Open House at Newly Remodeled Miller's Funeral Home This Weekend

CHURCHES, CHARITIES TO BENEFIT FROM OPENING

After almost five months of concentrated effort, Miller's of Kewaskum now have their spacious, newly remodeled funeral home ready for inspection. On Saturday, Oct. 8, from 2 to 8 p. m. and on Sunday, Oct. 9, from 9 a. m. to 8 p. m., Miller's will hold open house, to which all are cordially invited.

Instead of giving souvenirs, Miller's decided to give a donation for every adult who registers, to his or her church, organization or favorite charity.

The home has been enlarged to include two chapels and two family rooms on the main floor. A lounge has been included in the basement arrangement.

Construct Large Seed Warehouse Building Here

STRACHOTA PUTTING UP 21,000 SQ. FT. BUILDING

A large new 21,000 square foot Dairyland Seed building is being constructed on Hwy. 45 at the junction with County Trunk Hwy. H about one mile south of Kewaskum. Construction is proceeding rapidly with completion tentatively set for Nov. 1 or before.

The spacious building will include an office, processing department and large warehouse. The structure will be of concrete block and steel, with steel paneling and brick trim for the office area. The building measures 80 by 264 feet.

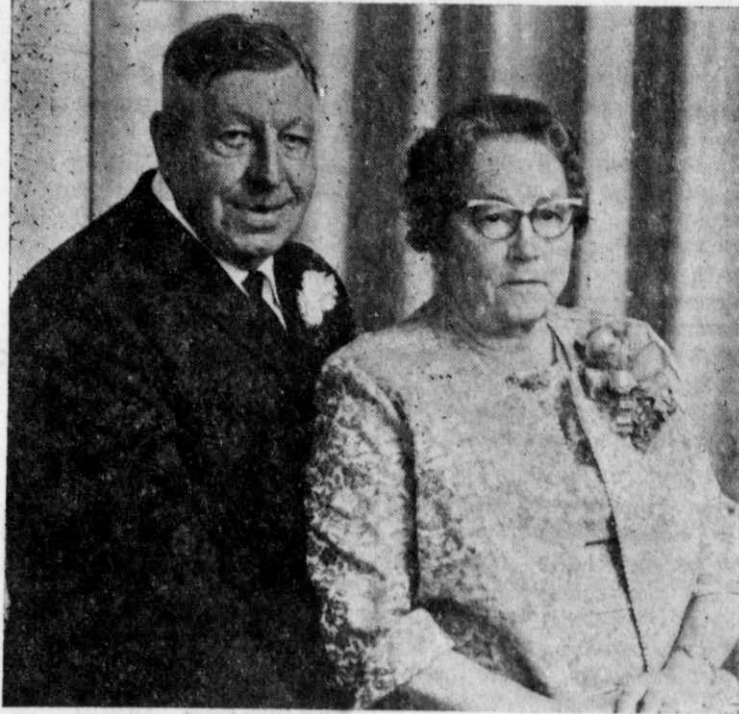
EASTER LILY IN BLOOM

Suspect Charged With St. Michaels Theft Breaks Jail

Patrick F. Scott, 28, who was charged with theft at Serwe's tavern at St. Michaels, was the subject of a state-wide police search Wednesday after he broke out of the county jail at Kewaunee last Tuesday night. The burglary at Serwe's tavern allegedly took place on the night of Sept. 4 when cash, cigarettes and liquor were reported taken.

Scott was also being held in Kewaunee county on theft charges. He also broke out of the state prison at Stillwater, Minn. prior to being apprehended in Wisconsin. Information indicated that Scott stole a 1957 model Chevrolet following the jail break at Kewaunee and later took a 1962 model aqua marine color Pontiac.

He is reported dressed in a yellow and brown plaid shirt and brown trousers. The state-wide bulletin described Scott as "dangerous." He wears glasses, the bulletin further states.

County deputies are also continuing their investigation of the holdup at the Club 144 last month.

