## Judge Hansen, 8 Referenda Issues Win; Village Officials Reelected

GOOD TURNOUT AT POLLS;  
276 VOTES CAST LOCALLY

A very good turnout for a Spring Election resulted in a total vote of 12,351 ballots in Washington county and 276 votes cast in the village Tuesday, due to contests in some towns and villages and the state level referenda issues and contest for supreme court justice.

The four village officials on the ballot were all reelected for two year terms without opposition. Village President Wayland D. Tassar received 259 votes, all but 17 of the total ballots cast. The three incumbent trustees reelected and the votes received were: Carl Fredhauf 244, Alfred Kral 255 and Cyril N. Wietor 246.

Circuit Judge Robert W. Hansen easily defeated the incumbent, Chief Justice George R. Currie for election to the supreme court. In the county Hansen received 6,788 votes compared to 4,711 for Currie. Judge Hansen also won decisively in the state. In the village Hansen polled 153 votes to 109 for Currie.

All of the eight referenda issues won on the state, county and village levels. Results in the county and village were:

No. 1. (Governor and lieutenant governor 4 year term)—County 7,318 to 4,024; village 177 to 77. No. 2. (Sec. of state 4 years)—County 7,085 to 4,095; village 168 to 82. No. 3. (State treas. 4 years)—County 6,944 to 4,185; village 165 to 81. No. 4. (Atty. gen. 4 years)—County 6,949 to 4,078; village 166 to 81. No. 5. (Gov. and lieutenant gov. to run on the same ballot)—County 6,938 to 4,005; village 169 to 74. No. 6. (Permit sheriffs to run for more than two year terms)—County 6,417 to 4,748; village 151 to 97. No. 7. (School bus transportation for parochial and private schools)—County 6,821 to 3,814; village 177 to 94. No. 8. (Permit lowering or raising judicial salaries)—County 6,175 to 3,725; village 152 to 90.

Results in area townships were as follows:

### Town of Kewaskum

The only opposition in the town of Kewaskum was for the office of Supervisor No. 2 in which the incumbent, Jerome Herriges, defeated Walter Dei, 117 to 60. Others reelected without opposition were: Ed J. Campbell, chairman, 161; Arnold Amerling, Supervisor No. 1, 158; Alfred H. Seefeldt, clerk, 154; William Bruhn, treasurer, 163; John Heisdorf, assessor, 162.

### Town of Wayne

All incumbents in the town of Wayne were reelected without opposition. They are: Chairman, John Oelhafen, 222; Supervisor, Elmer Boettcher, 212; Supervisor, Leo Zehren, 213; Clerk, Paul C. Moritz, 226; Treasurer, Raymond Kudek, 228; Assessor, Arnold Hawig, Jr., 199.

## 3 Persons Hurt in Crash on Overhead

Three persons were injured in a two car collision on Hwy. 45 on the overhead bridge just north of Kewaskum at 10:50 p. m. last Thursday when a car driven by James A. Laufer, 17, of West Bend, traveling south, apparently crossed over the center line and collided with a northbound auto operated by Richard A. Candee, 42, of R. 2, Campbellsport, according to the sheriff's report.

Injured were Candee, who incurred a bloody nose; Laufer, who suffered facial lacerations, and a passenger in the Laufer car, Christine Kiel, 18, of West Bend, who suffered severe scalp lacerations and a possible concussion. Laufer and Miss Kiel were removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambulance.

## 2 Local Girls Molested by Strange Man

Officer Marrison Frank answered the call and checked the entire area but could not locate any party answering the description given him by the girl. The girl described the man as wearing a brown jacket, not wearing a hat nor having glasses, about 30 years old and of average height. There was no automobile involved in the incident, the only sight of the man being on foot, according to police.

## Local Firemen Attend Badger Meeting, Banquet

THIRTEEN MEMBERS AT THIENSVILLE DINNER

The annual spring meeting and banquet of the Badger Firemen's association was held at Thiensville Sunday with representatives of the 22 fire departments in Ozaukee, Washington and part of Milwaukee, Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties attending the session.

