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## Labor Day Parade, Celebration in Kewaskum Slated by County Unions Parade to Feature At Least 5 Bands, Industry Units, etc.

### ROCK AND ROLL BAND MAY PLAY; CONG. RACE TO TALK

Plans were reported nearing completion for the annual Labor Day parade and celebration at the regular monthly meeting of the Washington County Central Labor Council held Monday, Aug. 8. This year's outing will be held in Kewaskum.

Because of an earlier agreement with the Ozaukee County Trades and Labor Council, who will have their parade on Sunday, Sept. 4, the Washington county parade will be held on Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 5, in Kewaskum. The parade is scheduled to begin at 1 p. m. and follow the usual parade route. All units are to begin assembling at 12:30 p. m.

In addition to industries in the county which have local unions affiliated with the council, numerous other units have already expressed a desire to enter this year's parade. The committee announces that it will accept entries until Sunday, Aug. 21. Anyone interested should contact one of the following: Walter Gau, West Bend; Leo Duehning, Hartford; Fred Bublitz, Slinger; Joseph Gruber, Kewaskum, or Sylvester Stern, West Bend.

Parade music for marching will be provided by the West Bend High school band, Hartford Junior High band, Lomira High school band, Kewaskum High school and Kewaskum Senior Accordion bands, with still others to be heard from. There is also a possibility of a rock and roll band performing at the Kewaskum park after the parade and speeches.

Master of ceremonies will be Clifford Matchey of Milwaukee, director of Region No. 9, AIWA. Guest speakers will include Congressman John A. Race and Assemblyman Fred Schroeder. Wayland Tessar, village president of Kewaskum, will welcome the revellers to the park.

The same system for identification and free liquid refreshments will be used this year. Any person over the age of 18 years, or under 18 and not in the company of their parents, must have a ticket. Anyone under 18 accompanied by their parents does not need a ticket. Tickets will be available at the park for \$1.00 for those who have not obtained them.

The Kewaskum fire department and American Legion post will fry and sell hamburgers and there will be candy, ice cream and popcorn for sale at the park following the program.

The council suggests that for a safe and sane Labor Day holiday, the best place to stay may be in your own county watching the parade, visiting with friends old and new at the Kewaskum village park, and getting home early Monday evening. Why not plan on attending?

## Rites Held for Forrest Brown, County Deputy

Forrest L. Brown, 54, of R. 2, Kewaskum, familiarly known by the name of "Brownie," a deputy in the Washington county sheriff's department, passed away unexpectedly at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, at about noon last Thursday, Aug. 4, following an illness of two weeks.

He had been a county patrolman the past 18 years, and prior to that time was employed by the Wisconsin Conservation Department for 10 years. "Brownie" also was the treasurer of the town of Kewaskum and was a member of the Wisconsin Sheriff's and Deputy's association.

He was born on Oct. 19, 1911, at LaFarge, Wis., a son of the late George and Harriet Brown, and had been a resident of the Kewaskum area for the past 22 years, having lived at Milton, Wis. before coming here.

Surviving are two children, Robert W. Brown of Milton Junction, Wis. and Karen Anne Brown of R. 2, Kewaskum; two grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Rex Addie of Milton, Wis., Mrs. Paul Frize of Janesville and Mrs. Joe Taylor of Rockford, Ill., and seven brothers, Vilas and Berlie Brown of Milton, Carlos of Madison, Merritt, Nestor and Orlin of Janesville, and Donald with the United States Air Force. His wife, the former Anne Olbrys, preceded him in death on Sept. 18, 1957.

Funeral services were held at Miller's Funeral home at 2 p. m. Saturday, the Rev. Frederick Seefeldt of Neenah officiating. Interment was in Union cemetery, Campbellsport. The body was in state at the funeral home after 4 p. m. Friday.

## Small Twister Causes Damage In Area Monday

### DEVELOPS INTO TORNADO IN SHEBOYGAN COUNTY

Wind, torrential rain and hail which struck this area shortly before the noon hour on Monday caused damage in an area about two miles north of Kewaskum and developed into a tornado in the Sheboygan county area.

