Village Tax Rate Set at \$36 Per Thousand, Increase of \$3

CONTRACT AWARDED FOR SEWAGE LIFT STATION

Regular Meeting
December 5, 1966

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tassar presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the meetings of November 7th and 21st were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Perschbacher, seconded by Trustee Wietor and duly carried.

The public hearing on the proposed 1967 budget was the first order of business. There were no appearances in opposition to the budget as published. The hearing was then declared closed.

Upon motion by Trustee Kral, seconded by Trustee Yoost and duly carried, a contract for the construction of a sewage lift station was awarded to Gabes Construction, Inc. of Sheboygan on their low bid of \$27,399.50.

Marvin Schaefer was granted permission to construct an addition to the rear of his present home according to plans presented to the board.

The application of Richard Katzenberger for an operator's license was refused.

Mr. Boyd, Superintendent of Schools, and School Board Members J. D. Reigle, Richard Edwards, Allen Tassar and John Jadro discussed with the board the problem of snow removal from school property. A satisfactory solution was agreed upon.

The following resolutions were introduced and passed:

RESOLUTION NO. 66-7

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that there be and hereby are levied the following taxes for the year ending December 31, 1966, upon all real and personal property according to the assessment roll of the current year:

STATE TAXES—\$3,163.40, at the rate of \$0.32016 per thousand.

COUNTY TAXES—\$64,999.12, at the rate of \$6.57834 per thousand.

SCHOOL TAXES—\$286,102.08, at the rate of \$28.95542 per thousand.

STATE LOAN TO SCHOOL DIST. NO. 2—To be paid out of village surplus.

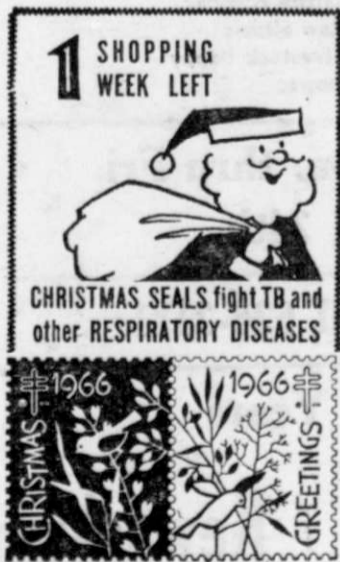

Peterson, the local chapter president, visited with our former AFS students, who are all still interested in the AFS program. More homes are available for American students abroad than have been in the past. Won't you please open your home for a foreign student in the 1967 - '68 school year?

General qualifications for a host family are as follows:

Both parents should be 37 years old, or older, and native born. They must have reared one or more children of the age level of the AFS student. All members of the family must want to have a student in the home. The AFS student must have a bed of his or her own and may share a room with another teenager but not with a child under 15. The host family is not paid for accepting the student, but may deduct up to \$50.00 monthly for U. S. income tax purposes and the home should be convenient to school, town and centers of teenage activities.

Other qualifications may be determined by contacting local AFS members. The final choice of a family is made in New York.

