All County Republican Candidates Retain Posts in Election Tuesday

GOP ALSO WINS CONGRESS, SENATE CONTESTS, FOUR OF FIVE STATE OFFICES

Voters in Kewaskum and Washington county followed the pattern in the state and nation by sweeping Republican candidates to victory in Tuesday's election, not only for state offices but in the congressional and legislative contests as well as the entire county slate of contests.

All GOP candidates won in county balloting. The contest for attorney general was the only one on the state ticket which was won by a Democrat, with the incumbent, Atty. Gen. Bronson LaFollette, defeating Louis J. Ceci, the Republican candidate. Ceci was ahead of LaFollette in Washington county, however, by a narrow margin of 7,231 to 6,898.

The turnout of voters at the polls in the county and in this village was considered very good. A total of 14,755 votes were cast in the county. The total vote in Kewaskum, was 552, a large turnout. Of these there were 194 straight Republican votes compared to only 76 straight Democratic votes. The 118 more straight GOP votes approximately provided the difference between the vote in the two parties as Republicans ran ahead of the Democrats by an average of 100 votes or better for most offices. However, the races for governor, attorney general and congress ran much closer. For attorney general Ceci led LaFollette by a margin of only 280 to 261 in the village. For congressman Steiger led Race, 311 to 237.

A total of 251 ballots were cast in the town of Kewaskum, also a fine turnout. There were 94 straight Republican votes, 36 straight Democratic votes and 121 split tickets. In the township Republicans ran ahead of the Democrats by an average of slightly more than 50 votes.

One of the most closely observed contests in this area, other than the state offices, was the closely contested battle between William A. Steiger (R), who unseated incumbent John Race (D) to regain the congressional seat long held by William K. Van Pelt, whom Race defeated in 1964. The vote in the district was Steiger 68,038 and Race 61,413.

Frank Panzer, veteran state senator, also emerged the victor in the newly enlarged 13th state senate district, which now includes Washington, Jefferson and about half of Dodge counties. Panzer carried Washington county, 8,523 to 5,528 over Robert Hearne, his Democratic opponent.

Fred Schroeder, incumbent GOP assemblyman from Washington county, also retained his legislative seat by a more than 2 to 1 victory over his Democratic opponent, Fred Groth. All of the other county Republican candidates were easy winners over their Democratic opponents. Sheriff Ray Jeffords polled the largest total of county GOP candidates who had opposition, totaling 10,047 votes to 4,255 for Democrat Gerhard Guttman. Mrs. Olga Perrin, incumbent register of deeds, polled

CONTRACT LET FOR DRAINAGE DITCH IN NEW SUB-DIVISION

At a meeting of the village board of Kewaskum on Tuesday evening, authorization for the purchase of a new police squad car was given. Honeck Chevrolet, Inc. of Kewaskum was awarded the bid in the amount of \$1,700. It was one of three bids submitted.

The Eden Construction Co. of West Bend was awarded a contract in the amount of \$2,230 to dig a drainage ditch in the new Country Aire sub-division. The ditch will be designed to divert a creek to run north to the Milwaukee river.

Authorization was given for the replacement of storm windows at pumping station No. 1 opposite the elementary school on Tower st. No contract was awarded.

Eldor Kannenberg firm of West Bend was engaged for the yearly audit.

The board will draw up the annual budget at a meeting scheduled for Monday at 7:30 p. m. The proposed budget will be announced at the December 5 meeting of the board.

Public Hearing Set for Removal Of Local Depot

HEARING AT 10 A. M. NOV. 14 AT MUNICIPAL BUILDING

The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin has ordered a public hearing on the application of the Chicago and North Western Railway company for authority to remove the depot building in Kewaskum and to eliminate less-than-carload freight traffic at such station from tariffs. The hearing will be held at the village hall in Kewaskum on Monday, Nov. 14, at 10 a. m. and any interested citizen from this area is welcome to attend.