Delegates of the Kewaskum fire department at the afternoon meeting were Chief Armin Oppermann, Dave Nigh and Donald Seif. Joining them for the evening banquet at 6 o'clock in St. Cecilia's school gym, which was attended by several hundred firemen and officials of the various departments in the association were 10 more Kewaskum firemen, namely Bruce Petri, Ted Rohlinger, Bill Harbeck, Ollie Staehler, Augie Bilgo, Ellie Ramthun, Harry Koch, Lee Honeck, Roger Schmitt and Clayton Stautz.

At the afternoon session, Grafton was awarded the association's 1968 bowling tournament (next January and February). The annual summer tournament of the association will be held in June at Jackson on the date of their picnic. The annual fall meeting will be held the last Sunday in October in West Bend. The rest of the session was devoted to discussing business matters.

At the evening banquet Detective Sgt. Andrew Anewenter of the Milwaukee detective bureau spoke on "How Police Work with the Fire Department." The Menomonee Falls fire department won the top bowling trophies and prizes in the bowling tournament also held at Thiensville this winter. The awards and prizes were also presented at the banquet.

Kewaskum firemen did not fare too well in the bowling tourney, winning a total of \$30. Kewaskum Team No. 3 placed 37th (last in the prize money) with 2713, good for \$5. Dennis Konkel and Bud Perkins placed 24th in the doubles with 1188, good for \$5, and Roger Reindl and Bob Staehler placed 28th with 1178, for \$3. In the singles event Bill Martin placed 18th with 637, good for \$5; Lee Honeck placed 33rd with 621, good for \$2, and Bud Perkins placed 34th with 621, good for \$2.

In other afternoon business it was voted to hold an officers' command and pump operators' school at Cedarburg and West Bend on Apr. 22. The governor's conference on fire safety will be held May 27. Assistant Fire Chief Wm. Oelhafen of West Bend gave a report on his recent attendance at the International Association of Fire Fighters convention, attended by fire fighters from foreign countries, held at Memphis, Tenn. The association plans to organize bus tours for firemen from local communities for the purpose of inspecting fire fighting facilities of the Milwaukee fire department and Chicago's O'Hare Field.

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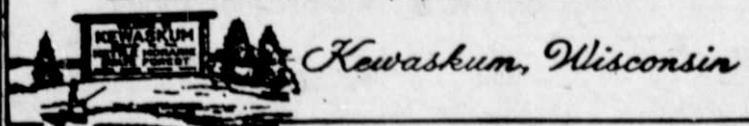

### New Uniforms For Red Cross Volunteers

Something new has been added to the Red Cross volunteer scene. In the first change in uniform since World War II, a "new look" has been added, designed by Dior. The new outfit is billed as "universally flattering" and is worn

with a matching pillbox cap. The new uniforms will be available this month to coincide with national Red Cross month which marks the start of year-long recruitment of volunteers for work in many areas. The range of their work will take them into hospitals, schools and homes for the aged. They will teach first-aid, home nursing and participate in transportation and life-saving programs.

First to wear the new uniform locally will be Mrs. Elmer Eisenmann of West Bend, production chairman for Red Cross and long-time veteran of dedicated service in first aid and civil defense. The uniform will have a pin on the left shoulder. Above it is a simple shield inscribed with the words "American Red Cross Volunteer." An identifying name tag is worn on the opposite side. In place of the "hash marks" which formerly indicated hours and years of service, there will be "danglers" at-

tached to each volunteer's pin. The only jewelry which may be worn with the new uniforms will be a watch and wedding ring.

Reaction to the new uniforms was somewhat mixed around the country. Some volunteers adjusted the new uniforms to skirt lengths and "fit" most becoming to them. All agreed, however, that the volunteers should have a "uniform uniform" instead of a different version for every branch of Red Cross work. They also agreed that the becoming blue and white polyester cord material would be easy to care for and worn with pride. Recruitment for more volunteers will continue to meet the demands of a changing and challenging world.

