## Niles Erickson Qualifies for State Wrestling Meet Finals

WINS 165-POUND SECTIONAL CROWN AT PORT WASHINGTON

Senior Niles Erickson of Kewaskum High school is the first wrestler of the Scenic Moraine conference who has ever qualified for the state wrestling tournament finals. He won the 165-pound sectional meet crown at Port Washington last weekend, advancing him to the state finals.

Niles, who has an excellent 25-1 record this season, will face Jim Gebhard of Bosobel in his first match at Madison today (Friday). He has a glossy overall record in his two years of competition of 38

bouts won and only 3 lost. Erickson's only defeat this season was to Jerry Schultz of Watertown in a triple dual meet at Watertown earlier in the season.

This is only the second year of wrestling for the Kewaskum Indians, coached by Joe Harlow, and the team has established a fine record against strong competition. Kewaskum qualified three wrestlers in the WIAA sectional at Port as the result of the success in the regional meet at Milwaukee Marshall the weekend before. The Indians placed fourth in the Milwaukee regional with 44 points, behind Marshall, Milwaukee Washington and Germantown. But they defeated such large schools as Milwaukee Custer, Milwaukee North, West Bend, Homestead and Cedarburg.

Kewaskum placed 11th out of 31 schools, nearly all larger schools, in the Port sectional last weekend. The 19 schools who placed were: Waukesha 35, Fond du Lac 34, Shorewood 34, Brookfield East 33, Milwaukee Rufus King 30, New Berlin 28, New Holstein 25, Milwaukee Marshall 22, West Bend 22, Milwaukee Washington 21, Kewaskum 13, Brown Deer 12, Nicolet 12, Wawatosa East 11, Port Washington 11, Hamilton 9, Menomonee Falls 9, Milwaukee Riverside 6, Whitefish Bay 3.

Erickson qualified for the state meet by defeating three opponents in the sectional tourney at Port. On Friday he beat Randy Johnson of Sheboygan South, on Saturday he pinned Tom Watry of Port (Braveland conference champion at 165 pounds), and in the finals he beat Bill Voss of Fond du Lac, 4-3.

Niles won four championships this season, the Mayville Invitational, in which he pinned three

opponents; the Scenic Moraine conference title; the regional tournament at Milwaukee Marshall, in which he pinned three opponents, and the sectional tournament at Port, in which he beat the three above mentioned opponents.

Besides winning four titles, he also set two other records. Niles is the first wrestler in the Scenic Moraine conference to win in sectional competition and the first wrestler to represent Kewaskum High school and the Scenic Moraine in the state meet. There are now just 16 boys left in each weight class out of 300 who started in tournament competition. Niles is one of only eight sectional winners across the state of Wisconsin.

State competition will be held this Friday and Saturday, Feb. 24 and 25, at the University of Wisconsin Field House in Madison. Friday's bouts will start at 12:30 and 7:30 p. m. Saturday's semifinals will start at 9:30 a. m. and the finals will be held at 2 p. m.

The many schoolmates and friends of Niles wish him the best of luck in the state meet.

Paul Reindl of Kewaskum also competed in the sectional at Port. He lost out in a 4-2 decision handed to him by Schroeder of Hamilton High of Sussex in a 133-pound bout, one of the toughest weight classes in the tournament.

## Chas. Raether, 91, Of Village Dies

Charles Ferdinand Raether, 91, well known resident of 224 Main st., Kewaskum, one of the oldest residents of this village, passed away on Wednesday, Feb. 22, at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, where he had been a patient for the past three weeks.

Mr. Raether was born in Pomerania, Germany, on Oct. 14, 1875, and came to America 84 years ago. He had been a resident of the Kewaskum area ever since that time and lived in this village for the past 46 years. A former factory employee, he had been retired for many years.

Up to the time of his last illness, Mr. Raether was very active for his age and was able to take his daily walks around town. He was interested in the history and growth of Kewaskum and had an avid memory of events which occurred and progress that was made through the years. More so in his younger years, he was also an ardent baseball fan and follower of Kewaskum athletic teams.

His marriage to the former Anna Mueller took place at St. Matthew's church, Campbellsport, on Nov. 21, 1899, and she preceded him in death many years ago, on Dec. 21, 1921. Surviving are one daughter, Frances (Mrs. John Pan Blarcom) of Kewaskum; one grandson, Jay Van Blarcom, of Cedarburg, and four great-grandchildren. His parents, three brothers, one sister and his son-in-law, John Van Blarcom, predeceased him.

Visitation will be at Miller's funeral home from 4 p. m. today (Friday). Funeral services will be conducted at 9:30 a. m. Saturday from the funeral home and at 10 a. m. at Holy Trinity church, with the Rev. John T. Budde officiating. Interment will be in the Holy Trinity cemetery.

