## Blaze Destroys Farm Home; Regal Ware Has Fire

AUTO BURNS IN THIRD FIRE CALL THIS WEEK

It has been a busy week for the Kewaskum firemen, who were called out twice during the severe blizzard Monday night and answered a third call in sub-zero weather early Wednesday evening.

Fire completely destroyed the farm home on the Furlong sisters farm about eight miles north of Kewaskum Monday night. All the home's furnishings were also destroyed and Mrs. Daisy Furlong Long, one of the owners, and Lewis Bettendorf, the hired man, escaped with only what they could take with them. Mrs. Long also managed to save some official papers.

Cause of the blaze, discovered about 10 p. m., is thought to be an overheated wood-burning furnace. Because of the drifting snow firemen from Campbellsport found it difficult to reach the farm, which is located at the intersection of Hwy. 67 and County Trunk SS in the town of Auburn.

Fanned by high winds, the fire made rapid progress, and the roof had caved in by the time firemen arrived. When the Campbellsport firemen ran low on water and in an effort to save the other nearby buildings, they summoned the aid of the Kewaskum department at about 10:35 p. m. Local firemen responded with one fire truck, the equipment and tanker trucks and had to buck snowdrifts all the way to reach the scene.

After towing the tanker truck out of a snowdrift in which it was stuck, local firemen immediately went to work with their water, wetting down and help saving nearby buildings. It was one of the most miserable nights the firemen ever experienced in fighting a fire. Winds estimated at 60 to 70 miles an hour were whipping the snow with blinding fury and at times visibility was zero as the snow piled up in huge drifts. Some vehicles (including those of firemen driving to the fire station) had to come to a complete stop right in the road because the drivers couldn't see where they were going. A Fond du Lac county snowplow and a town of Auburn snowplow, aided by a Fond du Lac county squad car, kept on plowing open the roads at the scene of the fire so that fire equipment could get in and out.

Despite the firemen's efforts, the building was completely leveled. Kewaskum firemen got back to the fire station about 12:30 a. m. while Campbellsport firemen remained at the scene until 3:30 a. m. No other buildings were damaged.

Mrs. Long and Bettendorf spent the night at the home of her nephew, Melvin Furlong. They are now living at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Wayne Scheid in West Bend. No estimate of the damages is available.

### Fire at Regal Ware Plant

Earlier Monday evening, at 6:30 o'clock, the firemen answered a call to Regal Ware, Inc., where a fire in one of the large buffing machines caused about \$200 dam-

## Regal Ware, Inc. Display Is Lost In Chicago Fire

Regal Ware, Inc. of Kewaskum, along with the West Bend Company, both lost valuable displays in the disastrous fire which destroyed the McCormick Place exposition center on Chicago's lakefront early Monday.

A new 60 foot, two story high display of The West Bend Company, which was to be shown for the first time at the National Housewares Manufacturers association convention scheduled to open Monday was believed entirely destroyed with an estimated loss of approximately \$35,000.

The Regal Ware display set up for the convention was also believed entirely destroyed. It was also valued at \$35,000.

The exhibits of the two Washington county firms were among the outstanding displays of Wisconsin manufacturers entered in the exposition. Only a few other exhibits entered by state manufacturers exceeded the area entrants in value. Numerous other state firms also lost displays in the disastrous fire, which almost entirely destroyed the giant Chicago convention center and all exhibits. The entire loss in the fire was estimated as high as \$120 to \$140 million.

## Fire Dept. Answered 14 Calls in '66

HONOR KOERBLE AT BANQUET FOR 25 YEARS AS SECRETARY

Members of the Kewaskum fire department answered 14 fire calls during the year 1966, according to Chief Armin Oppermann. Of this number only five calls were in the village, while the remaining nine were in the rural areas. This record speaks well for residents of the village.

Fourteen calls in a year, an average of better than only one a month, is not a large number considering the area covered by the fire department. The department has already answered three calls in 1967, all of them this week. The two most serious fires in 1966 were the Don Reitzel blaze near St. Kilian on Oct. 1 and the Leland Oelke fire in Kewaskum on Dec. 30. In both of these blazes the homes were gutted by flames.

