New \$325,000 T. Farmington School Opens

150 PUPILS AT SCHOOL
IN KEWASKUM DISTRICT

Now a part of Kewaskum Community Schools Joint District No. 2, the doors of the new \$325,000 Farmington Elementary school opened Tuesday for some 150 students ranging from kindergarten through eighth grade. The school, a one-story, brick structure building, is located about six miles east of Kewaskum in the town of Farmington.

Construction of the school was begun early last year after plans were approved the year before when the Farmington school district operated independently and had three schools in three locations in its district—Fillmore, Boltonville and Orchard Grove. These schools will be disposed of by the Kewaskum Community School District and all students will now attend the new school.

When the 1967-68 school year begins next September, however, the seventh and eighth grade pupils will be transferred to the Kewaskum Elementary school, along with all other seventh and eighth graders in the new district.

Most of the equipment that was in use in the three old schools will be used in the new building and was moved there Monday. There were no classes for the students that day.

The new building has eight classrooms which provide for a student capacity of 175. The kindergarten area is large and could easily be divided to provide a ninth classroom, according to Marshall Boyd, superintendent of Kewaskum schools.

In the new school, a warm shade of beige predominates the color scheme with accent from brighter hues. The building is equipped with a serving kitchen and the gymnasium doubles as a cafeteria. For the present food will be prepared in the kitchen of the Beechwood school about six miles away and will be transported daily in portable ovens. The hot lunch program will not begin for several weeks as the kitchen area is not quite complete. In the meantime the two women who will be employed in the Farmington serving kitchen on a part-time basis will be trained in the hot lunch kitchen at Kewaskum High school.

The school has oil burning hot water type heat. Curtis Kittelson is principal and also teaches the seventh and eighth grades.

Town Wayne 7th, 8th Graders Transfer to Kewaskum School

Eighteen seventh and eight eighth grade pupils of the Wayne Elementary school on Monday were transferred to the Kewaskum Elementary school. They are transported here daily by bus.

The Wayne school, together with the Beechwood and Farmington schools, was consolidated with the Kewaskum Elementary school and high school into a K-12 district on July 1, 1966. At the start of the 1967-68 school year all 7th and 8th graders from the three outlying schools will be transferred here. The shift of Wayne pupils (Continued on page 2)

Chief Aviation Machinist Mate Jet, Francis J. Kougl, U. S. Navy, has been assigned to the Navy Recruiting Branch Station, located in the post office building, Marquette, Mich. He will report for duty upon completion of Recruit Procurement School at Naval Training Center, San Diego, Calif., and will be active in recruiting eligible young men and women for the U. S. Navy.

Chief Kougl is a veteran of 20 years naval service. During this time he has been assigned to various units operating in both the Atlantic and Pacific areas as well as throughout the United States. Since 1960, he has been assigned to VAH-8, VAH-123, VAH-2 and VAH-4, Heavy Attack Squadrons, home based at Naval Air Station, Whidbey Island, Wash., flying twin jet, A3B Skywarrior, Heavy Attack Bombers.

While serving with VAH-2 aboard the Attack Carrier USS Coral Sea, the squadron was awarded the Navy Unit Commendation for action during the Viet Nam conflict. In addition to the Navy Unit Commendation, Chief Kougl has received decorations from the United States, United Nations and the Republic of Viet Nam. 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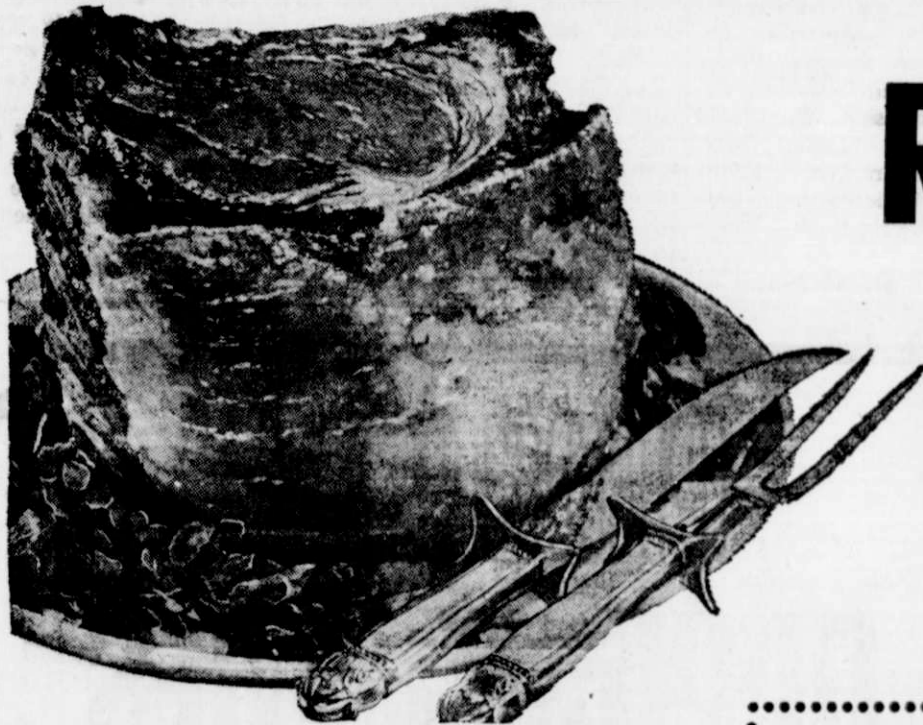
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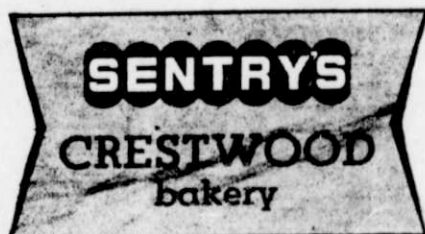