Ground Broken For Post Office Building Here

MORE THAN 100 ATTEND. DIGNITARIES TAKE PART

The ground breaking ceremonies for the new Kewaskum post office building at 341-347 Main st. Saturday afternoon was attended by a fine turnout of more than 100 area residents, as well as several reporters and photographers, a number of dignitaries, and neighboring postmasters.

Postmaster Harry E. Koch and Congressman John A. Race of the sixth congressional district shared the ground breaking honors by turning over the first shovels full of dirt immediately after the formal program.

Postmaster Koch introduced Orval Behnke, Kewaskum insurance man, who acted as master of ceremonies for the program. Members of the Kewaskum High school band, under the direction of Clyde Brehm, provided the musical entertainment. The Rev. John T. Budde of Holy Trinity church offered the invocation and benediction.

The principal speaker, Cong. Race, said in part, "The United States is on the move and so is the postal department. It is likely that our population will be doubled within the next 35 or 40 years and more new facilities like this proposed one will have to be built." He went on to trace the history of the Kewaskum post office since its establishment on Aug. 29, 1849, mentioned the names of all the postmasters since that time, and said that he recently introduced legislation to improve postal service.

Melvin Nelson, representative of the Minneapolis region of the postal department, of which Kewaskum is a part, also was present and talked briefly. He said the building will be privately owned and will be leased to the government for 10 years, with future options of up to 20 years.

Wayland Tessar, village president, delivered a short address on the proposed new facility. Assemblyman Fred Schroeder of Washington county also was introduced.

The new facility, necessitated by the steadily increasing volume of mail handled, is scheduled to be completed by March 1, 1967. The Sturm Building Corp. of Manawa is the general contractor for the building which will have an exterior of brick and native field stone and will contain 3,433 square feet of interior space with 6,024 square feet for parking and movement of vehicles.

Arthur Sturm, one of four brothers who operate the firm, was present for the ceremonies. He stated that excavation work for the project will get underway within two weeks.

Visiting postmasters from nearby communities were present and included Mike Goring of West Bend, Cliff Pfeifer of Allenton, Leona Stahl of Newburg, Charles Held of Jackson and Leroy Anderson, acting postmaster of Campbellsport.

Adult Recreation Program Offered

The Kewaskum Elementary school will again sponsor an adult recreation program beginning Oct. 12, for all residents of the Kewaskum school district which includes Beechwood, Farmington and Wayne.

The program will be free of charge and will be open to any and only adult residents of the Kewaskum school district 18 years of age or older who are no longer attending high school. High school students and/or other children will not be allowed. This is an "adult" program for the district. Adults will have an opportunity to get some recreational physical exercise through basketball, volleyball, etc.

Beginning on Oct. 12 and 13, Wednesdays from 8:00-10:00 p. m. will be for men and 8:00-10:00 p. m. on Thursdays for women (except the 3rd Thursday of each month when the Cub Scouts use the area). Locker room and shower-room facilities will be available. Participants will be responsible for their own towel, soap, etc.

It is hoped that the adults of the district will avail themselves of the program during the winter months ahead when other recreational activities are curtailed.

General Federation of Women's Clubs Commemorative Stamp

The 5-cent stamp commemorating the 75th anniversary of the General Federation of Women's Clubs was issued on Sept. 12, 1966 in New York City, where the federation was created.

The stamp honors eleven million women who are members of U. S. clubs, overseas clubs and associate organizations. The far-flung programs of the federation range from aiding school dropouts to promoting traffic safety, and from natural resource conservation to encouraging international understanding.

This horizontal stamp was designed by New York City artist Charles Henry Carter. It was printed on the Giori presses with an initial printing of 115 million. The color of the stamp is pink and blue with black lettering.

Stamps are now available at the Kewaskum post office and Woman's club members are invited to use this new commemorative stamp.