The public service commission on Sept. 19, 1966, received a petition signed by 493 persons residing in and near the village of Kewaskum, requesting that the railway company be required "to remove or demolish its depot, which is located in the Village of Kewaskum, because it has become a public nuisance and eyesore due to its decrepit condition."

The commission in its order of Sept. 7, 1965, involving a number of stations of the railway, authorized removal of a number of depot buildings except at Kewaskum and three other communities.

On Oct. 4, 1966, the commission, pointing out that section 192.56, statutes, contemplates an application by the railroad for removal of a depot, inquired of the railway whether it wished to file an application for removal of the Kewaskum depot building.

On Oct. 12, 1966, counsel for the railway filed an application with the commission for authority under section 192.56, statutes, to remove the depot building at Kewaskum and to amend tariffs to eliminate less-than-carload freight traffic at such depot. The application alleges that the depot building at Kewaskum "is unnecessary for the rendition of service by the railway company to the public and has been and is largely unused" and that "handling of the present passenger traffic at Kewaskum, which is nominal, can be accomplished without continuation of the depot."

Having made the requisite finding under section 192.56 (2), statutes, the commission directed and therefore ordered the public hearing on the above application to be held Monday at the village hall.

THREE PERSONS HURT IN CRASH NORTH OF VILLAGE

Three persons were injured in a two vehicle crash on Hwy. 45 about 60 feet north of Hwy. 28 at 6 p. m. Sunday. The mishap occurred when a car driven by Gerald J. Gerold, 27, Port Washington, apparently got off onto the shoulder of the road and puffed back and veered into the path of an approaching vehicle driven by Donald J. Berchem, 33, West Bend. Injured were Anne Berchem, 3, bruises and shock; Tom Berchem, 5, bruises and Rose Berchem, 30, bruises. Gerold was charged with operating a vehicle on the wrong side of the highway.

 ed more than 2 to 1 against Democrat Minerva Martin, Kewaskum's only candidate for office.

County and local voters also duplicated the state pattern in voting in favor of the referendum which will change the time of residency requirement for voting in elections from one year to six months. The vote in the county was "Yes," 8,613 and "No," 3,416. While state results were not complete, the vote in favor of changing the requirement was receiving overwhelming support. Results in Kewaskum were "Yes," 340 and "No," 100, with 112 ballots left blank. In the township there were 144 "Yes" and 49 "No." Complete results of the voting in Washington county, the village of Kewaskum and town of Kewaskum were as follows:

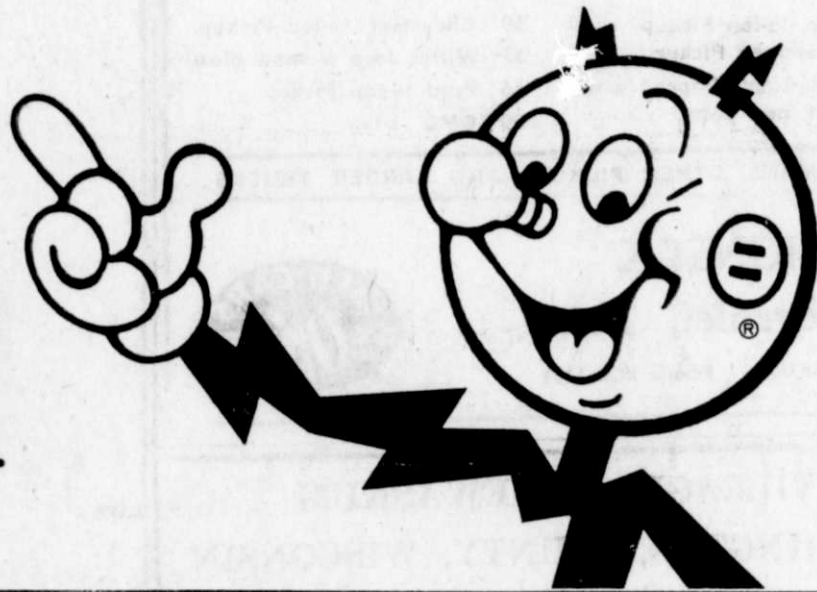