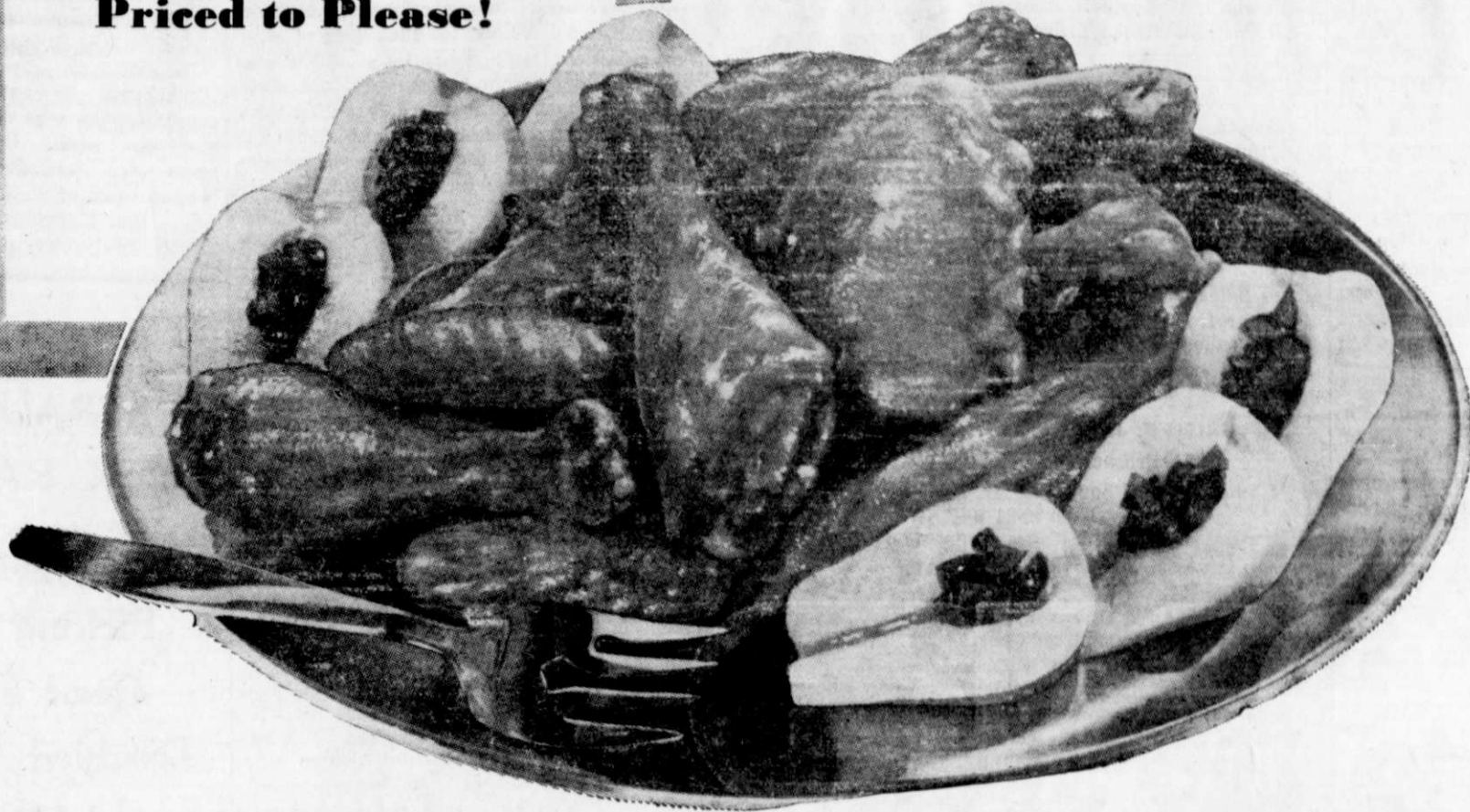

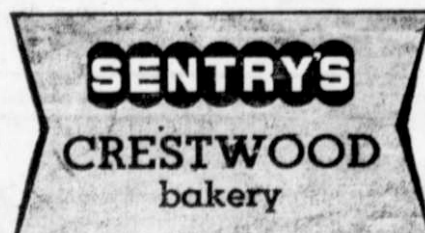
