# Kauffman, Jeffords, Boltz Win Nomination in County Contests

PANZER, LUCEY WIN: 227 BALLOTS CAST IN VILLAGE, 98 IN TOWN

The only county officers who faced competition on their own ticket for nomination, Sheriff Ray- ty, mond W. Jeffords, Coroner Robert H. Boltz and Assistant Dist Atty. Robert J. Kauffman, candidate for district attorney, were all nominated as GOP candidates in Tuesday's Primary Election.

Kauffman's victory leaves him alone in the field for election as district attorney since there was no candidate for the post on the Democratic ticket.

All won by sizable margins. Jeffords polled more than 3 to 1 against Hilbert A. Radtke with a total of 3,190 votes to Radtke's 935. Late returns from the city of West Bend again swept Coroner Boltz to victory after he was trailing in some outlying precincts carried by Richard Burg. The final tally was 2,331 for Boltz and 1,706 for Burg of Slinger. Asst. Dist. Atty. Kauffman was the apparent winner in all but four of the county's 28 precincts. Two of the four were the towns of Kewaskum and Wayne.

State Senator Frank Panzer also won by a comfortable margin, polling more votes than the combined total of his two opponents. Panzer's total in Washington county was 2,592 while Carl V. Kolata tallied 583 and Mrs. Adeline R. Lattimer totaled 473. Panzer also carried Dodge county, his home county, but ran second in Jefferson county, which has recently been incorporated in the revised 13th senatorial district.

Despite the contests on the county GOP ticket and the many centests on the state Democratic ticket, a light vote was recorded in the county with an estimated 6,556 ballots cast. There were no contests on the state Republican ticket. Nominated in the only contests on the state Democratic ticket were Patrick J. Lucey, candi date for governor; Martin J. Schreiber, lieutenant governor; Cletus J. Johnson, secretary of state, and Eugene M. Lamb, state treasurer.