No noticeable damage was caused in this village but some streets were flooded after the downpour. Main st. was flooded at three places, in front of the Sentry Foods parking lot, Herriges Shell Service station and Kohn Bros. Farm Service when sewers became clogged or could not take the water fast enough. A storm sewer in front of the Frank Herriges home on Riverview dr. also clogged. Village workmen and private citizens opened the sewers allowing the water to run away.

The storm was much more severe north of the village where cars had to stop along the highways due to the heavy rain and hail. At the Ray Hessel farm home on Hwy. 45 about two miles north of Kewaskum several trees were felled or split and a TV antenna was torn off the house roof. The Hessel family was not at home but a neighbor, Rich. Thiemer, reported that he saved the cat. The squall approached from the southwest and seemed to circle around this village to the north, traveling on a path from southwest to northeast.

Mrs. Marvin Kleinke of this village reported that her son Earl, 18, was riding his bicycle on his way home from New Fane when he ran into the storm at Baumann's corner on Hwy. S about two miles north of town. Earl said the small twister actually picked him up off his bike and threw him into a ditch. And he is a big lad, weighing 220 pounds or better. The hailstones battered him so badly that he fled under a tree for protection. Earl said he was really scared of the storm.

When the storm reached the Sheboygan county area about 12:35 p. m. it struck in the form of a tornado in a five mile area in the northeastern part of the county. The tornado swept east of Elkhart Lake and struck northeastwardly across the county and out over Lake Michigan. Mobile trailers and equipment of the Immel Construction Co. of Fond du Lac engaged in a construction project at Lakeland college, in the path of the storm was badly damaged and trees, power lines and poles were felled. None of the Lakeland college buildings were reported damaged. The construction superintendent was reported injured but not seriously and another workman was believed injured at the site.

## Local Young Lady On Okinawa; To Teach in Japan

### FORMER NANCY HELD JOINS HUSBAND THERE

A two-month stay on Okinawa will end in mid-August for Mrs. John Harwood of Kewaskum, but more adventure is ahead when she leaves the island for Kobe, Japan, where she will teach during the coming school year.

Mrs. Harwood is the former Nancy R. Held, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Held, 361 First st., Kewaskum. She is a 1961 graduate of Kewaskum Community High school. She holds a bachelor of arts degree in English from Lawrence university, Appleton, graduating with honors in June, 1965.

Following her marriage on June 19, 1965 to Marine Lt. John C. Harwood of Webster Groves, Mo., the couple lived for six months in Woodbridge, Va., while he attended Officers Basic School at nearby Quantico. He received two months of training in the Disbursing School at Camp LeJeune, N. C., and after a month's leave the young officer, also a 1965 Lawrence graduate, left for Okinawa where he is assigned to the disbursing office at Camp Smedley D. Butler, U.S.M.C.B.

### Japanese School

On June 16, his wife joined him there, taking advantage of a "60 day visitation period." The trip was made by jet from San Francisco via Alaska. At the end of the 60 days, she will go to Kobe where, from Sept. 1 until next June, she will teach English and history to 11th graders at the Stella Maris International School. Her husband will have a few days' leave to help her get settled there.

Founded and run by a missionary order of Catholic nuns, the school accepts students of any faith. "The main prerequisite," says Nancy, "is that the child speak, read and write enough English to carry on all classwork in English."

Twenty-eight nationalities are represented among the students in grades 1-12; all are children of foreign ambassadors, business executives or others who cannot attend Japanese schools because they do not speak the language. She will be the only non-nun teacher of the staff.

When Lt. Harwood received his 13 month overseas assignment, and she decided to follow, she began job-searching by writing some 140 letters to various people and companies in Japan. She began with a Foreign Tax Directory that listed the names of American firms having branches in Japan. She found that the only Americans employed there are on the executive level, that because the Japanese nationals are bilingual and willing to work for lesser wages, they are much more attractive as a wage earner than their American counterparts.

### Beautiful Island

After exhausting the possibility of working for an American firm, Mrs. Harwood wrote to the American Chamber of Commerce in Japan, the Japanese Chamber

of Commerce, American Consulates and the American Embassy. Of Okinawa, the Harwood's say "it is a very beautiful island, very green. The terrain is hilly. It is considerably less modern than we are accustomed to in the States." Their home for these two months, however, has been a modern two bedroom home with a modern kitchen, fully air-conditioned with a 17-year-old maid named "Chiyoko" who works by day, studies English by night. A "yard Mamasun" comes on Mondays to "mow the lawn and keep the tropical backyard under control."

