County Labor Council Parade Here Labor Day

FIVE BANDS, LEGION DRUM AND BUGLE CORPS TO PLAY

The Central Labor Council's annual Labor Day parade and celebration, scheduled for Kewaskum this year on Monday, Sept. 5, will be bigger and better than last year's. This parade, refreshment, advance ticket, prize, guest and food committee chairmen promised this week.

The parade will start from the corner of 2nd and Fond du Lac at 1:00 p. m., proceed south on Fond du Lac to Main, then east on Main to the park road. There will be at least five bands, including the Kewaskum High school band. The recently revived Kewaskum American Legion post drum and bugle corps will also participate. There will be ancient autos and floats. There will be no political car-tops by order of the parade chairman.

The refreshments will consist of soda water, chocolate milk and orange drink for the younger participants, and some of the stuff that made Wisconsin famous for those 18 years and over. The only way to get to enjoy these refreshments is by accompanying your parents if you're under 18, or by having a ticket if you're older. A one dollar donation will insure your having a ticket.

Prizes so far run the gamut from an outboard motor by Chrysler and a de-humidifier from Line Material to billfolds from Amity, cookware and coffeemakers from West Bend and Regal and a can of car wax from a local service station. There will also be a muffler from International Stamping in Hartford.

The guests will be introduced by Clifford Matchey of the AIW. These will include Village President Wayland Tessar, Congressman Race, Assemblyman Schroeder and some of the council officers.

The food will consist of hamburgers prepared by the Kewaskum firemen and American Legion post, popcorn and candy bars. These items will be available for a nominal charge after the ceremonies.

The council therefore would like to suggest that you take the family for a little ride on Sunday. Go to Port Washington for their parade and celebration. This should take care of the wanderlust. On Monday come to Kewaskum. This should insure your being around on Tuesday so that the rest of the council members don't get any more overtime to make up for your not being at work.

Holy Trinity Parochial school will open next Wednesday, Sept. 7, with an expected enrollment of 251 pupils, approximately the same number as last year, when 253 children registered on opening day.

The school term will open with a High Mass in the parish church at 8 a. m. on Wednesday. On the first day of school there will be only a half day session of orientation with classes being dismissed at noon.

A staff of four Sisters of St. Agnes and two lay teachers will teach the eight grades. Three changes have been made in the teaching staff for this term. WAS FORMER COUNTY BOARD CHAIRMAN, BANK DIRECTOR

Newton W. Rosenheimer, 79, prominent and well known Kewaskum resident, and the president of the L. Rosenheimer Malt and Grain Co., passed away at the Cedar Lake Home for the Aged, Big Cedar lake, early on Thursday morning, Aug. 25.

He was an honorary director of the Bank of Kewaskum for many years and formerly served as chairman of the Washington County Board for a number of years. Mr. Rosenheimer was a member of the West Bend Masonic Lodge No. 138.

Mr. Rosenheimer was born Oct. 5, 1886 in Kewaskum, a son of the late Adolph and Elizabeth Petri Rosenheimer, and was a lifelong resident of this village. He married the former Malinda Holley at Antigo, Wis. on June 24, 1913.

His wife survives him along with a daughter Linda (Mrs. Robert Kroncke) of Kewaskum, his son-in-law, a grandson, Robert N. Kroncke, a student at the University of Wisconsin, Madison; two granddaughters, Mary Kroncke, also a student at Wisconsin, and Kathleen, a student at Kewaskum High school. Another daughter, Patricia, preceded him in death at the age of eight, and a sister and two brothers also predeceased him. He also leaves a brother, M. W. Rosenheimer, of Big Cedar lake, and other relatives.

Funeral services were conducted at Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, at 2 p. m. Saturday with the Rev. Daniel Schwalter officiating. Interment was in the Rosenheimer family cemetery at Slinger, where Masonic graveside rites were held. Visitation was at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, from 4 p. m. Friday to 11 a. m. Saturday and at the church from noon until the hour of services.

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Nelthorpe, Golf Pro, Father of Local Man Dies

Burns O. "Blackie" Nelthorpe, 62, of 1709 N. 68th st., Milwaukee, well known golf professional at Westmoor Country club in that city for 40 years, and the father of Burns R. "Blackie" Nelthorpe of Kewaskum, died on Tuesday, Aug. 30, at Misericordia hospital after a year's illness with cancer.

An outstanding instructor, Mr. Nelthorpe began his golfing career at an early age. His main interest was in developing young players and he produced many state champions. The list includes Mrs. John Clauder, six time Wisconsin titlist; Goldie Bateson, state champion twice and now pro at the Roberts club; George Johnson, Oconomowoc, and Burleigh Jacobs, Jr. Blue Mound, former amateur champions. Jane Hurley and Nelthorpe's daughter, Nancy Nelthorpe Laven of Wind Lake, ruled the juniors.

As president of the Wisconsin Professional Golfers' association, Nelthorpe established pro-junior competition. With Burleigh Jacobs, Sr. he organized the Milwaukee District Junior association.

Born in Bloomington, Ill., Nelthorpe began his golf career as a caddie at Kalamazoo, Mich. His first pro job at 19, was at the Saugenash Country club, Three Rivers, Mich. He also taught at Calumet, Mich. before taking the Westmoor pro post in 1926, its first year.

Nelthorpe competed in the United States and western open meets, and the Professional Golfers' association of America tournament.

