Judge Hansen, 8 Referenda Issues Win; Village Officials Reelected

GOOD TURNOUT AT POLLS; 276 VOTES CAST LOCALLY

A very good turnout for a Spring Election resulted in a total vote of 12,351 ballots in Washington county and 276 votes cast in the village Tuesday, due to contests in some towns and villages and the state level referenda issues and contest for supreme court justice.

The four village officials on the ballot were all reelected for two year terms without opposition. Village President Wayland D. Tessar received 259 votes, all but 17 of the total ballots cast. The three incumbent trustees reelected and Cyril N. Wietor 246.


