\$40,000 Damage Caused by Fire at Campbellsport Co.

BLAZE AT ELWING FACTORY SATURDAY

Fire of undetermined origin Saturday noon damaged much of the contents and interior of the Elwing Manufacturing Co. plant at Campbellsport. Damage at the factory, which manufactures domestic and industrial brooms, was estimated at from \$40,000 to \$45,000.

The fire apparently started in an incinerator at the rear of the building. It was discovered at about 12:15 p. m. by Gloria Steinacker, a neighbor who lives across the street from the building at 221 N. Railroad st.

William Elwing, one of the company officers, who visited the plant 45 minutes earlier, reported no evidence of a blaze at that time.

Firemen were hampered in efforts to control the blaze by unusually heavy, black smoke resulting from burning broom straw, a large amount of which was stored in the building. Heavy duty fans were used to clear the building of smoke. Firemen also were forced to wear masks in fighting the flames. They brought the fire under control in about one hour. The building was closed for the weekend at the time of the fire.

In addition to the broom straw, the flames damaged the roof, windows, wiring and some machinery. A member of the Elwing family said that it would be at least several weeks before the damage could be repaired sufficiently to resume operations.

The Elwing Co. is one of the largest manufacturers of domestic and industrial brooms in the United States. It employs between 25 and 30 highly skilled workers, many of whom originally came from out of state. An Elwing spokesman said that none of these employees will lose any work as a result of the fire.

The entire work force was to have been on its Christmas vacation this week. A number of workers, however, are now helping rehabilitate the building. These employees will take their vacations later, when other workers will help put the plant back in order.

The firm was established by the late Fred Elwing about 30 years ago. It is now being run by his sons, Stuart Elwing, Campbellsport, and William Elwing, R. 3, Campbellsport.

Youth Hurt When Car Hits Bridge, Auto Hits Train

Patrick Reilly, 17, 320 Washington st., Campbellsport, was injured and the car he was driving was demolished when it collided with a Chicago and North Western Railway passenger train in Campbellsport at 11:25 a. m. Christmas Day.

Reilly was removed to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, with multiple bruises and possible internal injuries.

The accident occurred at the West Main st. crossing near the business district when Reilly, who apparently didn't see the approaching train, drove into the side of the locomotive. The vehicle then bounced against the first coach and was dragged about 80 feet.

Reilly, who remained in the car, was able to get out by himself and was standing by the wrecked vehicle when aid arrived.

The train, which stops at Campbellsport when it has passengers for that village, was moving at a faster rate of speed since no local passengers were aboard at the time.

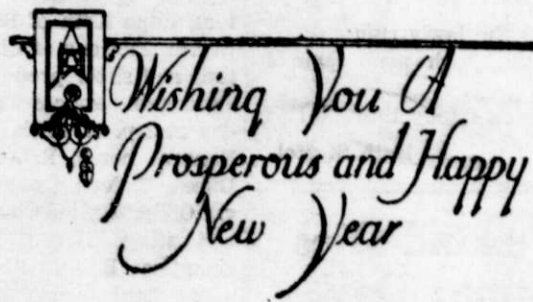
Jr. Woman's Club to Sponsor Cerebral Palsy Fund Drive

Clerk Announces Town of Auburn Tax Rate for '66

COMPARES CAMPBELLSPORT, LOCAL SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Lee A. Anderson, clerk of the town of Auburn, has announced the tax rate for the township on taxes for the year 1966. The town of Auburn is comprised of two school districts: 1. Campbellsport Joint School District No. 23, and 2. Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2.

The total valuation of the township, as assessed by the local assessor is \$2,498,455. The Campbellsport school district valuation is \$1,548,950 and Kewaskum school district valuation is \$949,505.

The total valuation of the township in 1965 was \$2,457,512, which is only an increase in the entire township of just less than \$41,000. The Campbellsport school district valuation gained nearly \$49,000 over 1965 but the Kewaskum school district lost in valuation approximately \$8,000 compared to 1965.

A good portion of the town of Auburn lies in the Wisconsin state recreational area, with over 5,000 acres in state land.

The township has lowered its tax from 5 mills in 1965 to 4 mills in 1966.

These tax rates are eased somewhat by a \$3.24 per thousand credit on real estate and "B" personal property. The state tax credit on "A" personal property is 60 per cent.

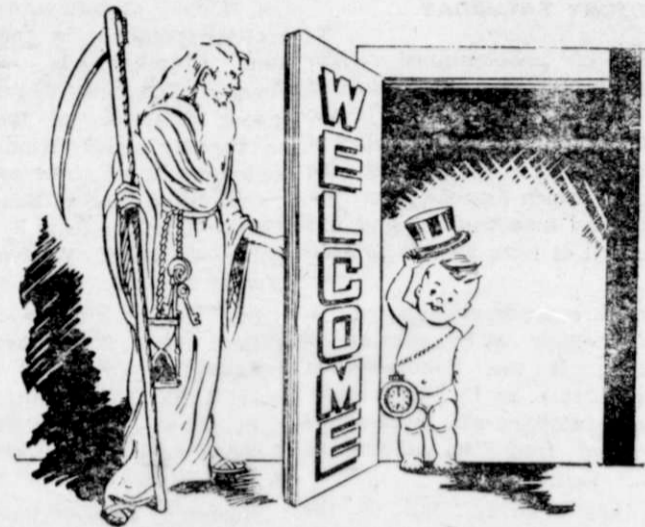
Reindl's family lives at R. 2, Kewaskum. and Miller's family resides at R. 1, Kewaskum.
