Entrants From Five Counties Will Compete

Night Fire at Local Hotel Causes 12 Guests to Flee, Damages Room

ROOMER SUFFERS MINOR BURNS FIGHTING BLAZE

A blaze which is believed to have started in the mattress of one of the guest rooms routed hotel guests, caused damage and resulted in burns suffered by one of the guests at the Glacier Inn at 109 Main st. in Kewaskum early Tuesday morning. The fire department was summoned to the scene at 12:25 a. m.

The fire broke out in a second floor room occupied by Alfred Bruhn on the southwest corner of the building. It was reported that the blaze apparently started in the mattress of the bed. The mattress, which was dragged out of the building, the bed, floor covering, a small amount of clothing and interior were damaged by the flames and there was a considerable amount of smoke and water damage. Although the fire was confined to the one room, there was also damage from smoke, water and debris to the hallway, hall floor and stairway.

Bruhn suffered minor burns in fighting the blaze before the firemen arrived. About 12 guests at the hotel had to evacuate the building as dense smoke filled their rooms and the hallway. Firemen used smoke masks to reach the source of the fire and open windows to allow the smoke

to escape. It was several hours before all the smoke cleared and guests could return to their rooms.

Patrons entering and leaving Keller's Tap across the street from the hotel saw flames in the room and smoke pouring out of the windows. They summoned the fire department. Lloyd Keller rushed across the street and into the upstairs room with a hand fire extinguisher and although he was able to help control the flames, it was not enough to extinguish the blaze.

Firemen were at the scene almost an hour. No estimate of the damage has yet been made available. The Glacier Inn is a hotel and restaurant owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Willard Lynn of 1260 Brooklane dr.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl investigated the circumstances of the fire. He reported that he applied for a warrant from District Attorney Robert Kauffman, signed by himself, which he served on Bruhn. Bruhn appeared before Judge Robert Stoltz Wednesday morning in Branch 2 of county court where he was charged with careless disposing of a lighted cigarette, damaging the bed and furnishings. Pledl reported that he was found guilty and fined \$50 and costs.

Presents \$1,336 Check to Des Smith Only 41 Votes Are Cast Here

NOMINATE CURRIE, HANSEN FOR SUPREME COURT POST

One of the lightest votes on record was recorded in the village in the state-wide judicial primary election Tuesday. Only 41 ballots were cast. Actually there were 42 voters but one ballot was left blank.

Figuring the cost of the election officials, ballots and other miscellaneous expenses the cost of each vote amounted to approximately \$1.50, which adds up to pretty expensive voting.

Chief Justice George R. Currie and Circuit Judge Robert W. Hansen won nomination as candidates for the state supreme court in the primary. The two will compete for the 10-year term on the high court at the spring election on Apr. 4. Atty. Harry Holloway of Milwaukee ran a poor third in the three way contest.

Throughout the state Currie was ahead of Hansen by a small margin of just over 1,000 votes but in this village Hansen received 21 votes to 17 for Currie and 3 for Holloway.

Judge Hansen carried Washington county, polling 664 votes to 534 for Currie and 127 for Holloway, but Currie won out in the towns of Kewaskum and Wayne, among some others. The town gave Currie 15 votes and Hansen 7. The vote was also very light throughout the county and state.

ANNUAL 'ROUND-UP' FOR PARENTS MARCH 21-22

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents of either prospective kindergarten pupils or beginning 1st graders who have not attended kindergarten in the Kewaskum school district will be held during the day on Tuesday, March 21, and Wednesday, March 22 from 9:00 a. m. - 12:00 noon and 1:00 to 3:00 p. m. in the Beechwood, Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne school offices. Please register your child at the school he will attend. It is not necessary to bring the child while registering.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1967, and for 1st grade they must have attained their sixth birthday prior to Sept. 1, 1967. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents will be asked to register their children for next year's term and to fill out the child's health record. If you know of any new families in this district that have children eligible for kindergarten or 1st grade, please pass this information on to them.

Richard E. Zarling, director of elementary education, should like to impress upon you the importance of registering your child on either of these two days for kindergarten or first grade so that they may plan for them.

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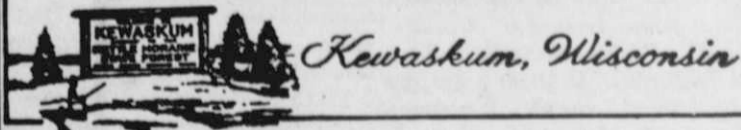

To the Editor:

In response to R. Charles Weier's letter to the editor on March 3, 1967, we say: "Hear, hear!" We heartily agree on all points made; there definitely is "Wasted Education."

