#### DEATH BOOSTS TOLL IN COUNTY TO 27 FOR YEAR

Gerald R. Staehler, 32, of R. 2, Kewaskum, was fatally injured at 6:20 p. m. Saturday when his car. trackling north on a town road (the old West Bend road) several miles south of Kewaskum and a mile east of Hwy. 45, apparently went out of control and struck a neunced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend.

The fatality boosted the county death toll on highways to 27 for 1966, four more than the 23 recorded at this time last year.






