Goetsch. 64, of 309 E. 13th st., Fond du Lac, a salesman for Badger Liquor Co. of Fond du Lac, collapsed unexpectedly in his parked car on Main st. after the moon hour on Monday and was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community hospital. West Bend. Although in poor health, his death was unexpected.

Goetsch had been a salesman for the Badger Co. for many years and was well known in this area. He was calling on the trade in Kewaskum Monday when he was stricken. He parked his car at the curb in front of the Ed. Czaja building, apparently to call on two nearby taverns, when he collapsed.

A passerby saw Goetsch slumped in his car and notified Mrs. Rose Miller in her tavern next door. She recognized him and immediately called police and the firemen's rescue squad at 12:45 p. m.
