Blood Clinic at High School Here Next Wednesday

One hundred twenty-five pints of blood is the goal of the Kewaskum Blood Donor Clinic to be held from 3 to 8 p. m. Apr. 26. To register please call Mrs. Robert Zaring, 626-2264, or Henry Rosenheimer, 626-2131.

The importance of having FREE blood available for all residents of the community cannot be over-emphasized. All residents of the area, 18 to 61 years of age, are urged to volunteer.

Volunteers who have not signed up will be welcome at the high school anytime between 3 and 8 p. m. on Wednesday, Apr. 26. Donors with appointments are asked to come in at the times given them.

Dr. R. G. Edwards, village and town of Kewaskum health officer, pointed out that all blood transfusions are given because the patient is in need of blood to preserve the life they still have retained after surgery, childbirth or severe accident. When these sick people need help, Dr. Edwards stated, there is no time to wait for the long processing procedure that makes your unit of blood ready for the sick patient to receive.

The Blood Bank program has saved the community approximately \$250,000 but only about 10 per cent of the residents have accepted the challenge so far to be charitable and contribute.

Dr. Edwards urges every healthy man and woman to give a unit of blood now because of the dire need. When 90 per cent of the residents have given one unit of blood, there will be plenty of blood available always, he indicated.

Post Office to Move Into New Building May 1

Postmaster Harry E. Koch announced this week that the Kewaskum post office will be moved into its newly constructed building at 341-347 Main st. on April 30 and be open for business there Monday morning, May 1. The spacious, beautiful new building, now being completed is located two doors west of the present post office in the A. G. Koch, Inc. building.

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new post office building were held on Oct. 1 of last year with Postmaster Koch and former Congressman John A. Race turning over the first shovels full of dirt right after the formal program was held. A number of post office officials, neighboring postmasters, reporters, photographers and many area residents were on hand for the ceremonies. Excavation work for the new building got underway shortly after that.

The new facility, necessitated by the steadily increasing volume of mail handled, was originally scheduled to be completed by March 1 of this year but was delayed somewhat. Workmen have been working day and night during the past few weeks to complete the building. The Sturm Building Corp. of Manawa is general contractor for the structure, which has an exterior of brick and native field-stone and contains 3,433 square feet of interior space with 6,024 square feet for parking and movement of vehicles.

A formal opening will be held at a later date and complete details will be published in next week's issue of the Statesman.

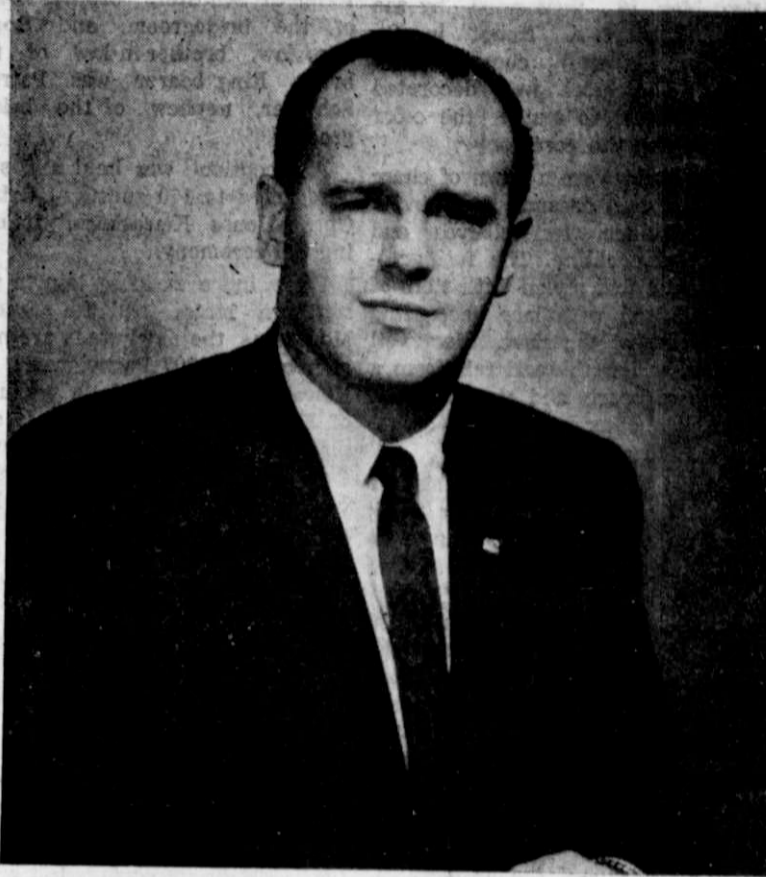
OUTLINE PROJECTS FOR VILLAGE IMPROVEMENT

Members of the village board, at a special meeting held at 5 p. m. Monday, accepted the bid of Kohn Bros. Farm Service, Inc. of Kewaskum for an industrial tractor with a back hoe and front end loader attachment at a cost of \$6,100. This will be used for trenching and back filling on village projects.

A bartender's license for Thomas Larsen, 350 First st., was approved and the board set May 1 as the date to make their semi-annual inspection of village owned properties, such as park buildings, municipal buildings and pumping stations.

Presiden Wayland Tessar outlined the projects that will be up for attention aimed at continued improvement to make the village a better place to live. These include a garage to house village equipment as new equipment is constantly being added, which would be built near the village incinerator; moving toward a zoning ordinance and building code; continuation of the village tree planting program; possibility of

Salesman Dies in Parked Car on Village Street

FOND DU LAC MAN IS VICTIM MONDAY

Alfred C. Goetsch, 64, of 309 E. 13th st., Fond du Lac, a salesman for Badger Liquor Co. of Fond du Lac, collapsed unexpectedly in his parked car on Main st. after the noon hour on Monday and was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend. Although in poor health, his death was unexpected.

Goetsch had been a salesman for the Badger Co. for many years and was well known in this area. He was calling on the trade in Kewaskum Monday when he was stricken. He parked his car at the curb in front of the Ed. Czaja building, apparently to call on two nearby taverns, when he collapsed.

A passerby saw Goetsch slumped in his car and notified Mrs. Rose Miller in her tavern next door. She recognized him and immediately called police and the firemen's rescue squad at 12:45 p. m. Goetsch was rushed to the hospital where he was pronounced dead. Coroner Robert Boltz of Washington county investigated the mishap.

Born Dec. 21, 1902, in Fond du Lac, Goetsch was the son of Herman and Augusta Regling Goetsch. His father was the first principal of St. Peter's Lutheran school there. He married Bernice Drager April 27, 1929, and had been employed for the liquor company for 25 years.

Survivors include his widow and three sisters. Mrs. Selma Kruse, Forest Park, Ill., and Miss Ella Goetsch and Mrs. Alma Klein of Fond du Lac. One sister predeceased him.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Thursday at St. Peter's Lutheran church, Fond du Lac, with the Rev. Karl A. Gurgel officiating. Burial was in Ledgeview Memorial Park cemetery. Friends called at the Zacherl Funeral home from 3 p. m. Wednesday until 11 a. m. Thursday and then at the church until the hour of services.