Only the major roads are paved; the side streets are very narrow with no sidewalks. "There are very few large American cars here," the couple reports. "They're simply too big. Small Japanese cars or American sports cars are popular, as are motorcycles. So the streets are filled with people, motorcycles, cars, horse-drawn wagons, trucks, and 'scoche cabs,' a very tiny, little taxi that can make its way anywhere. Driving is a panic," they say.

Most of the buildings are unpainted on the outside but the people are actually very industrious. Everywhere you go, people are scurrying about, they report. The unemployment rate is less than 2 per cent.

**Western Clothing**

Okinawans wear western style clothes except for the older people who have not surrendered the kimono. The custom of exchanging one's shoes for a pair of slippers at the front door is

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still in evidence. "Sew girls" are everywhere—more than one could count in a week," Nancy reports. For \$2.50 they will fashion any one-piece dress from material you may purchase from them or bring with you. They do not use patterns but proceed from a picture of the customer's sketch. With her genuine interest in sewing, she is finding the fabric shops and their beautiful silk materials a seamstress' paradise.

The Harwood's expect to return to the United States next June and the following June will find his tour of duty complete and a return to civilian life.

Injured were Dobyns, who complained of back and left elbow injuries and Edna Herrmann, 59, who suffered a left hand injury.

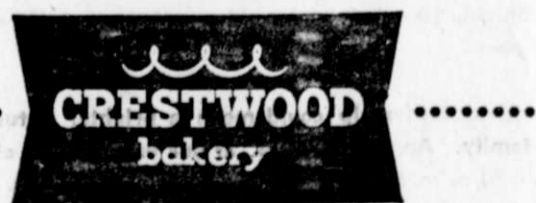

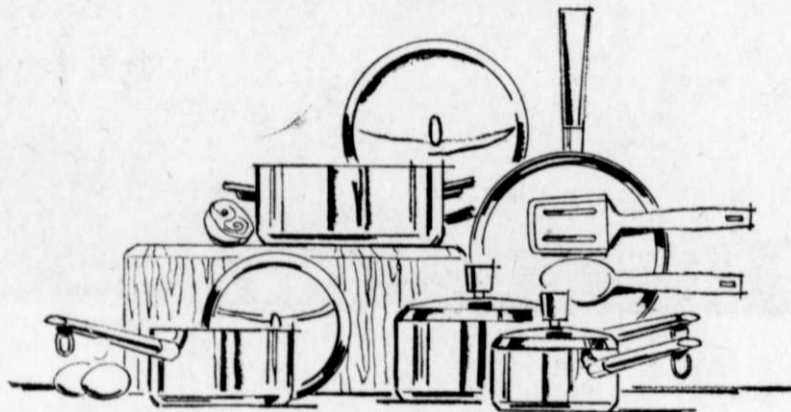

**2 SCHOOL STAFF MEMBERS PRESENT RESIGNATIONS**

A special meeting of the Board of Education of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. District No. 3, held at the Beechwood School on August 1, 1966, was called to order at 8:35 p. m. with all members present. Gerald Secor was also in attendance.

Minutes of the July 27, 1966 meeting were accepted as printed upon a motion by Anne Panzer and second by James D. Reigle.

The contract for C. Ernest Mitchell as High School Principal was approved and Mr. Boyd mentioned that Mr. Mitchell would like to meet with the Board at a future date.

The resignations of Mr. James Smithers of the Beechwood School staff and Mrs. Mary Koppelman of the Farmington School staff were presented to the Board. Discussion was held and upon a motion by James D. Reigle, second by Zona Miske, it was decided to tentatively grant the release on the condition that qualified replacements can be found at this late date.

Mr. Eugene Bohn met with the Board to discuss insurance coverage for the schools of the entire district. The package policy plan for coverage on all exposures, plus a policy to cover Workmen's Compensation, were explained. A complete package of the Employer's Mutual of Des Moines with prices will be presented at a future meeting by Mr. Bohn.

After discussion on a pay day schedule for all schools of the district, Harry Oelhafen moved and James D. Reigle seconded that bi-monthly payments be made on the 2nd and 4th Friday of each month.