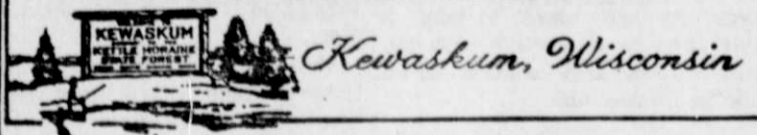

## Eagle Scout Kreif Submits Report on Badger Council to Gov. Knowles

Eagle Scout Thomas Kreif, 16, of West Bend participated in ceremonies with Governor Warren P. Knowles Feb. 9 at the Capitol in Madison marking the 57th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America. Scout Kreif reported on behalf of the Badger Council that there are 2,938 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorers in 108 units in the area served by the Badger Council. He told Gov. Knowles that local Scouts are particularly proud of their 1966 record in the following achievements and events:

Thirteen boys attained the rank of Eagle Scout. The Eagle Scout banquet was held with 82 persons attending. Training courses were held for 263 adults. A Cub Scout Lad and Dad day was held at Camp Shaginappi with 236 attending. During the past year several Camporees were held with 450 boys and adults participating. There were three Council Explorer units that aided local officials in vehicle safety checks. One Explorer unit specialized in doing local conservation projects and trail development in the Nicolet National Forest. The past year has been very exciting and most pleasing for those in Badger Council. Following his report Tom was presented with an autographed Wisconsin Blue Book by Gov. Knowles.

Tom was accompanied by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Kreif, and Alan Kieckafer of West Bend, who is the finance chairman of the Marsh Moraine District and troop committee chairman of Troop 80, sponsored by the Methodist Men's club.

Scout Kreif is the Junior Assis-

tant Scoutmaster of Troop 80, a junior at West Bend High school, is a band and Latin club member, and is active in church choir and fellowship groups of Immanuel United Church of Christ. He is a member of the honorary camping society, "The Order of the Arrow" and is the co-chairman of the Unit Election committee for that organization. At the present he is employed as a page at the West Bend Public Library.

Tom states this report to the governor was a most rewarding experience.

At a luncheon following the ceremonies, Gov. Knowles congratulated the Scouts on their accomplishments, and the people of Wisconsin for their interest in the Scout Movement. He pointed out that the volunteer spirit is strong in our state, and that many leaders are making a very effective contribution to the future of the nation in helping to shape the lives of more than 100,000 Scouts in our

state. Eagle Scout David I. Chmerow of Kenosha, representing all of the Scouts of Wisconsin, presented a special Scout paper weight to the governor, thanking him for his leadership in the Scouting program.

The 16 Eagle Scouts, representing each of the councils in Wisconsin, were taken on a tour of the State Capitol. Brief conferences were held with Senator Ernest C. Keppler and Supreme Court Justice E. Harold Hallows.

