Post Office to Be Open Monday in New Building; Has Latest Facilities

DEDICATION CEREMONIES PLANNED WITHIN 90 DAYS; LOCK BOX CHANGES MADE

The Kewaskum post office will be moved into its spacious, newly constructed building at 341-347 Main st. over the weekend and will be open for business as usual there Monday morning, May 1. Hours at the post office will remain the same as in the past.

Workmen have been busy long hours the past two weeks putting on the finishing touches on the new building, which is located two doors west of the present post office. There is still an amount of work to be done on the outside of the building.

Dedication ceremonies at the new post office are set to be held within 90 days. Arrangements and the program for the dedication will be in charge of Postmaster Harry Koch and the Kewaskum Kiwanis club's public and business affairs committee.

Work was begun last October on the new facility, which was necessitated by the steadily increasing volume of mail handled. Sturm Building Corp. of Manawa was general contractor for the structure, which has an exterior of block and native field stone, and contains 3,433 square feet of interior space with 6,024 square feet for parking and movement of vehicles.

In addition to the large main workroom, the new post office has an office room for the postmaster, service and stamp room, lobby, mechanical equipment room, janitor's room, men's and ladies' lavatories. There is an 11x26 foot loading dock at the rear of the building.

A total of 490 new lock boxes have been installed with three blank panels for additional future boxes. The post office has a completely new counter line and equipment and new lobby cables. The interior is painted in traditional blue and gray with cream color in the office rooms. There is tiled green flooring in the workroom and tan flooring in the lobby and office rooms. All of the lighting is fluorescent and every window is equipped with Venetian blinds. New glass enclosed bulletin boards have been installed and other equipment will also be added.

The post office features the latest type lock boxes. No more combinations to worry about. The lock boxes will be opened with a key. All but 26 lock box holders will have the same box numbers as before. Letters will be received today (Friday) by lock box patrons with instructions and their lock box key attached for use Monday morning.

Some changes will go into effect in the new post office. A person renting a key-type lock box will be supplied with one key for the present time. Another key may be secured later if the need arises. Renters of lock boxes are not permitted to obtain or use any keys except those issued through the post office. Keys in excess of two may be obtained from the post office on completion of form 1094, application for additional keys to post office box, and pay-

Man Apprehended For Molesting 2 Girls in Village

Gary J. Sabol, 22, who gave his address as 1102 Jefferson st., West Bend, a resident until recently of Kenosha, was fined \$80 and costs or 20 days in the county jail on the charge of disorderly conduct when he appeared before Judge Tom J. Merriam in Branch 1 of Washington County Court Friday. Police reported that there is no such West Bend address as the one given by Sabol.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl reported that at 8:10 p. m. last Thursday the man attempted to pick up two Kewaskum teenage girls, ages 15 and 16, who were walking along Main st. He said the man was driving east on Main st. east of the railroad tracks when he stopped his car and asked the girls, "how about a ride, riding is better than walking." The girls became frightened and ran. The man stopped for the second time when he caught up to the girls in front of the new post office building. This time he asked the girls, "how would you like to make some money by going for a ride with me?"

The frightened girls ran onto the porch of a nearby home and the man drove off. Then the girls hailed a passing police car and gave the patrolman, Officer Marinier Frank, a good description of the man and his car. Officer Frank searched the village for the automobile and found one answering the description on a local industrial parking lot. The officer summoned the aid of Chief Pledl and they returned to the parking lot and found that the motor was still warm.

The officers picked up the owner of the car and after questioning the suspect, Sabol admitted the incident. He was placed under arrest and taken into custody, then removed to the county jail. Since Sabol stated that he recently moved to this area from Kenosha, local police called Kenosha authorities and it was learned from them that Sabol was known to police there because of former conduct. On Friday morning Assistant District Atty. Aldwin Seefeldt issued a state disorderly conduct warrant against Sabol.

Owner of the new business will be Dave Skrentny of R. 2, Campbellsport, formerly of here, who managed, played with and did the singing with the Blue Echoes, Kewaskum's rock and roll band, for seven years. Skrentny intends to have a grand opening at the store in June.

The music store will feature the sale of guitars, amps, drums, piano organs and cord organs and will carry brand names like Fender, Gibson, Eko and Univox. 

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

ever since. Her husband predeceased her on Apr. 10, 1935.