Oddly, the firemen received the most calls during the month of July, in the middle of summer.

The volunteer department held its annual banquet for active and retired members, wives, friends and guests at the Glacier Inn Saturday night. A fine turkey and Swiss steak dinner was enjoyed by the close to 100 persons in attendance. Assistant Chief William Martin served as toastmaster.

George Koerble was honored at the banquet for 25 years of continuous and faithful service as secretary of the department. He was presented with a three-piece pen and pencil set by the department.

Among the guests honored was a former member of the department (who now lives outside of the village at R. 2, Kewaskum), Leroy Keller, Jr., a scuba diver who serves the department. He was cited for recovering the body of Joe Farkis of 2132 E. Bertens Ave., Chicago, who drowned in Lake Seven about seven miles northeast of Kewaskum on Sept. 10. The rescue squad of the local fire department responded to that call and Keller's services were sought when weeds and mud in the lake hampered recovery efforts of the squad.

Farkis was fishing alone in a boat when witnesses on shore saw him fall overboard. By the time would-be rescuers in a boat reached the spot, he had disappeared beneath the surface. Keller recovered the body several hours later from about seven feet of water.

Entertainment at the banquet was provided by Richard Mehring of West Bend, whose mother, (the former Margaret Miller), is a Kewaskum native. Richard is employed at the Main st. office of Regal Ware's four offices in Kewaskum. Mehring, who bills himself as "the world's second greatest magician," provided magic and mirth with his slight-of-hand artistry, and was well received by the audience.

A howling blizzard struck this area Monday with winds gusting to 60 to 70 miles an hour and piling the snow into huge drifts, blocking streets and roads, causing postponement of events, closing schools and endangering visibility. 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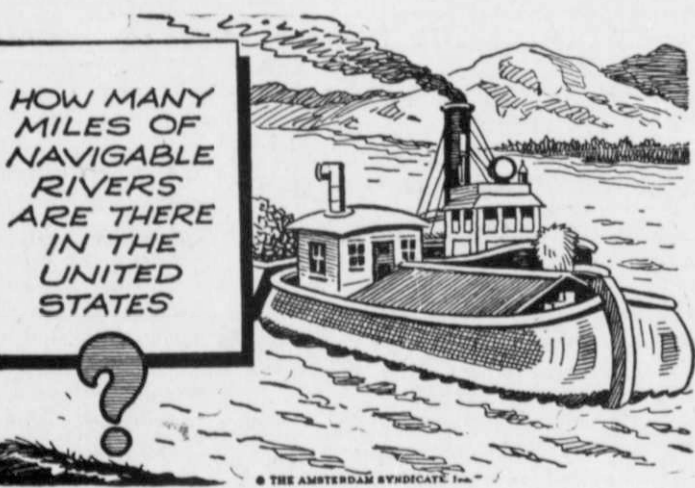
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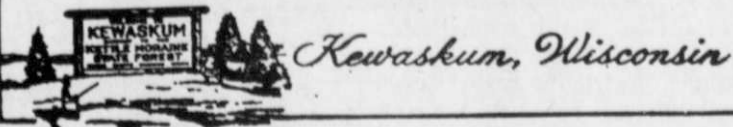

age. When firemen arrived the blaze had been nearly extinguished by the automatic sprinkler system in the plant.

The fire started in the motor of the buffer. Damage was confined mainly to the motors on the machine. Some minor damage from water and smoke was caused to the stock. Production at the plant resumed within an hour.

Regal Ware, the community's largest industry, is a manufacturer of cookware employing about 700 persons.

Urai's home is in the city of Nakhon, Ratchasima, about 268 miles northeast of Bangkok, the capital. Siam, the former name for Thailand, was populated by the migration of people from China. Urai's family also came from China. Thailand, meaning "the land of freedom, peace and happiness," has never been ruled by any other country in Asia. It has a centralized government with king and queen as head and they are held in high regard similar to England's royalty. There are also the legislative, executive and judicial branches making it similar to our system. The government controls many of the schools and factories and most of the trade is done with China and the United States.