Motion carried.

Discussion was held regarding the adjustment of salaries for contracted teachers to the salary schedule. It was decided that a study be made and presented to the Board of Education at a future meeting stating experience, educational credits, present salaries, salaries with adjustments, etc.

Transportation contracts were discussed and Mr. Boyd was authorized to arrange for a contract covering the Wayne transportation needs.

The Board authorized Mr. Boyd to take bids for kitchen equipment and a school vehicle.

Language laboratory bids were discussed and the Board asked Mr. Boyd to contact local schools regarding equipment they had installed as to comparative qualities of service, etc.

Board policies were discussed. James D. Reigle moved to adopt policies as set by the Kewaskum Community High School Board of Education, Nos. 1321, 1330, 2230, 3434, 4151, 4151.7, 4152.3, 5125, 5138, 6112, 8110, 8210 and 8310 on a temporary basis until such time in the future as additions or revisions are recommended and made by the Board. Zona Miske seconded. Motion carried.

Allen A. Tessar moved that the Board contract with the Cooperative Education Service Agency No. 16 for the service of a psychologist during the 1966-67 school year for a total of 30 days at a cost of \$1,005.00. Anne Panzer seconded. Motion carried.

The Board decided to hold a meeting Monday, August 15, 1966, at 8:00 PM at the Wayne Elementary School.

Discussion was held regarding the lunch programs of the schools. Jack Jadro moved that a cost of \$1.30 for a weekly lunch ticket and 40c for a daily lunch ticket be set for the 1966-67 school year. James D. Reigle seconded. Motion carried.

Anne Panzer moved that a milk break be held at all elementary schools of the district during the 1966-67 school year at a cost to

students of 1c per day to be collected semi-annually. Zona Miske seconded. Motion carried.

Allen A. Tessar moved to adjourn. Anne Panzer seconded. Motion carried.

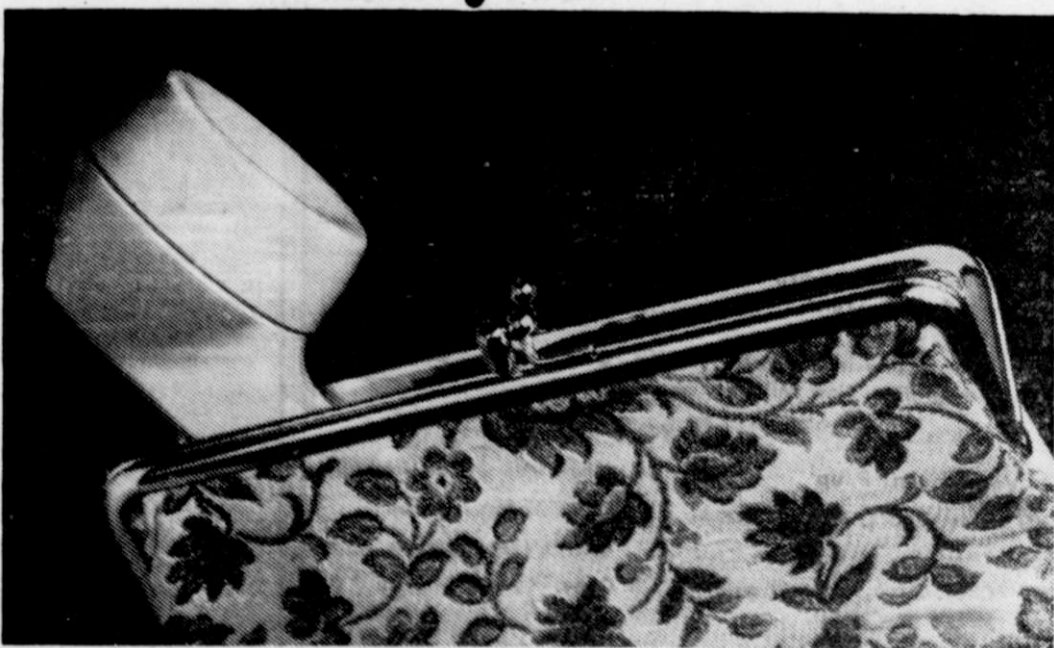