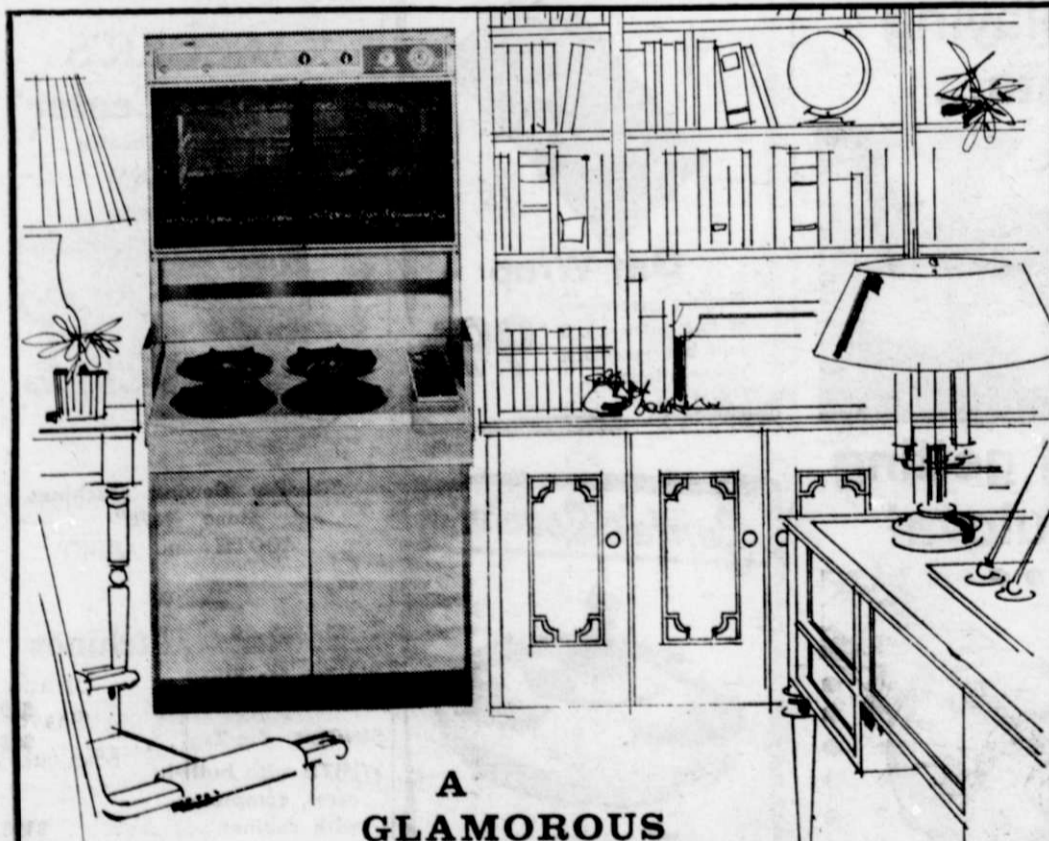

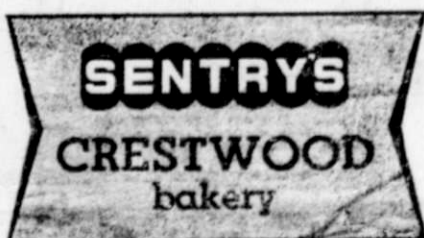

Increased Savings Rate Paid by West Bend Savings-Loan

The board of directors of West Bend Savings and Loan association announced on Nov. 16 a new, increased savings rate. The new rate to be paid for the period ending Dec. 31 is 4.50% per annum. The increase is retroactive to July 1, which means that all funds in savings accounts at West Bend Savings will have earned the new, higher rate since July.

This increase marks the second,

consecutive period that the association has increased the savings rate. Last April the board increased the rate retroactive to January, 1966.

Albert C. Larson, association president, in commenting on the new higher rate said that it was unusual for financial institutions to make rate increases retroactive because of the extra cost. However, he indicated that the board of directors felt this second retroactive increase was a continuance of the association's policy of paying the highest savings rate consistent with sound business practice. A retroactive increase also

keeps faith with the thousands of good association customers who have maintained and added to their accounts knowing the association would pay the highest amount permitted by good business practice.

The association indicated that the new 4.50% per annum rate was the highest rate paid in West Bend on passbook savings. At the same time the association did not foresee any increase in mortgage loan rates. "In fact," Larson said, "the association has had some of the lowest mortgage rates offered by savings and loan associations in this part of Wisconsin" end while rates are higher now than a year ago he hoped a peak had been reached and no further increase would be called for. The association policy since 1926 has been to pay the highest possible amount on savings and charge the lowest rate possible on mortgage loans. Now with the association holding almost ten million dollars in savings and lending millions of dollars for home building every year it becomes a vital factor.

While the future tax situation and the war situation makes forecasting uncertain, Larson felt the

first half of 1967 would be a good period for home building. He said the association had a good supply of mortgage loan funds available and any qualified borrower with good credit and adequate down payment could buy a home. The new, higher savings rate should also add hundreds of thousands of dollars to the associations lending funds he said.