The Thai language is adopted from Pali and Sanskrit and has 32 vowels. Urai claims it is more difficult than the English language which she speaks very well. She also has a command of French and is learning Spanish now.

Thailand is a tropical country and although the cold season is usually 55-65 degrees, Urai is enjoying our blustery winter. Due to the very hot weather the country produces much rice, flour, sugar cane, rubber and other forest products.

Urai finds Americans very friendly people who do some things differently, use knife, fork and spoon as opposed to chop sticks, are Christians as opposed to Buddhists, wear street clothes

to school as opposed to uniforms, have a free choice in dating as opposed to parental arrangements, use machines as opposed to elephants—but the Beatles are universal.

A Thai dance done to native music brought the program to a close, after which items of art and literature from her country were on display for the members and their guests.

Miss Kornvithaysilp attended the meeting with her American mother and sisters, Mrs. D. N. Koerble and Mary and Susan Koerble.

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### School Chest for Vietnam Packed By Students Here

**CHEST WILL BE GIVEN TO REFUGEE CHILDREN**

Student Council members of the Kewaskum Community High school packed a school chest which was sent to Vietnam to be given to refugee children. The chest was shipped via motor transportation to Jersey City, New Jersey, to Pier 9 to be loaded on the USS president Taft.

In response to a request by the United States Agency for Independent Development in Vietnam, the American Red Cross through Youth Service is providing school chests for 234 classrooms being built to accommodate two shifts of refugee children per classroom.

The chest contains all new items and is filled exactly according to a list forwarded by the AID teams. It is valued at \$100.00. The entire student body at Kewaskum high school participated by donating

money used to supply the materials.

Contents include pencils, tablets, drawing paper, erasers, crayons, rulers, compasses, protractors, pocket combs, toothbrushes, scissors, pencil sharpeners, and other useful school and grooming equipment. All items are based on a survey of needs made by members of the AID teams in Vietnam.

The Kewaskum chest is one of the 600 chests made by schools across the country for distribution in Vietnam, according to Ernest Mitchell, principal.

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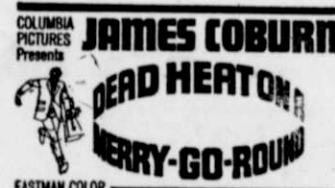