He served the PGA state group as its president, secretary and director, and in 1960 was honored as "state pro of the year."

He was an avid curler and competed in bonspiels for more than 20 years as a member of the Wauwatosa Curling club.

Survivors are his wife Lucille; daughters Nadine Prevetti, Oconomowoc, and Nancy; son Burns, Jr., Kewaskum, and eight grandchildren.

The body was in state Wednesday from 4 to 9 p. m. at Borgwardt Funeral home, 7425 Harvard ave., Wauwatosa. Funeral services were conducted at the funeral home at 10 a. m. Thursday with burial in Holy Cross cemetery.

A social hour followed the business meeting.

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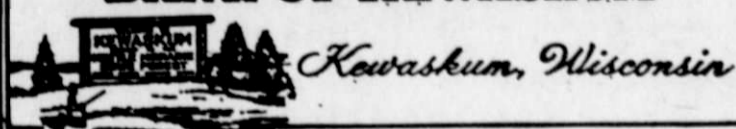

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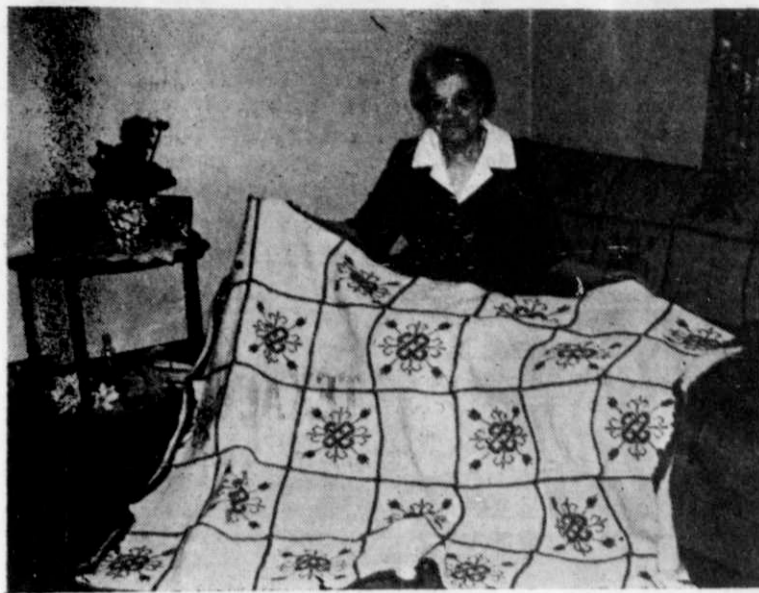
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State Fair Prize Winning Afghan

Mrs. Dworschack won the award by making an afghan for her granddaughter, Miss Janice Babcock of Milwaukee, who entered it in the fair. It was an engagement gift.

"Take one crochet hook, add 26 skeins of yarn, blend in a goodly amount of patience, mix well with ability and skill and you have one afghan," the smiling Mrs. Dworschack related.

She worked at it "off and on" in her spare time last winter. It was an excited young lady who telephoned her grandmother last Friday to inform her of the award. When Miss Babcock entered the afghan in the fair, she affectionately attached a label to it "Made

by Grandma." The background of the 72-inch long, 56-inch wide afghan is ivory and in each 35 blocks, which were made individually, is a snowflake design crocheted in a soft shade of gold. Earlier Mrs. Dworschack made one for her daughter, Mrs. Reuben Drewitz, who reside at Long lake, R. 2, Campbellsport.

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Red Cross Youth Training Center Volunteers Return

Neither rain, nor cold or discomfort dampened the enthusiasm of the young people selected to attend the sixth annual Red Cross Training Center at Green Lake. Among the 120 young people from southeastern Wisconsin were: Jane Krieger and Virginia Meier from West Bend High school, and George Martin and Jim Butz from Kewaskum High school. Attending the conference at a special session for adults were Mrs. Mike Cavanaugh of the official board and Miss Clara Jaehnig, Red Cross executive secretary.

The young people learned at the conference, which they attended under the sponsorship of the West Bend chapter, the structure and purpose of the Red Cross

and the work it carries on locally, in the United States and throughout the world. They heard the charming and dedicated Miss Jeri Murphy, Marquette university senior, explain that in Mexico all Red Cross phones are answered "todos somos hermanos," which means "all men are brothers." She told of the work she participated in instructing citizens, housewives, students, nurses and doctors as a volunteer safety and first aid instructor in Monterey, Mexico this summer.

The delegates learned that men workers are important in Vietnam. Lyle Heide, Red Cross field director at Selfridge Air Force Base in Michigan, who returned from Vietnam in June, told of how 200 Red Cross staff people are maintaining the lines of communication be-

tween servicemen and their families back home. Said Heide: "in Vietnam there are no front lines. Enemies are on all sides of you."

The young people did not just listen and learn. They talked, too. They learned leadership skills and discussed what they heard. All of the delegates left the conference with the guiding question, "can we convince adults in our communities that we can do a good job of helping others?" The West Bend Red Cross believes they can.

Dr. Walter Judd, physician, missionary, lecturer and former congressman, will speak at West Bend Sept. 7 at a testimonial luncheon honoring Assemblyman William A. Steiger, the Republican candidate for Congress.

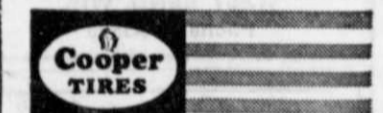
