Mike Kratzer, GOP Officer, Fireman Dies

FORMERLY OWNED WEST BEND BOTTLING WORKS

Michael G. Kratzer, 80, well known West Bend and county resident, died at Milwaukee Lutheran hospital on Wednesday, Nov. 16, after submitting to surgery at the hospital.

Mr. Kratzer was born at Port Washington on Nov. 15, 1886, and grew up there. He married the former Florence Stone Sept. 13, 1909 and they lived in Port Washington for four years and then moved to Milwaukee where they resided until coming to West Bend in 1917. At that time Mr. Kratzer became a part owner of the West Bend Bottling Works (now the Seven Up Bottling Co.) and later acquired full ownership. He continued as owner and manager until 1945.

Mike, who was known as "Mr. Republican" in Washington county, served as the party's secretary for 20 years and was its treasurer at the time of his death. He was honored last October for his outstanding activities in the county GOP organization at a sixth district awards dinner at Oshkosh. A vigorous campaigner, he had a host of friends throughout the area and consistently admonished party workers "to get out and work" to win elections. In spite of his age, Mr. Kratzer took a most active part in the recent election and worked at GOP headquarters.

Mr. Kratzer also served as a member of the West Bend fire department, having joined the organization in 1917. He was elected secretary of the volunteer fire department in April, 1920, and was named secretary-treasurer in January, 1949, a position he held at the time of his death. He was also the senior member of the county jury commission and was a commissioner at this time.

A 52-year member of the Masonic Order, he was a member and past master of West Bend Lodge 138 F & AM, and also a member, past governor and a past secretary of West Bend Lodge 1398, Loyal Order of Moose. Deceased also was a member of Trinity Lutheran church and the Trinity Lutheran Men.

Mrs. Kratzer preceded her husband in death on July 18, 1962. A son, Michael, was killed in Luxembourg during World War II, on Jan. 2, 1945. Surviving are a daughter, Eleanor of McKeesport, Pa., a sister, Miss Kunnie Kratzer, of Port Washington, a brother, Hans, Port Washington, and other relatives.

Funeral services were conducted at Trinity Lutheran church, West Bend, on Saturday afternoon. Visitation was at the Schmidt Funeral home from 2 p. m. Friday.

Mail Airlifted to Servicemen Overseas

Postmaster Harry E. Koch of the Kewaskum post office today announced that henceforth all first class mail, personal sound recordings (voice letters) and parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and measuring not more than 60 inches in length and girth combined, will be airlifted on a space available basis between the United States and all military post offices overseas.

Also, under Public Law 89-725—the Dulski Military Mail Act—which was signed by President Johnson on Nov. 2, 1966, second class publications such as newspapers and magazines published weekly or more often, and featuring current news of interest to the military, will be airlifted from San Francisco to the armed forces serving in Viet Nam.

Postmaster Koch explained that parcels weighing 5 pounds or less and not exceeding 60 inches in length and girth combined, paid at surface rates, will be moved by surface transportation within the United States from the points of mailing to the port of embarkation.

To speed up separation and delivery of these smaller parcels falling within this category, Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien directed that all parcels be clearly marked upon acceptance at the post office with the letters SAM (surface airlift mail).

This will eliminate the task of reweighing and measuring the parcels at the San Francisco concentration center prior to dispatch to Viet Nam or other overseas military post offices.

Postmaster Koch also reminded mailers that Christmas parcels weighing 5 pounds and under, though they are given airlift priority from San Francisco to Viet Nam on a space available basis, should be mailed no later than Dec. 10.

Postmaster Koch and the employees of the post office wish to thank the patrons for the fine cooperation during the Christmas period last year.

Plan Snowmobile Trail in Northern Kettle Moraine Area

440 ACRE TRACT NEAR NEW PROSPECT MADE AVAILABLE

The Wisconsin Conservation Department announces that a 440-acre tract of land in the northern unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest will be made available for use by snowmobile enthusiasts during the coming winter.

The site is located about one mile south of State Trunk 67 on County Highway A, the terrain is described as rolling to hilly. Both open grass land and forest area are included in this snowmobile play area.

In addition, the department will permit the use of the 16 mile horseback riding trail in the Northern unit of the forest for snowmobiling.