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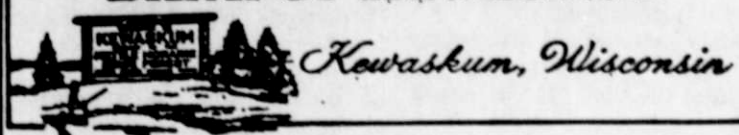

Senator Schreiber Speaker at County Democrat Meeting

AIR POLLUTION PROBLEM, SAYS LT. GOV. CANDIDATE

"The growing problem of air pollution presents one of the gravest hazards facing our urban areas," State Senator Martin J. Schreiber said Thursday.

Sen. Schreiber, Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor,

spoke before a meeting of the Washington County Democratic Party at Gumm's Tap, Hwy. 45, West Bend.

Sen. Schreiber called air pollution "one of those problems that is continually ignored until it has reached overwhelming proportions and is almost impossible to handle."

"If we do not face this problem now, we will not be able to solve it adequately in the future. We must not wake up ten years from now, when our urban areas are

being strangled by smog and fumes, and ask why preventative measures were not taken in the past.

"Just as we should have anticipated the water pollution problems of today years ago, we must anticipate the air pollution problems of tomorrow now.

"Unfortunately, the present state administration has taken no steps to control the worsening pollution of the air around us. Yet, this is a state-wide problem, and

action must be taken at the state, as well as the local level.

"It is necessary that Wisconsin establish an Air Pollution Control Division to assist local air pollution control agencies. Such a division was requested in the budget of the State Board of Health but was cut by Gov. Knowles.

"We cannot endanger our children and our urban areas in the future by refusal to act in the present."

Jim Korth of the Indians is in 8th place in individual scoring in the conference with 19 points, scored on three touchdowns and one extra point. Steve Groeschel of North Fondy leads the loop with 36 points on six TD's.

Results of other conference games Friday found North Fondy and Pewaukee battling to a 20-20 tie, Campbellsport and Germantown tying 19-19, and leading Grafton clobbering Slinger, 59-0.