Following somewhat along the lines of the Canadian school system mentioned by Mr. Weier, we feel that a maximum of two years of general education in high school be followed by a series of aptitude tests which would provide the guidelines necessary for parents, teachers, and students in choosing the trade or profession most suited to the students' talents and abilities. Then, as higher education would be available to those who need and want it, so also, would trade and vocational schools be available to the others.

We sincerely believe this type of educational system would be of some help in the mitigation of juvenile delinquency. There would be no "floating around" after high school because a youth has neither the training or experience to obtain employment. Unnecessary pressure on today's youth would be alleviated somewhat if unwanted and unneeded subjects weren't "shoved down their throats." Youth would possess greater initiative and sound incentives when permitted to pursue goals of more interest to them.

Let's not forget the thousands of dollars many industries are now spending for on-the-job training. This needless re-training is paid for by us through higher prices. We're actually paying for education twice.

Perhaps it would be difficult for some parents to accept the possibilities of their children wanting to become tool-and-die men, welders, or even cleaning ladies rather than doctors, lawyers or scientists. There are openings for trained people in a countless number of fields; let's not "beat around the bush" in preparing our young people for these openings.

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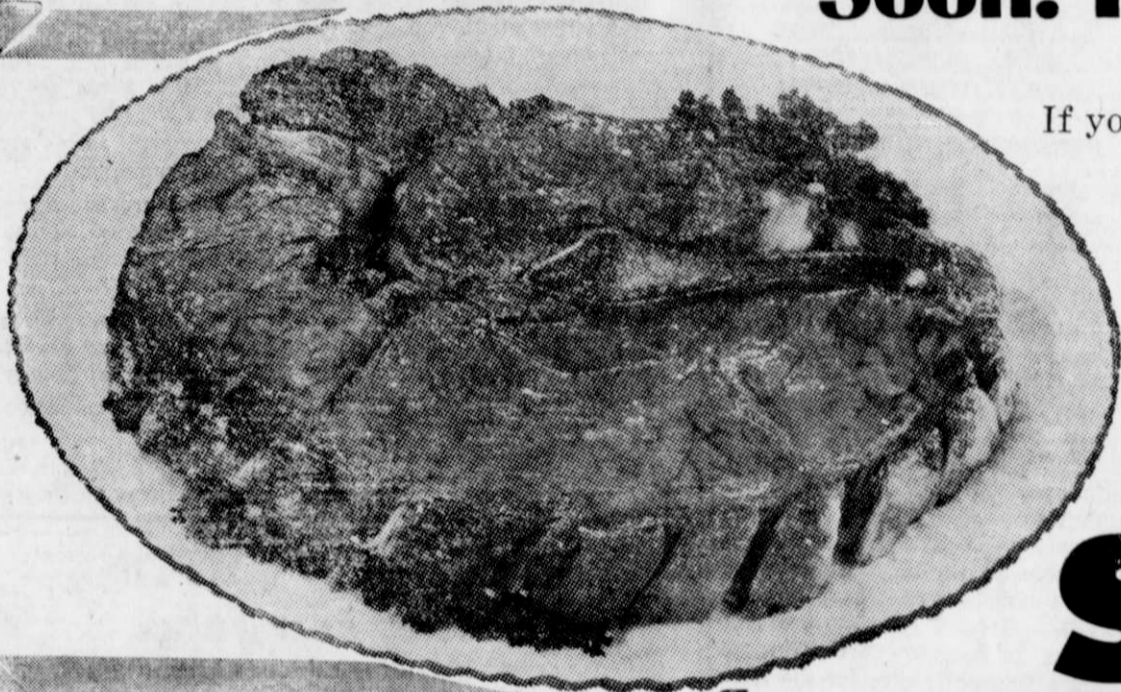

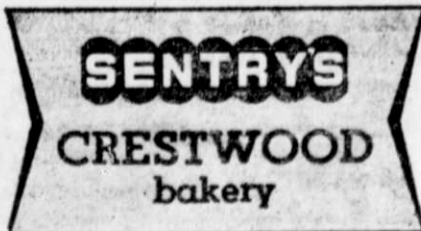
