Local Young Lady Injured in Crash; 2 Other Mishaps

A Kewaskum young lady and a rural Slinger man were injured in a two vehicle crash at the junction of Hwy. 45 and CTH D south of Kewaskum at 7:29 p. m. last Tuesday.

The mishap occurred when cars driven by Miss Sharon A. Jandre, 21, Kewaskum, and Elmer T. Bennett, 62, R. 1, Slinger, collided head-on. According to the accident report, the Jandre vehicle was left of the center line on Hwy. 45 when it and the northbound Bennett auto collided.

The Jandre auto, according to the driver, was eastbound on Hwy. D when it went out of control as she tried to stop for the stop sign. The road was wet and slippery at the time. Miss Jandre was a patient at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, for several days with multiple bruises and lacerations.

An auto driven by Daniel L. Heinecke, 22, R. 1, Allenton, was involved in an accident at 11:39 p. m. Saturday at the junction of Hwys. 45 and 28 at the north village limits. Heinecke, eastbound on Hwy. 28, did not see the arterial due to the heavy fog and drove through it. His car crossed Hwy. 45 and went into a ditch on the Mrs. Ralph Erdmann lawn, damaging same. The front end of Heinecke's vehicle was damaged.

In another village mishap at 8:07 p. m. Sunday, a car driven by Elmer R. Schaefer, 18, R. 5, West Bend, left the road at 1089 Fond du Lac ave. and struck a light pole. Schaefer, who was southbound, said his auto began to slide as a result of ice and snow on the road, causing him to lose control and his car struck the pole. The front end of the vehicle was damaged.

Indians Defeat Rosendale, Lose to Cedar Grove

OPEN CONFERENCE PLAY AT NORTH FONDY FRIDAY

The Kewaskum Indians broke even in two non-conference tune-up games the past week, defeating Rosendale handily here last Tuesday night, 72-58, and losing to a real good Cedar Grove squad there on Tuesday of this week, 65-55. A week previous Cedar Grove beat Plymouth by about 20 points, the team that had defeated Kewaskum by 20 points and yet the Indians lost to the Grovers by only 10 points. Kewaskum now enters Scenic Moraine conference competition with a 1-2 record in pre-season encounters.

Kewaskum experienced little difficulty in derauling Rosendale's defending Fox Valley Tri-County league champions. The Indians sank 28 field goals to only 18 for the Dalers, but were outpointed from the free throw line, 22-16. Kewaskum won easily despite losing three starters on personal fouls.

Senior Bill Backhaus, a starter his sophomore and junior seasons, had a big night for the winners with 30 points on 13 baskets and four free throws. John LaMarche chipped in 11 points. Top scorers for Rosendale were Feldner with 21 points and Daehn with 10.

Kewaskum gave strong Cedar Grove a spirited ball game there but the Indians couldn't handle the Rockets' scoring ace Ken Ver Gowe. The 6-5 Ver Gowe kept Kewaskum off balance from his center spot by tossing in 23 points, while the Indians' Backhaus, only 5-10, outshone him by garnering game scoring honors with 24 markers. Soerns chipped in 19 points for the Rockets, while Mike Miller and Jim Schuster each added 12 for the Indians.

It wasn't an easy win for Cedar Grove, which led only 15-13 at the end of the initial quarter and 35-29 at halftime. The Rockets couldn't gain in the third period, in which both teams scored 15 points. Then the Rockets tallied 15 points in the final stanza to Kewaskum's 11 to win by a margin of 10. The Indians made only 7 free throws while the Grovers sank 13.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians open the conference season at North Fondy, which has looked very impressive in pre-league games and is one of the favorites to win the title. The Orioles are paced by veteran aces Steve Groeschel, Kurt Urban, Jim Dumbaskas and Jeff Semenas.
