Jack's Appliance Store Sold to Burckhardt Electric of West Bend

JADRO WILL CONTINUE AS MANAGER OF STORE

Jack Jadro, owner of Jack's Appliance in Kewaskum, announces the sale of his store at 143 Main st. to Burckhardt Electric, Inc. of West Bend, effective last Monday, March 27. The store will operate under the name of Burckhardt's TV & Appliance in the future.

Jadro will remain here as manager of the store and it is felt that the public can be served better in the future with the backing of a larger organization. In this way an adequate inventory can be maintained, appliances can be purchased in truckload lots (for better pricing) and a capable delivery and service department can be supported.

Burckhardt Electric, Inc. formerly owned the local store from 1955 to 1960 and at that time it also was managed by Jadro. Then William Burckhardt was still living (he passed away in 1957) and the business was a considerably smaller. Jadro purchased the store in 1960 because Mrs. Burckhardt felt she could not handle the work involved in the way she would have liked. Bob and Carol Steiner purchased Burckhardt's in West Bend in 1963 and the business now is over four times as large as it was at that time, proving the organization is on the move.

The Steiners now have 14 service and electrical trucks and over 20 full-time employees. They now can offer specialists in the field of TV, refrigeration, etc. Gene Muench, who handled the electrical work for Jadro, will continue in that capacity in this area with help as needed.

The store is closed all this week (March 26 to April 3) for remodeling and redecorating by the new owners and during this time Jack is taking a vacation. He will be back and the store will re-open on Tuesday, April 4, when it will be packed full of merchandise, specially priced for you. A complete line of small and major appliances and TV will be displayed with the complete warehouse and delivery facilities at West Bend available. All appliance service will be directed from West Bend to Burckhardt's radio dispatched service trucks.

Burckhardt's service specialists in all fields include Lee Bohn, TV; Robert Price, refrigeration; Chuck Enright, appliances and TV; Willy Dorzok, appliances, and Ken Boettcher, appliances and refrigeration. Their complete staff of electricians, sales people and office personnel will be available.

Jack wishes to express his thanks and appreciation to his patrons for their past business and association and sincerely hopes you will continue to patronize the organization. In continuing to operate the newly owned store as manager he will be able to have a full stock of merchandise on display with warehousing in West Bend for immediate delivery of almost any appliance you select. The same brands and some new ones will be stocked with the same (or better) personalized service.

Blood Donor Club Drive in Village Slated April 26

Statistics just released reveal that since the West Bend Blood Donor club, of which Kewaskum is a member, was founded in 1950, it has saved area residents \$243,044. Nearly 15,000 pints of blood have been collected and distributed during the past 16 years. All the blood was contributed free by area residents—some have given as many as 48 pints since the club's inception.

Anyone living in the area served by the Blood Donor club is eligible to receive free blood. It is not necessary to have given blood in the past in order to receive it. Simply being a resident of the area qualified you. Blood is collected three times per year at mobile clinics in the West Bend area. It is re-distributed daily. The quantity received by any one individual can vary from one pint to several hundred.

Require Much Blood

Some blood diseases and illnesses such as hemophilia can require as many as 800 pints of blood in the patient's lifetime. In certain operations 50 pints or more may be required. Without the protection provided by the Blood Donor club, these transfusions would cost the patients as much as \$1,500. The Blood Donor club provides this blood FREE of charge.

How can you help the Community Blood Donor club? If possible, donate a pint of blood at the Kewaskum clinic to be held April 26. If for some reason you are not able to give blood suggest a member of your family, a friend, or neighbor to donate blood. With the cooperation of all members of this community, blood will always be available—YOU might need it some day. Call Henry Rosenheimer, who has been responsible for arrangements of the Blood Bank clinic in Kewaskum since its founding in 1950, or Mrs. Robert Zarling, general chairman of the Kewaskum Woman's club committee, making the community canvass. Local Teachers Are Voted \$350 Raise in Salary

OPEN HOUSE AT NEW SCHOOL ADDITION SET FOR MAY 14

At a meeting of the Board of Education of Kewaskum Community schools Monday evening, a revised teachers' salary was approved. The approval followed negotiations with the Kewaskum Education Association, which is the bargaining agent for teachers in the school district.

Salaries will range from \$5,750 for beginning teachers with a bachelor's degree to \$10,015 after 14 years with a master's degree, under the new schedule. Superintendent of Schools Marshall Boyd said, "The schedule has been raised \$350 with some minor adjustments."

In other action the board set May 14 as the date for an informal open house at the high school for inspecting the new \$646,000 addition and remodeling project which was completed earlier this year.

The board approved a contract with Johnson Service Co. of Milwaukee for \$1,432 to repair and replace heating coil valves in the heating system at the Beechwood school.

Action was approved to invest approximately \$350,000 in U. S. treasury notes and a proposal was tabled to obtain films for classroom showing from the Waukesha-Washington Agency No. 16 until more information is received.

