Giles Anthony Gundrum, two year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Gundrum, R. 1, Kewaskum, died unexpectedly at his home at 4 a. m. Monday, Dec. 19. The infant had not been ill and appeared to be normal when he retired the night before.

Giles was born Jan. 1, 1965 at West Bend, the son of Lawrence and Cordelia Strupp Gundrum. Besides his parents, he is survived by nine brothers and one sister, Lawrence, Jr. of Urbana, Ill., Sharon Ann, 19, Anthony, 18, Thomas, 16, Leo, 15, Allen, 12, Joel, 10, Robert, 9, Clyde, 8, and Jeffrey, 4, all at home; one sister-in-law, Susan; one niece, Jennifer, and other relatives.

The Mass of the Angels was read for the little boy at 2 p. m. Wednesday, Dec. 21, at St. Michael's church, St. Michaels, with the Rev. I. Staskunas officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery. Visitation was at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, from 7 p. m. Tuesday until the time of services. Parish vigil was at 8:15 p. m. Tuesday.

Joseph A. Rachoner of 1616 W. Decorah rd., West Bend, died unexpectedly at his home on Friday, Dec. 16. He was a very active member of Hon-E-Kor Country club, Kewaskum, and was well known among the members. Joe would have been 50 years old on Thursday of this week.

Born at Milwaukee on Dec. 22, 1917, he grew up there and served with the U. S. Marine Corps during World War II for six years in the Pacific Theatre. After his discharge he worked in California for a short time with the Coca-Cola company. He returned to Milwaukee and for the past eight years was employed as a salesman for Mermaid Water Softening Co. Mr. and Mrs. Rachoner moved to West Bend from Menomonee Falls several months ago.

Mrs. Rachoner, the former Florence Madeska St. Clair, survives her husband. They were married at West Bend on Jan. 22, 1963. Also surviving are three step-children, Barry St. Clair, a student at Milwaukee, and Sandra and Lynda St. Clair, at home. Schlamer Accepted Into Marquette U School of Dentistry

Robert Schlamer, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Schlamer, Kewaskum, received word from the Marquette University School of Dentistry that he has been accepted by the admissions committee for the freshman class of 1967.

Bob was accepted on the basis of his high grade point average and also on the aptitude test taken in October. The test consisted of manual dexterity tests (carving), science comprehension, spatial relations, math, vocabulary and science aptitude. The test was administered at the dental school.

Another important pre-acceptance requirement is that three recommendation forms—one from a biology teacher, one from a chemistry teacher and one from a physics teacher—be filled out and returned. Upon acceptance Bob had to have a recommendation from Father Budde confirming his active participation in the Catholic faith.

The time spent in dental school is four years. About three quarters of this time is spent in laboratory work. The other one-fourth is spent in the classroom.

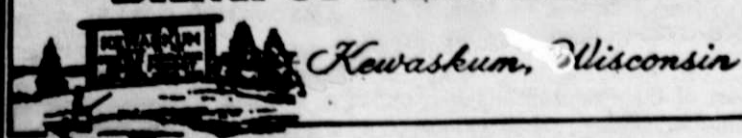

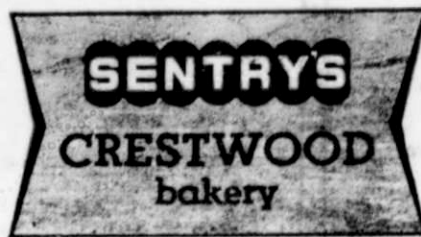

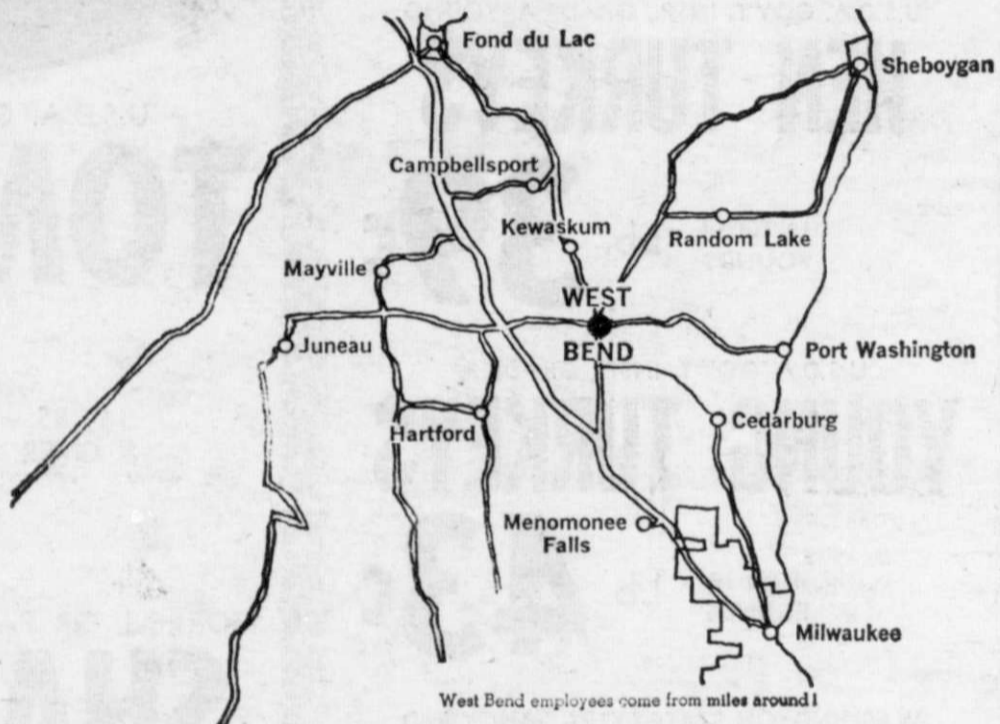
