'Mike' Gnacinski Recommended As Leader at Scout World Jamboree

JAMBOREE WILL BE HELD IN IDAHO NEXT AUGUST; 10,000 BOYS TO ATTEND

Local Scoutmaster E. "Mike" Gnacinski has received a letter from the office of Region Seven, Boy Scouts of America, informing him of his recommendation to the National Council, Boy Scouts of America, as assistant scoutmaster to the World Jamboree.

The jamboree will be held at Farragut State Park, Idaho, and will run from Aug. 1 to 9, 1967. Present estimates indicate that some 10,000 boys and leaders from 90 countries will take part.

Region Seven (Wisconsin, Indiana, Illinois and Michigan) will send 45 adults and 500 boys to the jamboree. "Mike" is one of the 45 men recommended from the four states of Region Seven.

The Region Seven men and boys will leave home and start the pre-jamboree training of three days at Yorkville, Ill. on July 24 of next year and will return home from the World Jamboree on Aug. 13 or 14.

Some of the places and things leaders and scouts will see include St. Paul, Minn., Glacier Park, Seattle, Wash. and the Mighty Mo, the ship on which the Japanese surrendered in World War II, as well as the space needed in the state of Washington left from the World Fair which was held in Seattle. From there they will return home.

Elmhurst Choir To Give Concert At Peace Church

COLLEGE GROUP TO PRESENT SACRED CHRISTMAS MUSIC

The Elmhurst College choir of Elmhurst, Ill., under the direction of T. Howard Krueger, is to appear in a sacred concert of Christmas music at Peace United Church of Christ on Sunday, Dec. 11, at 10:15 a. m. There will be no 8 a. m. service.

The appearance by the choir in Kewaskum is one of more than thirty concerts scheduled by the group during its choral activities of the 1966-1967 season.

The current Elmhurst College choir includes 40 young men and women, undergraduates of the college, which is an affiliate of the United Church of Christ. Krueger is now in his seventeenth year as director of the choir. During this period the members have appeared in concert in churches and schools throughout the eastern two-thirds of the United States.

An unusual feature of the choir's presentation is the appearance of a group of its members into a Handbell choir. The Chapel Bell Ringers, as they are called, are members of the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers, and are one of three such groups in Illinois colleges. Their appearance is in conjunction with the singing of the choir as well as in a group of numbers especially arranged and composed for them.

Virtually all of the music presented by the Elmhurst choir in public is sacred. The Chapel Bell Ringers also concentrate on the performance of devotional music. The repertoire of the group includes music from the period of the sixteenth century Tomas Vittoria to such twentieth-century artists as Earl George and Heinz Werner Zimmermann.

Souvenir recordings made by the choir are available to members of their audiences. Each year the group prepares a high fidelity LP disc of their activities during that season for the benefit of those attending their performances.

Jan Koch Christmas Seal Sale Chairman

Washington is one of 32 Wisconsin counties which had an increase during 1965 in the number of newly reported cases of tuberculosis. The Washington county total was one in 1964 and three in 1965. The total of newly reported cases of TB for Wisconsin increased from 647 in 1964 to 677 in 1965.

"This increase in newly reported cases of TB in so many counties highlights the need for stepping up the year-round campaign against tuberculosis," the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association said in announcing the totals.

"Christmas seal contributions by Wisconsin people will help make possible more intensive campaigns for earlier discovery and treatment of active cases and for preventive treatment of persons at high risk of developing active TB," the WATA said. Mrs. Harry Koch is again serving as chairman of the Christmas seal sale in Kewaskum.

Patients from Washington county hospitalized in Wisconsin tuberculosis sanatoriums for treatment or diagnostic study totaled nine in 1964 and six in 1965.

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Indian Wrestlers Defeat Little 10's Mayville, Horicon

STRETCH STREAK TO THREE, ERICKSON TO 16 IN ROW

Kewaskum defeated Mayville here Friday night by the narrow margin of 4 points in a match which pitted the Indians in their 2nd year of wrestling against Mayville, the team picked by many experts to win the Little Ten conference title this year.

Kewaskum's Tom Schmidt started the evening with an impressive decision over Russ Kollmansberger, who has been tabbed by his coach, Tom Carron, as a top contender for the state 95 lb. title.

Jim Lehner gave Mayville its only lead of the evening by pinning Lenard Schmidt, who was filling in for Ron Kempf, who has been out with the flu.

After this, the Indians took four in a row with 3 straight pins and then an impressive 4-0 decision by Paul Reindl over Bill Malesovich. Coach Harlow was very pleased since all three pins were registered by underclassmen. Ray Gruber, a sophomore, regis-

tered the first pin over Fred Palmer in the 112 lb. class. Freshman Les Gundrum pinned Junior Dennis Gourlie in the 120 lb. division and Dave Milewski, a junior, followed with a pin over Bob Bath. These wins gave Kewaskum a commanding 21-5 lead.

Marvin Ebert lost a heartbreaker to Les Banner by a 11-9 margin. Mayville rallied to win the next two matches. In the 145 lb. class Les Bartel outscored Mark Heise, 7-0, and Mel Wondra followed with a 6-4 decision over Dick Schmidt to bring the score to 21-14, still Kewaskum.

At this point Niles Erickson clinched the victory for Kewaskum by pinning Dave Zills and thus extended his dual meet string to 15 straight victories. The pin was notched after 18 seconds in the second period. Now the score was 26-14. Kewaskum, and Mayville was mathematically eliminated.

In the 180 lb. class Mark Schaefer and Dave Kanas fought a controversial bout which ended 3-2

in favor of Kewaskum. Mayville's final concession was a victory via the pin for Norm Mills over Curt Erdman, ending the match in a 26-22 score in Kewaskum's 2nd straight victory.

Mayville's JV's defeated Kewaskum, 33-22. The Kewaskum "C" team defeated Mayville, 33-16.

Kewaskum 36 - Horicon 18
Kewaskum's undefeated wrestling team stretched their winning streak to three when they defeated Horicon of the Little Ten Tuesday, 36-18. The Indians won 8 and lost 4 on their way to an impressive victory that featured 6 pins and 2 decisions.

Tom Schmidt, the hero in Kewaskum's fine victory over Mayville last week, pinned Richard Beall in 2:58. Tom's brother Len-

ard was pinned by Jim Dewitz in 4:38. Ray Gruber won his third straight by pinning Doug Pieper in 2:21. Leo Gundrum got his third straight pin victory over Tom Karel in 1:35. Dave Milewski fell victim to Joe Ammann when

he was pinned after leading, 3-1. Paul Reindl lost a heart breaking decision to Dennis Flouro, 4-2. Marv Ebert got the Indians back on the right track by decisioning Don Raatz, 6-1. Mark Heise followed (Continued on page 7)
