Mr. Kratzer was born at Port Washington on Nov. 15, 1886, and former Florence Stone Sept. 13. 1909 and they lived in Port Washington for four years and then moved to Milwaukee where they resided until coming to West Bend in 1917. At that time Mr. Kratzer became a part owner of the West Bend Bottling Works (now the Seven Up Bottling Co.) and later ocquired full ownership. He continued as owner and manager until 1945.

Mr. Kratzer also served as a member of the West Bend fire department, having joined the organization in 1917. He was elected secretary of the volunteer fire department in April, 1920, and on their low bid of \$1,700.00. was named secretary-treasurer in January, 1949, a position he held at the time of his death. Mail Airlifted to Servicemen Overseas Trail in Northern

Postmaster Harry E. Koch of the Kewaskum post office today announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters) and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices

Also, under Public Law 89-725the Dulski Military Mail Actwhich was signed by President Johnson on Nov. 2. 1966, second class publications such as newsweekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces scrving in Viet Nam.

Postmaster Koch explained that parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid Lake headquarters, said the 440 at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and de livery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail).

This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco concentration center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Postmaster Koch also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis. should be mailed no later than Dec. 10.

Postmaster Koch and the employees of the post office wish to thank the patrons for the fine cooperation during the Christmas period last year.

Plan Snowmobile

440 ACRE TRACT NEAR NEW PROSPECT MADE AVAILABLE

The Wisconsin Conservation Department announces that a 440 aere tract of land in the northern unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest will be made available for use by snowmobile enthusiasts during the coming winter.

The site is located about one mile south of State Trunk 67 on County Highway A, the terrain is described as rolling to hilly. Both open grass land and forest area are included in this snowmobile play area.

In addition, the department will permit the use of the 16 mile horseback riding trail in the Northern unit of the forest for snowmobiling.

Register Record 3-Day Kill of 240 Kettle Moraine Area Deer in County

A record number of deer were registered at the four checking points in Washington county after the first three days of the season with the tally Tuesday morning standing at 240. The season continues through Sunday.

All of the deer registered up until that time were shot in the county or adjacent areas with a few from Fond du Lac. Dodge and Ozaukee counties among the entries. The deer kill in the county was running well ahead of last year's tally. Checkers at the various points all indicated that the deer were excellent speciments with some large animals included.
