

Clerk Announces Town of Auburn Tax Rate for '66

COMPARES CAMPBELLSPORT. LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Lee A. Anderson, clerk of the town of Auburn. has announced the tax rate for the township on taxes for the year 1966. The town of Auburn is comprised of two school districts: 1. Campbellsport Joint School District No. 23, and 2. Kewaskum Community Schools. Joint District No. 2.

The total valuation of the township, as assessed by the local assessor is \$2,498,455. The Campbellsport school district valuation is \$1,548,950 and Kewaskum school district valuation is \$949,505.

The total valuation of the township in 1965 was \$2,457,512, which is only an increase in the entire township of just less than \$41,000. The Campbellsport school district valuation gained nearly \$49.000 over 1965 but the Kewaskum school district lost in valuation approximately \$8,000 compared to 1965.