NFO Members Picket At Fairmont Foods

NFO members began picketing shortly before noon Monday in front of the Fairmont Foods plant in Kewaskum and the picketing has continued throughout the week, day and night. Fairmont is a milk processing plant here.

Signs carried by the pickets read, "no contract—no milk" and "all we want is a two-cent raise at the farm." Usually there is four picketers at a time and spokesman for the group is Arthur Breit, R. 3, West Bend. He said they reported to Chief of Police Roland Pledl before they started picketing, informing him that they don't want to use force but are bound and determined to win this milk withholding action.

Breit said he is in his fourth year as a NFO member and has been chairman of the meat bargaining committee.

Ice Off River Early; Temperature Hits 75

The ice on the Milwaukee river here went out sometime Wednesday night or early Thursday, Mar. 30, the earliest date in many years, as a result of the unseasonably warm weather. It was 75 degrees at 2 p. m. Thursday, which may also have been a record so early in spring; with even hotter temperatures predicted.

The thermometer also reached 67 degrees last Saturday making it ideal for the Easter egg hunt in the park, and the weather has been warm all week. A couple of years ago this area had a snowstorm and cold winds for the Easter egg hunt at a later date.

The warm weather has brought with it all of the songbirds, which came back in full force last weekend, the flies, bees and bugs, motor bikes in force, tops down on convertibles with radios blaring, shirt sleeves and shorts, residents cleaning up yards and raking lawns, tulips and other flowers popping out.

TOWN OF AUBURN CLERK WILL NOT BE CANDIDATE

Lee A. Anderson, clerk of the Town of Auburn, has announced, even though his name appears on the April 4th ballot, that he will not be a candidate for that office.

Mr. Anderson feels that with his present appointment as acting postmaster of Campbellsport, he cannot devote the time to the town clerk position.

He wishes to thank the voters who supported him in the past.

NO CONTESTS IN VILLAGE TUESDAY

Although voting on the local level in Kewaskum in the coming Spring Election next Tuesday, April 4, has no interest since the incumbent candidates for village offices are unopposed, the eight state referenda issues to be voted on and the race for the state supreme court have aroused interest.

Balloting in the village will be at the municipal building from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m. and voting for the Town of Kewaskum will take place at the Labor Center in this village, also from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m.

In the village of Kewaskum a president and three trustees will be elected. President Wayland Tessar is unopposed for re-election as are the three incumbent trustees seeking re-election, namely Carl Freehauf, Alfred Kral and Cyril N. Wieter.

In many of the villages and townships of Washington county considerable interest has been indicated because of the many contests for the posts. However, in this area only the Town of Kewaskum has opposition for one office. Supervisor No. 2 Jerome Herriges will be opposed by Walter Deibel. All other incumbents have no opposition. The Town of Wayne ballot has no opposition with all incumbents seeking re-election.

On the state level the contest between incumbent Chief Justice George R. Currie and Circuit Judge Robert W. Hansen of Milwaukee for the supreme court is arousing considerable interest. Judge Hansen carried Washington county by a comfortable margin the March Primary and came within a wink of outpolling Justice Currie in the state.

The eight referenda issues are also becoming the topic of conversation as the election nears. The first four referendums deal with election of state officials to four year terms. Under terms of the referenda, the state constitution would be revised to elect constitutional officers for four year terms instead of two years as at present. In addition, one of the referendums would change state statutes to provide that the governor and lieutenant governor would run as a "team" on one ticket.

Referendum No. 6 seeks to revise state law to outlaw the present ruling that sheriffs can run for only two successive terms. Referendum No. 7 would provide public transportation for children attending parochial and private schools while No. 8 would permit the lowering or raising of salaries of the supreme court justices and circuit judges so all get the same salaries.

HONOR MRS. JEROME KLEIN AT SURPRISE BABY SHOWER

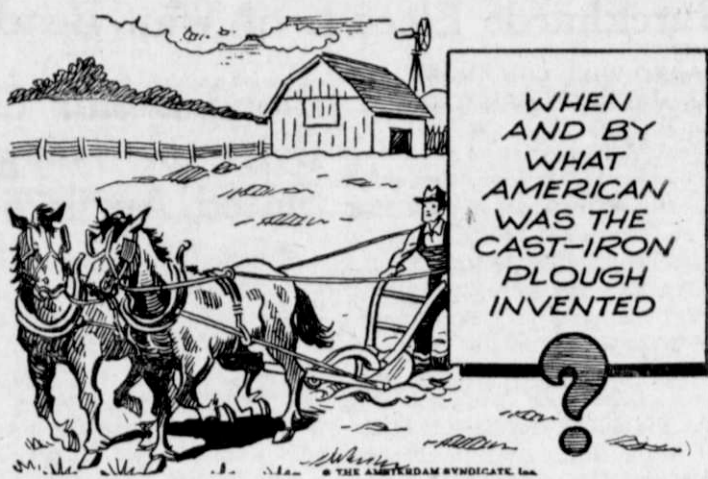
