Blaze Destroys Farm Home; Regal Ware Has Fire

AUTO BURNS IN THIRD FIRE CALL THIS WEEK

It has been a busy week for the Kewaskum firemen, who were called out twice during the severe blizzard Monday night and answered a third call in sub-zero weather early Wednesday even-

Fire completely destroyed the farm home on the Furlong sisters farm about eight miles north of Kewaskum Monday night. All the home's furnishings were also destroyed and Mrs. Daisy Furlong Long, one of the owners, and Lewis Bettendorf, the hired man. escaped with only what they could take with them. Mrs. Long also managed to save some official pa-

· Cause of the blaze, discovered about 10 p. m., is thought to be an overheated wood-burning furnace. Because of the drifting snow firemen from Campbellsport found it difficult to reach the farm, which is located at the intersection of Hwy, 67 and County

Fanned by high winds, the fire arrived. When the Campbellsport firemen ran low on water and in an effort to save the other nearby buildings, they summoned the aid of the Kewaskum department at about 10:35 p. m. Local firemen responded with one fire truck, the equipment and tanker trucks and had to buck snowdrifts all the way to reach the scene.

After towing the tanker truck out of a snowdrift in which it was stuck, local firemen immediately went to work with their water, wetting down and help saving nearby buildings. Fire Dept. Answered 14 Calls in '66

HONOR KOERBLE AT BANQUET FOR 25 YEARS AS SECRETARY

Members of the Kewaskum fire department answered 14 fire calls during the year 1966, according to Chief Armin Oppermann. Of this number only five calls were in the village, while the remaining nine were in the rural areas. This record speaks well for residents of the village.

Fourteen calls in a year, an average of better than only one a month, is not a large number considering the area covered by the fire department. The department has already answered three calls in 1967, all of them this week. The two most serious fires in 1966 were the Don Reitzel blaze near St. Kilian on Oct. 1 and the Leland Oelke fire in Kewaskum on Dec. 30. In both of these blazes the homes were gutted by flames.

Oddly, the firemen received the most calls during the month of July, in the middle of summer.

The volunteer department held its annual banquet for active and retired members, wives, friends and guests at the Glacier Inn Saturday night. A fine turkey and Swiss steak dinner was enjoyed by the close to 100 persons in attendance. Assistant Chief William Martin served as toastmasten.