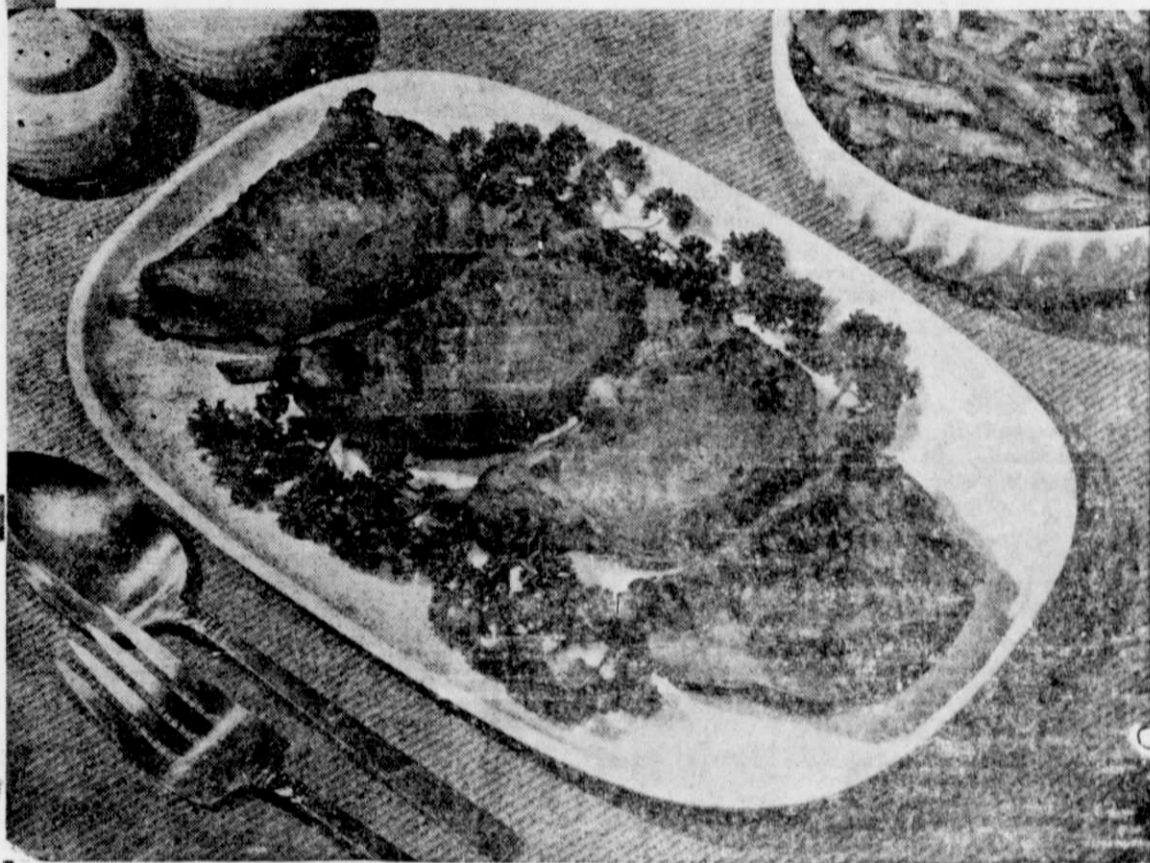

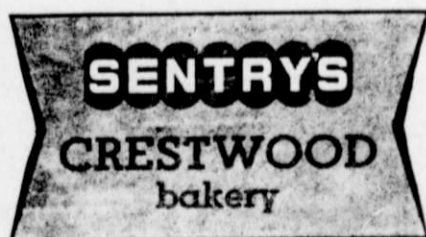

## Indians Downed By Slinger, 88-76

Fouls and free throws enabled the Slinger Owls to forge ahead in the final quarter and defeat Kewaskum in the last home game Friday, 88-76. The loss left the fifth place Indians with a 4-9 record and gave the fourth place Owls just the opposite of 9-4.

The officials called them extremely close and turned the game into one of free throws instead of baskets. An unbelievable total of 64 personal fouls were called, 33 on Slinger and 31 on Kewaskum. Although committing more fouls, the Owls won the game from the free throw line with very accurate shooting. They sank 30 gift shots while the Indians could make good on only 20.

The Indians' high scorers, Bill Backhaus and Mike Miller, fouled out early and as a result had their worst nights of the season. Backhaus fouled out late in the third quarter after scoring only 8 points and Miller followed suit early in the last period with 10 points. This allowed Slinger to outscore the Indians 19-8 in the final quarter to take the edge off of a close game.

Joey Fehlhaber and Jim Schuster both played well in defeat and came up with their best performances of the season, pacing the Indians with 17 points apiece. Held of Slinger copped top honors for the evening with 22 points, followed by mates Gundrum with 14 and Ciriacks and Duenning with 13 each.

The Owls raced to a 27-22 advantage at the quarter but the Indians turned the tables and went ahead, 48-47 at halftime. Slinger outpointed Kewaskum by 2 points in the third period and led by 1 point when it ended 69-68. Then Slinger pulled away in the final stanza after Kewas-

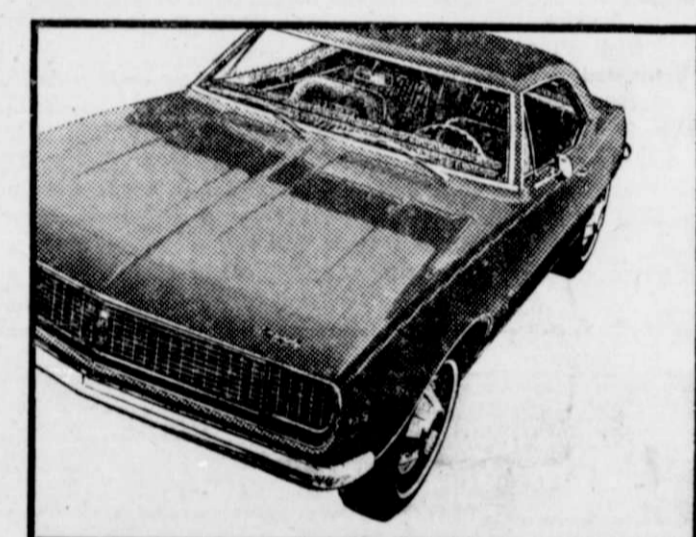

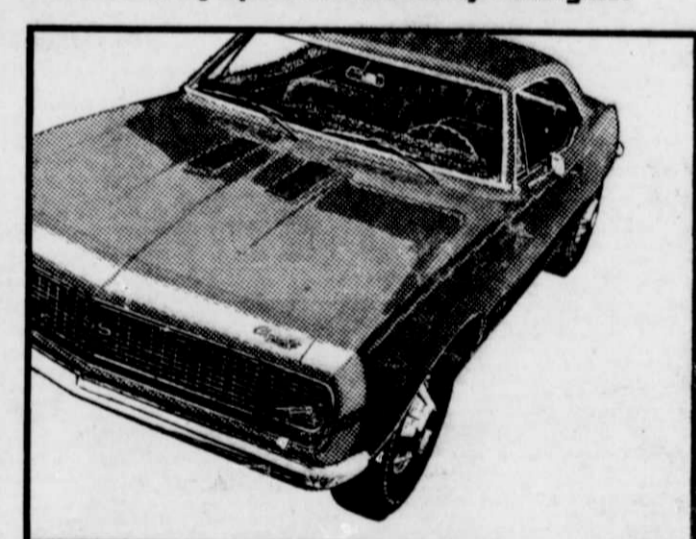
