General Election In County, State Tuesday, Nov. 8

INTEREST MOUNTING AS TIME DRAWS NEAR

Interest has been mounting throughout the county for the General Election next Tuesday, Nov. 8, and a good turnout is in prospect at the polls. Voting in the village will be at the municipal building and town of Kewaskum ballots will be cast at the Labor Center with the polls open from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m.

State-wide interest has been focused on the election of state officers but the 6th district congressional contest is probably attracting the most interest in this area. This finds Democratic incumbent Congressman John A. Race opposed by William A. Steiger, Republican assemblyman from Oshkosh's first district. Both Steiger and Race have conducted vigorous campaigns.

In addition to voting for state officers, a congressman, state senator and member of the assembly and county officers, area voters will vote on the referendum issue as to whether state statutes should be changed to shorten the term of residency in the state from a year to six months before newcomers can cast ballots in Wisconsin.

GOP Caravan Through County Set for Saturday

WINTER ARRIVES EARLY AS FIRST SNOW COVERS GROUND

Winter arrived early in this area as the first snowfall blanketed the ground Tuesday evening, Nov. 1. The snow was accompanied by biting 25 mile an hour winds with gusts up to 33 miles and was followed by temperatures that dropped to the low 20's Wednesday night. Even colder weather was forecast for Thursday night. The snow had disappeared by Wednesday but there were more light flurries on Thursday.

An autumn storm along the state's northern border left 22 inches of snow on the ground Wednesday in a stretch from Douglas to Florence counties. The average date for a measurable snowfall in this area is Dec. 1. The frigid northern winds from Tuesday through Thursday had residents shivering.

Of some consolation is the fact that even states in the deep south like Alabama and Mississippi were reported to have even colder weather than Wisconsin with the mercury dipping to 18 to 22 degrees and many southern states had several inches of snow.

15 SENIORS IN LAST GAME FOR KEWASKUM

The Kewaskum Indians were overpowered by a highly talented Grafton outfit, undefeated conference champion, in the final game of the season Friday night. Had it not been for a few bombs, the score might have been a lot closer and the Indians had nothing to be ashamed of since they had more yardage against Grafton than any team in the league. And only North Fondy managed to score more points (18) against Grafton than the Indians did.

Grafton scores came on short plunges by Rocky Maxon of 1 and 3 yards, on pass plays of 18 and 50 yards to Dean Tonn, a 5 yard run by Bill Peschel and a 53 yard scamper by Ken Peterson, the league's top scorer.

Grafton piled up 579 yards (311 rushing) to 217 for Kewaskum. The Blackhawks made 21 first downs to the Indians 12. Kewaskum's Heise wound up 8th in scoring in the Scenic Moraine with a total of 41 points.

Fifteen seniors played in their last ball game for Kewaskum. Backs Jerry Marx, Bill Backhaus, Jim Korth and Marv Ebert will graduate in June as will linemen Pat McCarty, Niles Erickson, Mark Schaefer, Karl Brath, Mark Heise, Mike Miller, Joe Peters, Curt Erdmann, John LaMarche, Jim Backhaus and Dick Schmidt. These boys have played some fine football for their school, which finished in a fourth place tie in the conference, and some of them

will be hard to replace. Eight letter winners will be back next year to form a nucleus, along with some fine JV players.
