Humorist From Shorewood Woman's Club Guest Speaker

Madelon Coogan Pritchard, humorist, housewife, dramatist, monologist and newspaper woman was the guest speaker Saturday, April 18, at the meeting of the Kewaskum Woman's club. Many local and area women had the pleasure of hearing a speaker whose numerous accolades were well merited. "Laughter Is Therapy" was the topic chosen by Mrs. Pritchard and in addition to her fine written material she used various hats as props to inject humor.

She started her career as a reporter for the society paper and later continued to collect humor as a hobby. "A sense of humor is a sense of balance and perspective" said the speaker. The first requirement is to laugh at yourself, take time to show appreciation of others and not be critical. A ready joke is necessary in modern life. Humor is kind and never cutting, it has a healing quality, and gives one the courage not to grieve. The Marx brothers gave the world a "good hearty laugh" along the way and helped many people.

A year can be defined by what people are laughing at. 1964, quipped Mrs. Pritchard, was "The year the bottom fell out of the topless bathing suit." In 1967 Negro humor is in evidence as well as comic commercials, and humor such as "Sign over electric chair—you can be sure if it's Westinghouse." The modern housewife is being kidded by Phyllis Diller and mothers and grandmothers are included in current humor also. Mrs. Pritchard read a little girl's thoughts concerning her grandmother, "Everyone should have at least one, specially if they don't have TV."

Club women were also humorized in various ways much to the delight of the audience and were reminded to recognize themselves in the proper perspective.

The fine manner of delivery and wealth of amusing stories presented by Mrs. Pritchard bore out her choice of topic and was most certainly therapeutic to the women who had the pleasure of hearing her.
