanctuary. Burial took place in the parish cemetery. Members of the Catholic Knights of Wisconsin honor guard of the St. Kilian branch took part in the funeral and recited special prayers at the cemetery. Prior to the services the body was in state at the funeral home from 2 p. m. Sunday.

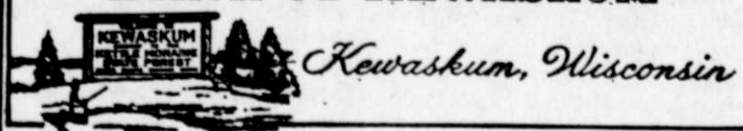

FHA Moves Into New West Bend Offices

On Aug. 1 the Farmers Home Administration moved into their new offices at 262 South Main st., West Bend. It was announced by their supervisor, Ralph LaDuke. This FHA office serves Washington, Ozaukee, and Milwaukee counties.

The Farmers Home Administration programs strengthen family farms and rural communities. Loans are made only to applicants unable to obtain adequate credit from other sources at reasonable rates and terms.

FHA has a varied loan program. Among these are chattel loans for farm operating, farm ownership loans to buy or enlarge farms, and soil and water loans to develop, conserve and make better use of their soil and water resources. The economic opportunity loan is made to lower income families. It's a maximum of \$2,500 and bears 4 1/8 per cent interest and repayable over periods up to 15 years. Rural housing loans are made to farmers and rural residents of communities with populations of not over 5,500. Loans are made to construct new homes or buy previously occupied homes. Loans may be made at reduced rates of interest to people over 62 who live in rural areas or in a town of 5,500 or less.

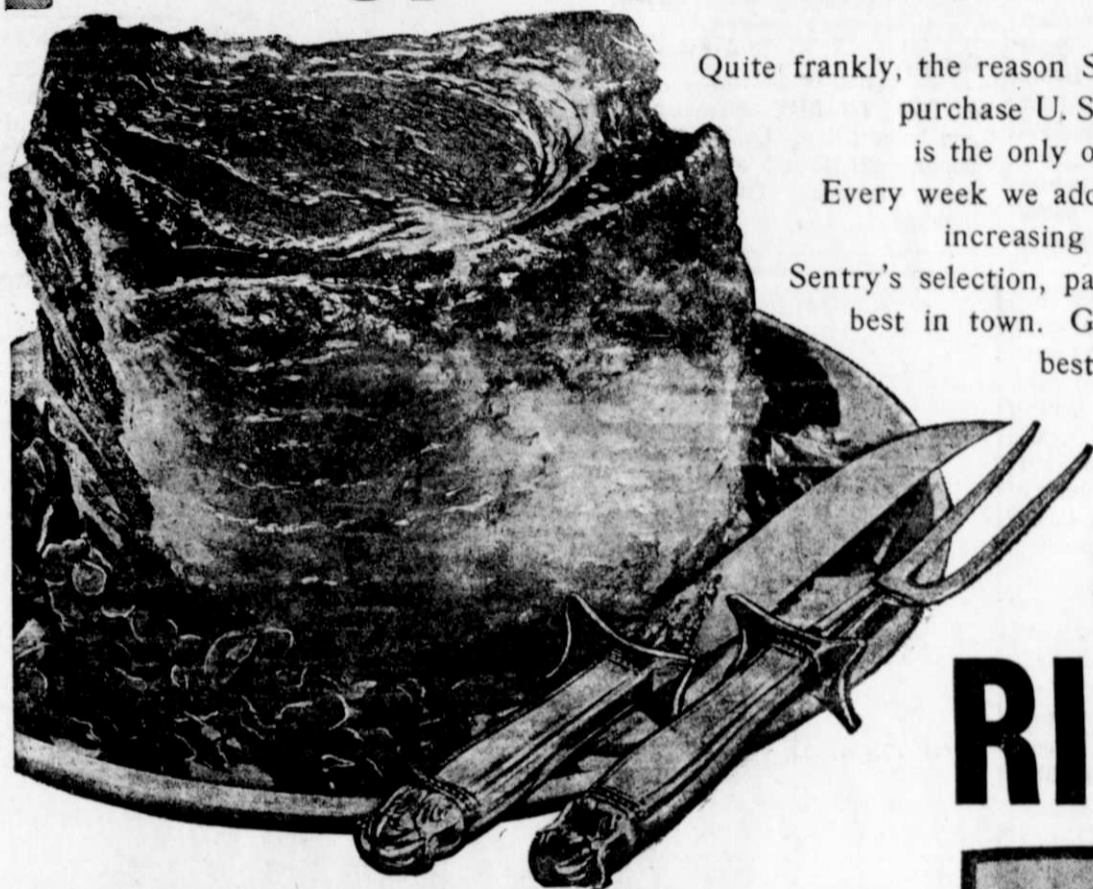

Local Police at Meeting for All County Officers

On Wednesday, July 27, the Washington County District Attorney's office sponsored a meeting for all police officers in the county to review and discuss the recent Supreme Court decisions concerning confessions. Two sessions were held at the Washing-

ton county court house, one in the morning and one in the evening, so that all officers could attend. Seventy men were in attendance from the Washington County Sheriff's Department, the Wisconsin State Patrol, and the Hartford, West Bend, Kewaskum, Germantown and Slinger police departments.

District Attorney Richard T. Becker and Assistant District Attorney Robert J. Kauffman presented information on the Miranda decision and other court decisions. Kauffman discussed these decisions in light of his five years experience in the Judge Advocate General's Department of the U. S. Air Force. He indicated that military police worked under somewhat similar rules. District Attorney Becker discussed the legal technicalities of the decisions.

The district attorney stated that he was very pleased with the fine attendance at these meetings. He stated, "Local law enforcement has become a highly complex business and all departments in Washington county showed an awareness of this fact by sending their men to the training sessions."
