Ground Breaking Ceremonies for New Post Office Building Saturday

Announce Program For Ceremonies to Begin at 2:30 O'Clock

CONG. RACE, PO OFFICIAL, VILLAGE PRESIDENT TO SPEAK; BAND WILL PLAY

Official ground breaking ceremonies for Kewaskum's new post office building will be held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday at the new post office site at 341-347 Main st. The structure will be located two doors west of the present post office, next to Koch's grocery, where the Koch implement shop was formerly located. The building, which has been razed, was more recently occupied by Jaeger's Sewing Center.

The new facility has become necessary due to the steadily growing postal business in the community. The Sturm Building Corp. of Manawa, Wis. has been awarded the contract to build the new post office. The building will have an interior space of 3,433 square feet and an area of 6,024 square feet for parking and movement of vehicles. The building is expected to be completed by March 1, 1967.

DEATH BOOSTS TOLL IN COUNTY TO 27 FOR YEAR

Gerald R. Staehler, 32, of R. 2, Kewaskum, was fatally injured at 6:20 p. m. Saturday when his car, traveling north on a town road (the old West Bend road) several miles south of Kewaskum and a mile east of Hwy. 45, apparently went out of control and struck a large tree in front of the Ed. Junk, Sr. farm home. He was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend.

The fatality boosted the county death toll on highways to 27 for 1966, four more than the 23 recorded at this time last year.

Staehler, who was a one in his auto, was driving north on the town road when the vehicle left the straight road on the left side, passed over the corner of a field, missing a pole, and then mounted the lawn and struck the tree at the Junk residence. The victim who was employed as a truck driver for the West Bend Elevator, was returning home from work when the mishap occurred a short distance from his home.

Born April 9, 1934, Staehler lived in the Kewaskum area all of his life. He resided with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Staehler, at R. 2, Kewaskum, and they survive together with a sister Shirley (Mrs. Leander Kempf) of R. 1, Kewaskum; a brother, Edward Staehler, of West Bend; one brother-in-law, one sister-in-law, uncles, aunts, nieces and other relatives.

Funeral services were held at 9 a. m. Wednesday, Sept. 28, from Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, and at 9:30 a. m. at Holy Trinity church, with the Rev. John T. Budde officiating. Interment was in the parish cemetery. Visitation at the funeral home was from 2 p. m. Tuesday and the Rosary was recited at 8:30 p. m.

Other Accidents

Otto Bartelt, 52, of R. 2, Campbellspoint, complained of a chest injury and his wife, Lorinda, a passenger in his car, suffered head and knee cuts following a crash early Sunday on County Trunk G in the town of Auburn. His car struck the side of a panel truck operated by Philip Currier, Milwaukee, after Currier had lost control of his vehicle as he swerved sideways into a ditch to avoid striking an unidentified vehicle which forced him off the road. Bartelt was unable to stop in time to avoid striking the Currier truck which careened sideways in front of his car. Officer Richard Hargrove of Fond du Lac county investigated. The Kewaskum firemen's ambulance was summoned to the scene but by the time it arrived Mrs. Bartelt had been removed to a physician's office by another motorist.

An auto driven by Harry Krueger, R. 2, Kewaskum, was badly damaged in another crash Saturday night southwest of Kewaskum but details were not available, except that his car was reported to have struck a steer in the road. Krueger was not injured.

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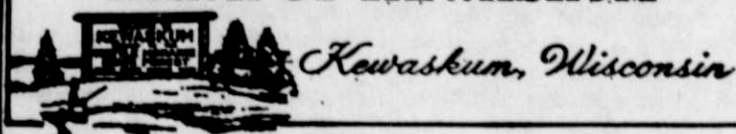
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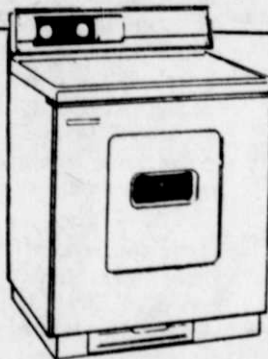

Nick Haug, 86, of 1127 N. 8th ave., West Bend, a former resident of the town of Kewaskum many years and a retired farmer and blacksmith, died at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, at 11:30 a. m. on Thursday, Sept. 22, after a lingering illness.

He was born in the town of Kewaskum on Sept. 5, 1880, and before moving to West Bend about 25 years ago, had resided in the Kewaskum area and in various localities in Wisconsin. He and the former Helen Koepke were married in the town of Kewaskum on April 22, 1908. She predeceased him Sept. 1, 1939, and on Dec. 28, 1944, he married the former Clara Berth in West Bend.

His second wife survives him, along with a son, Wesley Haug, of R. 2, Kewaskum; a daughter, Rosella (Mrs. Walter Butzlaff), of R. 2, Kewaskum; a son-in-law, a daughter-in-law, seven grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, three sisters, Mrs. Ann Schroeder and Mrs. Olive Strupp, both of Osh-

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kosh, and Mrs. Archie (Olga) MacArthur of Fond du Lac and other relatives.

Mr. Haug was a former town of Kewaskum assessor and also a former director of School District No. 7.

Funeral services were conducted at the Techtman-Myrhum Funeral home, West Bend, at 2 p. m. Monday, Sept. 26, with the Rev. Daniel Schowalter of Peace United Church of Christ, Kewaskum, officiating. 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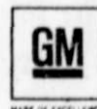
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Minutes of School Board Meeting

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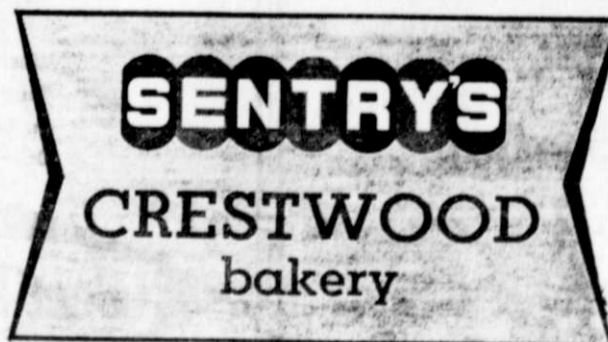

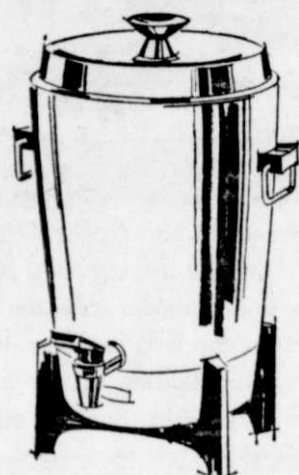

for his third TD but dove at the ball and missed it. A Slinger man was lucky enough to fall on it but it was a safety and another 2 points for the winners.

Early in the 4th quarter Kewaskum had another drive going but it was stopped on the 12 by a Slinger interception. The Owls decided to go for broke but Jim Manthei intercepted their first pass and returned it to the Slinger 22. Two plays later Backhaus hit Mark Heise on a 20 yard scoring play and also passed to Heise for the extra point, bringing the score to 28-7.

At this time Coach Harlow put in the reserves. They gave up two touchdowns but the game was already won and the younger players were able to gain some invaluable playing experience.

Credit the defensive line of Erdmann, Erickson and McCarty with some fine play. Also on offense, the blocking of Jim Gutjahr and Karl Brath opened many fine holes for the backs as is noted by the 220 yards Kewaskum gained on the ground.

Friday night the Random Lake Rams invade Kewaskum and they tied a tough North Fondy outfit last Friday night.
