## Village Board Adopts Revised Wage Schedule

### MAY SPEND \$750 FOR NEW CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS

Regular Meeting  
October 3, 1966  
The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Perschbacher and duly carried.

Since no bids were received for a new police car, the matter was tabled and the commissioner was instructed to re-advertise for bids to be opened at the November 7th meeting.

Two quotations for a sand spreader were received and tabulated as follows:

Upon motion by Trustee Yoost, seconded by Trustee Herriges and carried, the proposal of Central Engineering was accepted.

The board tentatively agreed to spend approximately \$750.00 for new street Christmas decorations.

The Barton Construction Co. was advised to complete their curbing construction project by October 21st or be assessed a penalty.

The commissioner was granted permission to attend the League of Wisconsin Municipalities Conference at Milwaukee on October 12, 13 and 14.

Upon motion by Trustee Freehauf, seconded by Trustee Yoost and duly carried, the revised village wage schedule, effective as of October 1, 1966, was adopted and ordered placed on file in the commissioner's office and to be open for public inspection at any time during regular office hours.

# Indians Win Over Warhawks, 18-13, At Homecoming

## BACKHAUS-HEISE PASS COMBINATION CLICKS

The Kewaskum Indians brought home a victory over Germantown Saturday afternoon, which pulled them into a 4th place tie in the conference and made the homecoming weekend complete.

The game itself was a real heart-stopper with the score standing at 18-13. At one point in the game the Indians trailed, 13-0.

In the first quarter, after a few exchanges, Germantown managed to score first after a blocked punt. Phil Carroll fell on it in the end zone for 6 points and Harold Gettelman made it 7 by running over the extra point. The second quarter was a defensive battle until Gettelman broke loose for a 25 yard TD run. Extra point try failed so the score was 13-0 and things looked dim.

Then Backhaus and Heise came into the picture. On the first play following the kickoff, Backhaus stepped calmly back into the pocket and fired a 53 yard scoring pass to Mark Heise, who was streaking down the field 10-15 yards past the nearest defender. Germantown then drove to the 6 yard line but the Indians tightened and time ran out. So it was 13-6 at halftime.

The second half saw some inspired football played by the Indians, especially the defensive unit. Germantown had several chances to score following poor punts by Mike Miller in a very strong wind but was dropped for losses time and again.

In the third quarter Backhaus

and Heise again teamed up on a 33 yard scoring strike. Jerry Marx tried for the tying point and most observers thought he had it but the official said it was no good. This made the score 13-12. Kewaskum needed a touchdown badly so they started to drive behind the hard running of Marv Ebert and Jim Korth. On the Germantown 3 yard line, the drive was frustrated by a fumble.

The 4th quarter saw a Germantown drive to the Kewaskum 15 but they failed to make a first down in 4 efforts so the Indians took over 85 yards from pay dirt with approximately 5 minutes left to play. Korth, Ebert and Backhaus alternated taking the ball behind some great blocking and were soon at the 50 yard line. A piling penalty on Germantown moved the ball to the 36 yard line and the tension was mounting. Backhaus went to the pass and hit Heise on a 33 yard pass play. Two plays later Backhaus sneaked over from the one.

The game still wasn't over. Germantown had a minute and a half to score. They tried a few short passes, bringing the ball to Kewaskum's 40. Next they tried a draw play with Gettelman but Al Bohn was on the scene to drop him for a 3 yard loss. This brought up a 4th down situation and it was certain to be a pass play and as Ron Bast faded back Pat McCarty poured through the line, dropping him for a 15 yard loss and the victory.

Cited for great defensive play by Coach Harlow were Al Bohn in his first start at defensive end and Tom Gundrum, fine Indian linebacker.

Korth had 68 yards for the Indians and Ebert chipped in 47. Gettelman was the leading ground gainer for the Warhawks with 125

yards in 26 carries. Excluding his one 25 yard TD run the Indians contained him well as 3 or 4 of them greeted him roughly each time he carried the ball.

This week (Friday, 8 p. m.) 1st place Grafton, presently rated 4th in the state and undefeated comes here. Kewaskum will be honoring the dads of the players by introducing them at the game and a get-together of moms, dads, players and coaches will follow the game.

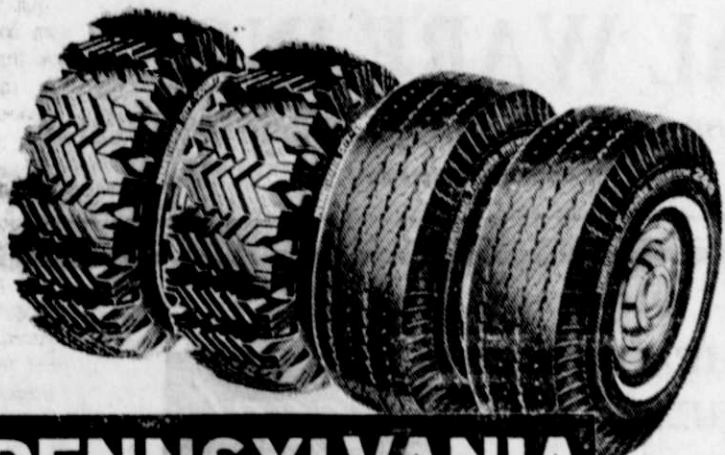
### Lost Dual Meet to West Bend
