Kewaskum Community Schools Open With Enrollment of 1,600

15 New Teachers On Faculty Staff Of 68 Members

566 IN HIGH SCHOOL;
157 FRESHMEN ENROLL

Kewaskum Community schools opened on Friday, Aug. 24, with a total enrollment of nearly 1,600 pupils—1,594 to be exact. Included were 566 high school students and 1,028 elementary pupils who attend four schools in the K-12 district, it was announced by Marshall H. Boyd, superintendent of schools. A class of 157 freshmen entered high school.

Add the approximate enrollment of 251 pupils at Holy Trinity school to the 1,594 enrolled in the public schools and you have a total of 1,845 pupils attending school in the Kewaskum district this year.

Fifteen new teachers were among the 68 faculty members (including the superintendent of schools and high school and elementary school principals) who greeted the actual 1,594 students present on the first day. This total includes 138 half-time kindergarten pupils.

The breakdown by schools was as follows: high school 566, Kewaskum elementary 490, Beechwood 155, Wayne 120 and Farmington 150. The breakdown by classes was: kindergarten 138, first grade 86, second 100, third 86, fourth 111, fifth 111, sixth 102, seventh 103, eighth 91, special education 10, freshmen 157, sophomores 139, juniors 151, seniors 119.

Enrollment by classes in the four elementary schools was as follows:

Kewaskum — Kindergarten 74, first grade 48, second 50, third 42, fourth 50, fifth 54, sixth 59, seventh 52, eighth 51, special education 10. Beechwood—kindergarten 24, first 9, second 15, third 15, fourth 25, fifth 22, sixth 12, seventh 14, eighth 21. Wayne—kindergarten 17, first 12, second 13, third 10, fourth 15, fifth 12, sixth 17, seventh 17, eighth 7. Farmington — kindergarten 23, first 17, second 22, third 21, fourth 21, fifth 23, sixth 14, seventh 20, eighth 12.

The new high school addition is nearing completion and it is hoped to move in as soon as possible. Some of the remodeled facilities are now in use. Meanwhile, the high school is temporarily using four rooms of the St. Lucas Lutheran church school and four rooms of the Kewaskum elementary school. The new cafeteria also is expected to be in use soon.

Richard E. Zarling, Kewaskum Elementary school principal, announced this week that the Wayne Elementary school will begin kindergarten classes on Monday, Sept. 12. The opening was delayed due to a lack of equipment. Classes will be in the afternoon for pupils who live in the Wayne district. The date has still not been determined when the Farmington school kindergarten classes will start but it is anticipated that it will be before the end of September.

Hold Primary Election Next Tuesday, Sept. 13

COUNTY, SENATE, STATE
CONTESTS STIR INTEREST

Next Tuesday, Sept. 13, is primary election day in the county and state and candidates for the various offices were busy this week winding up their campaigns.

The voting place in the village will be at the municipal building and the polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. Town of Kewaskum voters will cast their ballots at the Labor Center in this village from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m.

While most incumbent office holders on the county level are unopposed for nomination on the Republican ticket, two are facing opposition while two other candidates are seeking nomination for a vacancy—to succeed Dist. Atty. Richard Becker, not a candidate for reelection.

Candidates for district attorney are Robert J. Kauffman, present assistant dist. atty. and Henry F. Renard, both West Bend attorneys. Renard formerly served as district attorney during a vacancy and also has served as assistant DA. Both are on the GOP ticket, although Renard formerly ran on the Democratic ticket for the office. There is no candidate on the Democratic ballot.

Incumbent sheriff Raymond Jeffords is opposed by Hilbert A. Radtke for reelection on the GOP ticket while Gerhard H. Guttman is seeking election on the Democratic ballot. Guttman, former Kewaskum police chief, is unopposed.

Robert Boltz, incumbent coroner, is opposed by Richard A. Burg for the GOP nomination. Boltz defeated Burg in the last election. Dr. Robert Kauth is unopposed for the Democratic nomination.

All other incumbent Republican candidates are unopposed on their own ticket, but several face opposition from Democratic opponents.

County Clerk Anton P. Staral, GOP incumbent, is opposed by James B. Feiten, Democrat. County Treasurer Robert J. Klein, GOP incumbent faces opposition from Democrat Gladys L. Peterson. Mrs. Helen Berend, incumbent clerk of circuit court, faces opposition from Joseph F. Rossman, Democrat. Olga Perrin, present Republican register of deeds, has competition from Minerva B. Martin of Kewaskum, Democratic candidate. Surveyor Ethan D. Maxon, GOP incumbent, has no opposition on either ticket.

On the legislative level, the race for the state senate seat held by Frank E. Panzer is arousing interest. Panzer is opposed by Mrs. Adeline R. Lattimer and Carl V. Kolata for the GOP nomination while Robert C. Hearne is unopposed for the Democratic nomination for the newly revised 13th district seat.

Much interest has been aroused in the contest for the 6th district congressional seat now held by Democrat John A. Race. Race is

Children's Service Society Campaign Now in Progress

A total of 165 children were placed for adoption by the Children's Service Society of Wisconsin last year. The agency has completed more than 7,000 adoptions since its founding in 1889.

During September this voluntary state-wide child placement agency, the only one not under auspices, is conducting its annual fund raising appeal. While most of the support comes from the 78 united funds and community chests, individuals in non-federated fund raising communities are asked to contribute to the work of finding good homes for helpless children in their areas.

Adoption is one of the soundest preventive programs the commu-

nity supports. It finds permanent homes for children who might otherwise be dependent upon charity throughout their childhood at a cost of several thousand dollars a year.

Besides the adoption program, Children's Service took care of an average of 578 boys and girls a month, provided foster family care for 422 youngsters and helped 604 unmarried mothers plan for themselves and their babies.

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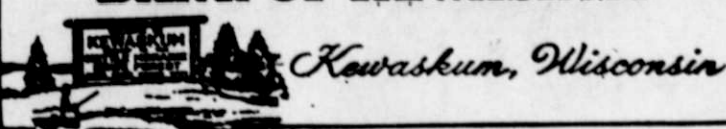
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Cong. John Race Speaks at Labor Day Event Here

SAYS WAGE-EARNERS CARRY A CRIPPLING TAX BURDEN

Congressman John A. Race Monday told a Kewaskum Labor Day audience that "the wage-earners of America are carrying a crippling tax burden, while oil speculators, stock market manipulators and promoters of every sort are lining their pockets through special tax breaks."

Race told the Labor Day celebrators that in order "to correct this injustice," he has introduced legislation which would increase individual tax exemptions from \$600 to \$1,000.

"It is possible," said Race, "for someone with an income of over \$1 million to pay less in federal income taxes than wage-earners

with an income of \$4, \$5, or \$6 thousand."

The Fond du Lac lawmaker put the blame for "this inequity" at the feet of some of "the monied interests of this country who are more interested in making a fortune than supporting a fair tax system."

"If you work for wages," said Race, "and no matter if you wear a white collar or a blue collar, you are a victim of these discriminatory tax laws."

"On the other hand," continued Race, "if you make over \$1 million per year, the odds are that you may not be required to pay one cent of federal tax."

"The wage earners of this country are entitled to a better tax break, and my bill would give it to them. I see no sense in providing greater incentive to drill an oil well by providing special tax breaks and, at the same time, penalize a wage earner attempting to bring up his children by taxing

him to death." Race's bill to increase the de-

ductibility of dependents is presently pending before the House