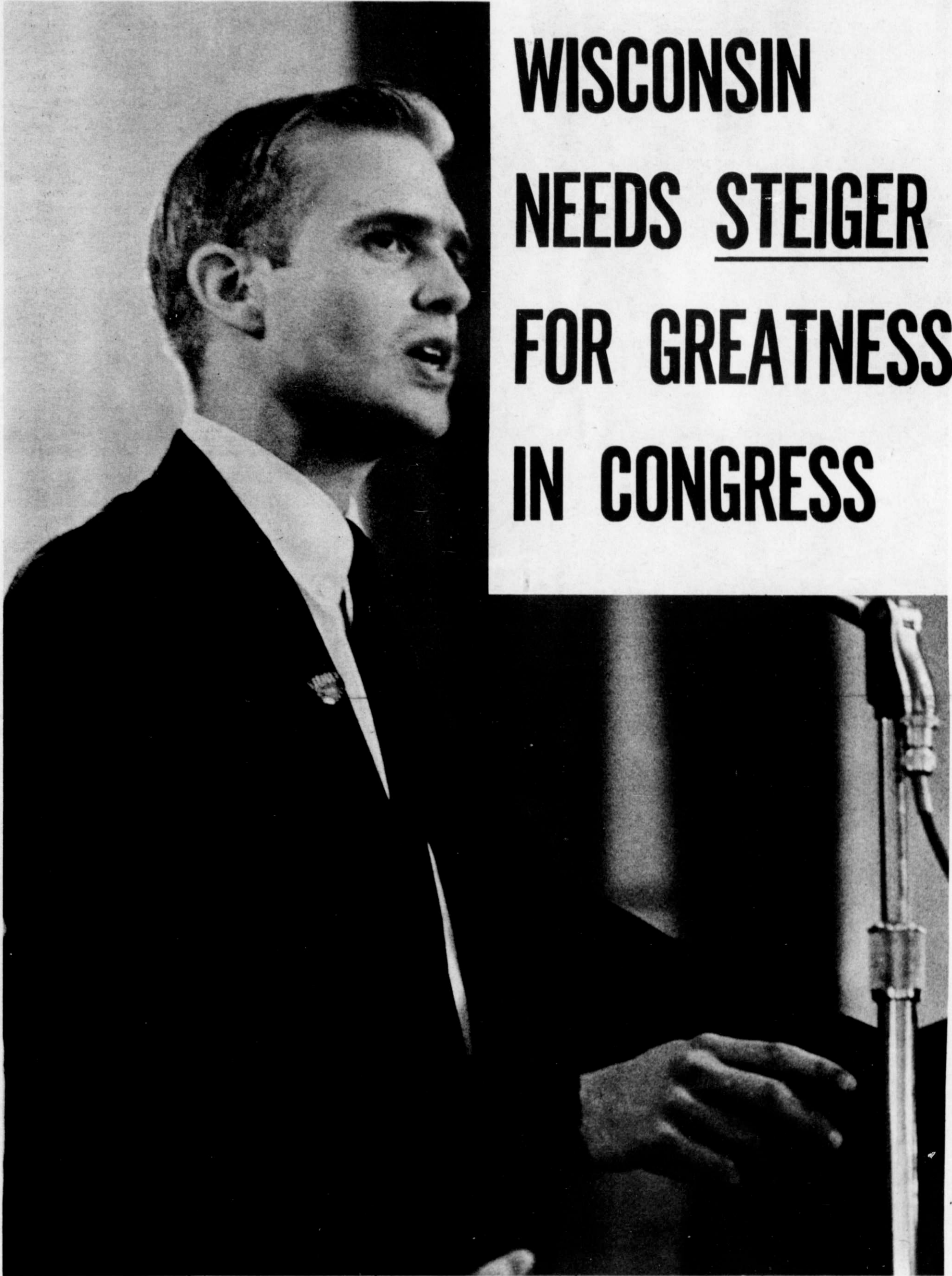

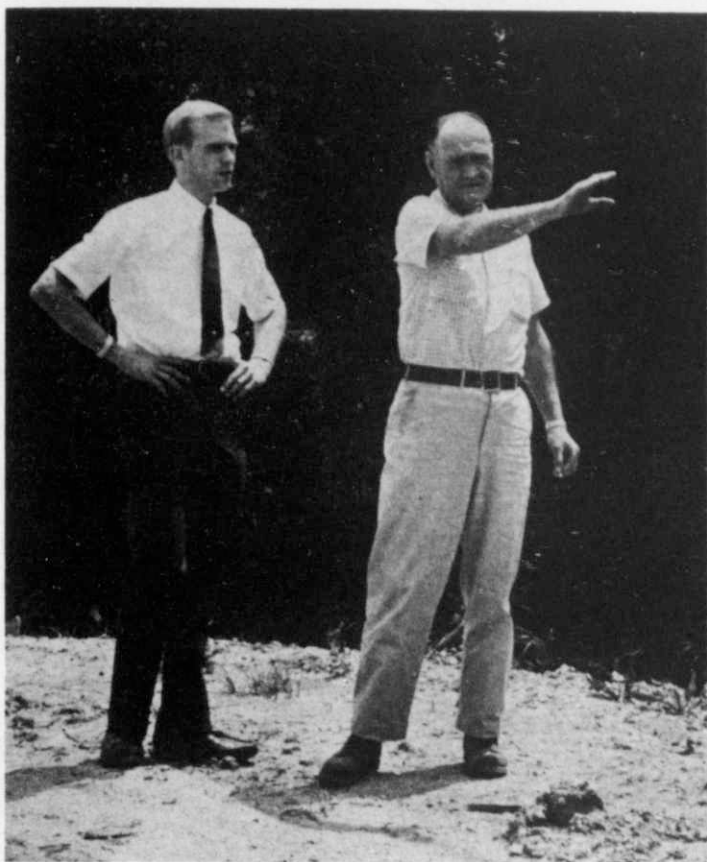
