I've told people that Americans themselves are just wonderful and I sincerely believe they are the nicest people I got and will ever get in touch with."

General qualifications for a host family are as follows:

Both parents should be 37 years old, or older, and native born. They must have reared one or more children of the age level of the AFS student. All members of the family must want to have a student in the home. The AFS student must have a bed of his or her own and may share a room with another teenager but not with a child under 15. The host family is not paid for accepting the student, but may deduct up to \$50.00 monthly for U.S. income tax purposes and the home should be convenient to school. town and centers of teenage acti-