Dennis Konkol of Kewaskum, forest manager at the Mauthe Lake headquarters, said the 440-acre tract of forest land and horseback riding trail would be open for use as soon as they are covered with sufficient depth of snow.

The snowmobile trail will start at a point just east of the small village of New Prospect on County Trunk SS in Fond du Lac county and continue northeasterly through Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties for about 16 miles.

Snowmobile drivers must stay on the designated trail.

3 Autos Involved In Village Crash

All three vehicles were northbound on Fond du Lac ave. Miss Ruplinger stated she had stopped to make a left turn with her car's blinker on when she was struck by Kudek. Kudek stated he saw Miss Ruplinger slow to a stop so he stopped and was struck in the rear by the Harris auto, shoving him into the rear of the Ruplinger car. Harris said that Kudek stopped very suddenly and he did not have time to stop and avoid the crash.

Register Record 3-Day Kill of 240 Deer in County

A record number of deer were registered at the four checking points in Washington county after the first three days of the season with the tally Tuesday morning standing at 240. The season continues through Sunday.

All of the deer registered up until that time were shot in the county or adjacent areas with a few from Fond du Lac, Dodge and Ozaukee counties among the entries. The deer kill in the county was running well ahead of last year's tally. Checkers at the various points all indicated that the deer were excellent specimens with some large animals included.

Shooting on Saturday and Sunday in area counties was open for "any deer" and this helped swell the total. The remainder of the season through Sunday is on bucks only.

Hunters were elated over the results of this year's hunt which proved excellent despite the lack of snow cover which normally increases the kill due to the fact that it provides tracking conditions.

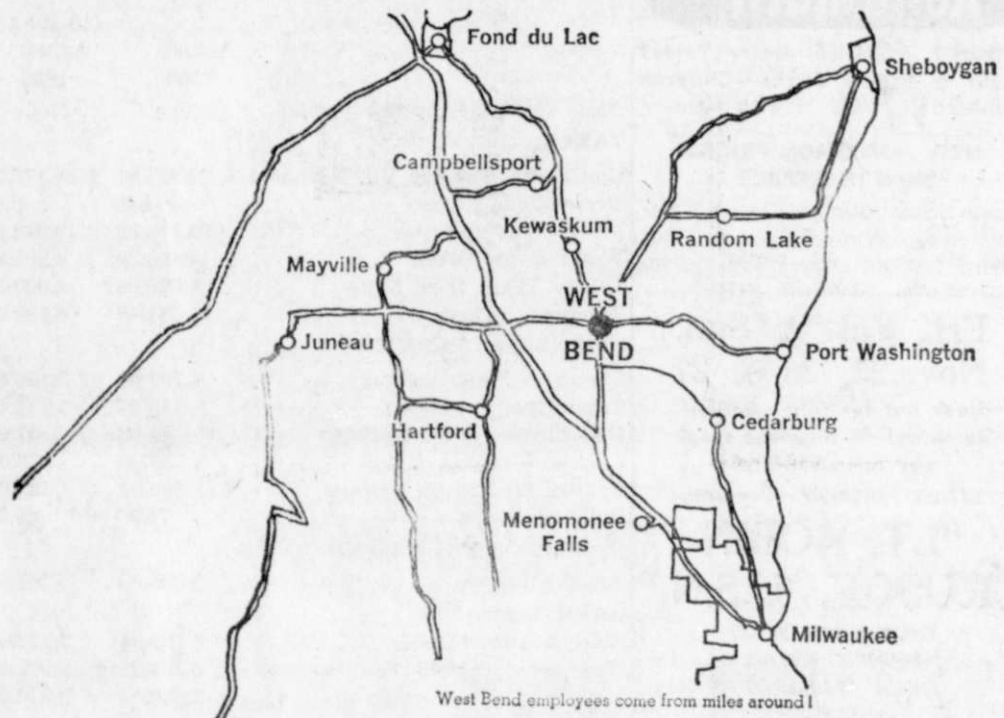

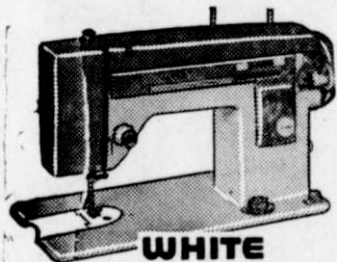