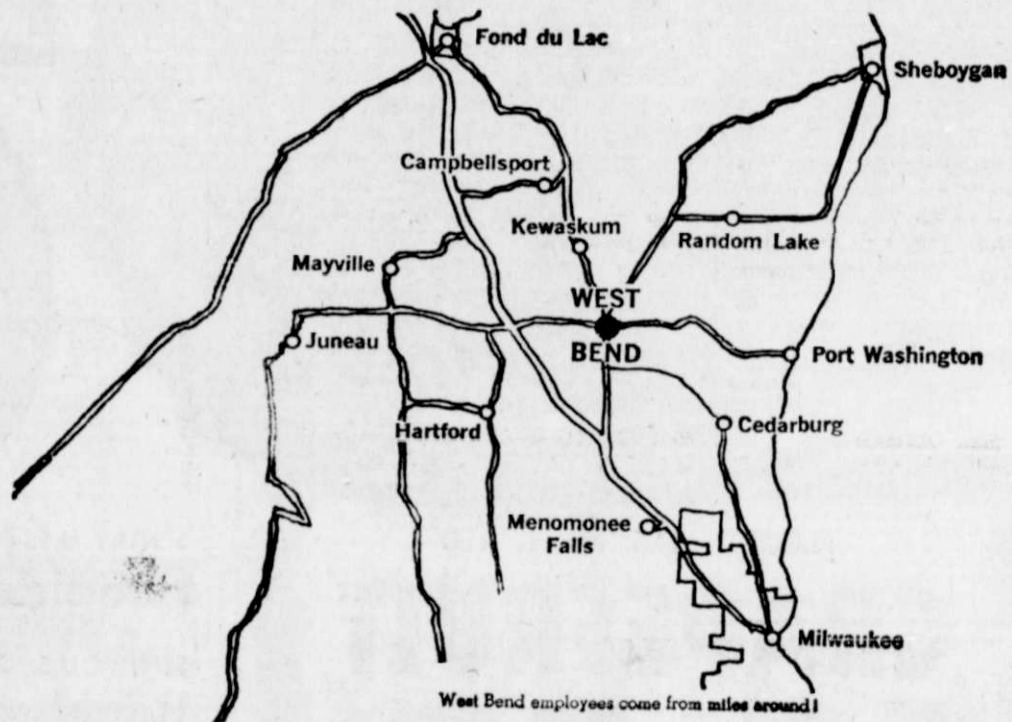

The Kewaskum evening agriculture classes will hold two special meetings next week. Roy Esser, ag instructor at the high school, reports.

On Tuesday evening, Jan. 24, at 8:15, at the Kewaskum Frozen Foods plant, a meeting for farmers interested in feeder pig production and finishing hogs will be held. The meeting will show the results of a project conducted by Dick Hellen, a member of the Kewaskum FFA.

Six feeder pigs were started in two groups consisting of three correct type and three poor type feeder pigs. The pigs were weighed every 28 days. Feed conversion and rate of gain were charted on the two groups. The carcasses will be discussed as well as cost of production, correct feeding and correct type.

The second meeting will be held Thursday, Jan. 26, at 8:15 p. m. at the Kewaskum High school ag room. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the new weed control recommendations. The group will also discuss the alfalfa insect problems.

All interested farmers of the area are invited to these meetings.

## Fr. Trayser Named Brotherhood Week Chairman in County

The Very Reverend Larry J. Trayser, West Bend, has been named Washington county chairman for the 1967 Brotherhood Week Observance.

The appointment of Father Trayser was announced by Richard A. Klumb, West Bend, who is Brotherhood Week chairman for District I, in which Washington county is located.

Father Trayser, an Episcopal priest, is vicar of St. James, West Bend, and St. Aidan's, Hartford, parishes, and is in charge of new mission work in the Port Washington area. He is dean in the Episcopal diocese of Milwaukee, and is chairman of the Clergymen's association in West Bend.

The Hon. Nathan S. Heffernan, associate justice of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, Madison, is State

Brotherhood Week chairman for 1967. Serving with him as state vice-chairmen are: District Attorney John H. Chisholm of Superior; Attorney Fred W. Genrich, Jr. of Wausau; George Howden of Appleton; Attorney V. J. Lucareli of Kenosha; Attorney Maurice B. Pasch of Madison; Angus B. Rothwell, Madison, and Ben Sadoff of Fond du Lac.

Brotherhood Week will be observed nationally as well as in Washington county the week of Feb. 19-26, and has been sponsored annually since 1934 by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. The purposes of the observance are:

To give people an opportunity to rededicate themselves as individuals to the basic ideals of respect for people and human rights which are essential to our way of life; to dramatize the practical things which people can do to promote an understanding and realization of these ideals, and to enlist the support of a large number of people in the year-round activities of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, aimed at building brotherhood.

Commenting on his appointment, Father Trayser said: "All weeks are equally in need of the practice of brotherhood. However, the week of Washington's birthday has been set aside as a time of resolution to sustain brotherhood throughout the year. This can and should be done without seeking a joining of religious

bodies, without modifying the distinctive beliefs of Protestants, Catholics and Jews, and without weakening the loyalties of those of any faith."

Father Trayser stressed the fact that this is not a civil-rights movement, stating that: "We hope to increase the involvement of the people of Washington county in the Brotherhood Movement, not as a civil-rights movement as such. If brotherhood were practiced the year around on both sides of the civil rights question, there would be no questions that would need to be answered."

A Washington county committee, to direct Brotherhood activities will be announced soon.
