Family of Five Routed by Night Fire Which Guts Farm Residence

FIREMEN FIGHT BLAZE AT MYERS HOME 4 HOURS IN 11 BELOW ZERO WEATHER

Fire routed a family of five from their rural home two miles west of Kewaskum Saturday night and they fled without any belongings as the blaze gutted their farm residence.

Mrs. Eva Myers and her four children were awakened by passing motorists, Mr. and Mrs. John Milewski of Wayne, who were driving past at about 9:40 p. m. and saw flames shooting from the roof at the rear of the home. They stopped and informed Mrs. Myers, who had just gone to bed, and helped to get out the children, including 9-year-old twins, who were asleep downstairs. The alarm was then given.

The Myers occupied a farm home owned by Lee Honeck of 627 Main st. in Kewaskum, located on the corner of Hwy. H and CTH B. It is a two-story frame structure.

Kewaskum firemen who were called to the scene reported that the blaze started in the chimney area of a one-story attachment at the rear of the home, where there was a coal and wood-burning stove. The fire apparently started from an overheated stove or possibly sparks from the chimney.

The entire farm residence was gutted by the fire. Smoke and flames prevented the family from re-entering the house to save any of their belongings. The one-story section of the home was destroyed and although the two-story section remained, the flames, smoke and water made it a total loss. No estimate of the damage was made available.

Firemen from Kewaskum fought the blaze for about four hours, remaining at the scene until 1:45 a. m. Sunday in a futile attempt to save the building. Due to the fact that 20 of the firemen (four teams) were bowling that evening in the Badger Firemen's association tournament at Thiensville, the department was short-handed and the Kohlsville department was also summoned to assist in fighting the blaze. They responded promptly and were of considerable help. The Washington County Sheriff's Department called the Thiensville bowling alleys to notify the firemen of the serious blaze but by that time most of the firemen had already left and were on the highway or at some other place. Honeck, the owner of the home, was still at the alleys and rushed home immediately after being called.

Two local firemen suffered minor injuries. Harry Koch injured an ankle and suffered from frost bite and Harold Boettcher incurred a cut hand and narrowly escaped being overcome by smoke. Smoke masks were worn by the firemen to enter the smoke-filled building and get at the source of the flames.

More than 20 local firemen battled the blaze and received fine cooperation from the county sheriff's department. Besides notifying the firemen in Thiensville, two county officers also stayed to help out firemen. David Backhaus sta-

Joe Eberle Dies, Nationally Known Raiser of Beagles

WAS RETIRED TAVERNKEEPER AND VILLAGE BOARD MEMBER

Joseph Eberle, 77, widely known retired Kewaskum tavernkeeper and former village board member, who was nationally known for the outstanding beagle hounds he raised over the years which won honors in shows and trials throughout the nation, died suddenly Friday evening, Feb. 10, at his home at 326 First st. of a heart attack.

Joe was very active in the Badger Beagle and Wisconsin Beagle clubs and served as president of the Wisconsin Beagle club for many years, being reelected to that office consistently. He gained national recognition for his dogs which consistently won top honors and championships at beagle shows and field trials. Joe's dogs won scores of trophies and ribbons and he became nationally known for his activities in the beagle clubs and shows and was well known by beagle fanciers and club members as a breeder of championship beagles. For many years the annual field trials and shows of the Wisconsin Beagle club were held in Kewaskum and area with headquarters at Eberle's kennels.

During his many years in the tavern business, Joe was an ardent sportsman and his tavern was headquarters for beagle raisers, hunters, fishermen, baseball players and other sportsmen. Joe was also very active and instrumental in organization and operation of the old Badger State Baseball league, a strong organization in which Kewaskum won several championships.

Mr. Eberle was a retired member of the Kewaskum village board, a veteran of World War I and a member of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion of Kewaskum as well as a member of the Milwaukee Badger and Wisconsin Beagle clubs.

He was born Dec. 25, 1889, in Milwaukee, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Eberle, Sr. and was a resident of Kewaskum most of his life. His marriage to the former Caroline Flasz took place on Sept. 12, 1922, at Holy Hill.

Surviving are his widow, a daughter Loraine (Mrs. Joseph Slesar) of 289 Vine st., West Bend, his son-in-law, two grandsons, Peter and John Slesar, other relatives and a host of friends.

Funeral services were conducted at 9:30 a. m. Tuesday, Feb. 14, of Holy Trinity Catholic church with the Rev. John Budde officiating. Burial took place in the new Holy Trinity cemetery. Visitation was at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Monday. Military services were conducted at the graveside.

Tea Held for Senior Girls, Mothers



Miss Jane D. Swan, Dean of Women at Carroll College, was the speaker at the annual Kewaskum Woman's club tea on Saturday, Feb. 11, honoring the senior girls of Kewaskum High school and their mothers. She had a message of interest for each of the girls, whether she intended to be married after graduation, begin working outside the home, or go to college to further her education.

The American woman today plays a more important role in our society than ever before said Dean Swan. One-half of the high school graduates continue their education with women composing

one-third of today's working force. They are as competent intellectually as men and are more motivated scholastically to achieve top grades. Today there is 100 times more to learn than in 1900 and there will be 1,000 times more in the year 2000. The average number of years a woman is employed outside the home is 25 and three out of five of these women are married with one-half finding it financially necessary.

Statistics show the woman is marrying at a younger age and will probably have her last child by age 28. This leaves a good share of her life available for job

employment and leisure time.