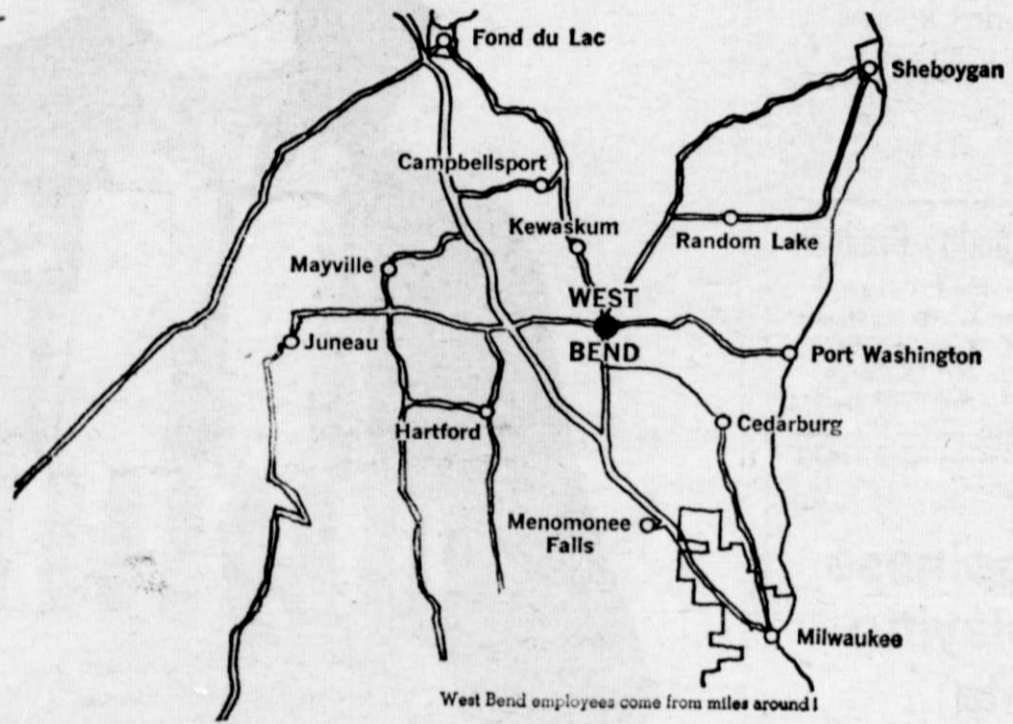

Donald Ripple Is Kiwanis Speaker

"Citizen apathy to government is a major handicap to economy," according to Donald T. Ripple, educational coordinator of the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance in Madison who spoke at a meeting of the Kewaskum Kiwanis club, Monday, Nov. 28.

"While nearly everybody talks about economy in government," Ripple said, "almost everyone suggests it begin in the other fellow's backyard, and many simply labor under the illusion that you can get something for nothing from government."

Explaining continuing increases in state government spending, the speaker pointed out that the governor received more mail about an appointment to the Committee on the United Nations than he did about the \$884 million executive budget.

"Likewise," he said, "the average legislator is apt to receive more mail about the opening of deer season than about new tax proposals."

Tracing educational costs, welfare expenditure and aids to local units of government, Ripple pointed out that much of the continuing rise in state spending is a result of legislation enacted in previous years, with built-in escalation requiring added funds from each new legislative session. As a result, state spending has been rising at a rate about twice that of the growth in our economy, he said, and the search for added taxes must be renewed every two years.

"Until a larger number of citizens became serious about economy and determine just where they want the saving made, and until we can boost our economic growth to a level consistent with our appetite for more government services, this problem is likely to confront each session of the state

legislature," Ripple said.

"More citizen interest in government, less pressure from advocates of higher spending, and a far more positive sales attitude on Wisconsin's industrial advantages are needed to solve this problem," Ripple added.

Indian Cagers Tip Germantown, Lose to Pewaukee

The Kewaskum Indians split two Scenic Moraine conference games played the past week, beating Germantown here handily Friday night, 83-69, but falling at Pewaukee Tuesday night, 62-52.

Coach Lindy DeNamur again was the recipient of big individual nights against Germantown from center Mike Miller and forward Bill Backhaus. Miller, who stormed through the Germantown defense for 19 points in the first half, heaped up 25 for the game and Backhaus chipped in with 21. Fritz paced Germantown with 15 points. After a 16-16 first quarter, the Indians went well ahead in the second period to lead at halftime, 45-33. They outpointed the Warhawks, 20-17, in the third stanza to go ahead by 15. Germantown outscored Kewaskum slightly, 19-18, in the final quarter as Coach DeNamur substituted freely. Allen Bohn kept Kewaskum on the move in their big 29 point second quarter with his nifty floor play.

The Indians' loss at Pewaukee was attributed to a poor first quarter, in which they started very slow and the Pirates jumped off to a commanding 24-6 lead. Kewaskum continued to peck away at the lead and narrowed the gap from 18 points in the first period to 10 at the final horn but couldn't overcome the big advantage. Pewaukee popped in 28 field goals

to only 17 for Kewaskum and this bit of field marksmanship spelled the difference between victory and defeat. Backhaus scored 21 points for the Indians but Miller slipped to 13. Zimmerman's 16 points were tops for Pewaukee. The Indians outscored the Pirates in the 2nd and 4th quarters.

In other Friday contests North Fondy beat Campbellsport, 85-48. Grafton whipped Random Lake, 82-59, and Slinger dispatched Pewaukee 70-65. Unbeaten defending champ Grafton and North Fondy won their third in a row Tuesday and moved on toward their anticipated first place collision Jan. 6. The Orioles paddled Germantown, 80-63, and Grafton outscored surprising Slinger, 77-69. In the other contest Campbellsport took its third straight trouncing from Random Lake, 70-56.

Tonight (Friday) the Indians are at home to undefeated Grafton, defending champion and state tournament finalists last year, who are on the rampage again this season, even with star Jeff Sewell (now on the Marquette university freshmen team) gone. This will be Kewaskum's last game until after the holidays.
