Local Blood Bank Exceeds Goal

**130 DONORS SET RECORD;
45 FIRST TIME DONORS**

The blood drive held here April 26 was a tremendous success. According to a report made by Mrs. Robert Zarling, chairman of the Kewaskum Community Blood Donor club, the 125-pint quota was exceeded by five pints, bringing the total pints collected to 130.

According to Mrs. Zarling, 186 persons registered for the event. Of that number 164 were recruited via telephone. "Walk-in" volunteers—those who did not register in advance—numbered 22. As to be expected, some of those who registered were rejected due to colds and other illnesses. However, the major reason for the 56-pint margin was due to persons failing to keep their appointments.

The number of first time donors was encouraging. Of 45 "freshmen" who registered, 38 were able to donate blood, while seven were rejected for reasons of illness.

Extra Mass Added At Holy Trinity

Due to overcrowded conditions, there will be an added Mass on Sundays and holy days at Holy Trinity Catholic church beginning this Sunday, May 7. Four Masses will now be read instead of three as formerly. Masses will be at 6:00, 8:00, 9:30 and 11:00 a. m. Formerly the last Mass was at 10 a. m. This was moved to 11 a. m. and the 9:30 Mass is a new one.

A vote by ballot on the new Mass schedule was taken by members of the parish the previous Sunday, and resulted in the extra Mass and new time schedule preferred by the majority. Parishioners are urged not to overcrowd the last Mass. The new schedule will remain on an experimental basis for the present.

Seefeldt 'Young Republican of Year' in State

Aldwin Seefeldt of West Bend, son of Alfred Seefeldt of R. 1, Kewaskum, who is assistant district attorney for Washington county, was awarded the state Young Republican organization's highest honor of the year at the state convention held at Sheboygan Saturday when he was named "Young Republican of the Year."

Seefeldt, a 1959 graduate of Kewaskum Community High school, is an alumnus of Lakeland college, Sheboygan, and was granted his Doctor of Laws degree from the University of Wisconsin Law school, Madison, on Jan. 21 of this year.

3 Local Students Compete in State Speech Contest

Three students from Kewaskum were among the 1,746 Wisconsin state high school finalists competing for top ratings in the annual State Speech Contest of the Wisconsin High School Forensics Association (WHSFA) held on the University of Wisconsin campus at Madison Saturday, April 29.

The contest is one of the largest of its kind in the nation. The contestants, winners of earlier sub-district and district eliminations held throughout the state, represented 391 high schools throughout the state.

Seventy-six faculty members from Wisconsin colleges and universities assessed the students' performances in one of the categories in the following divisions: significant speeches, original oratory, four-minute speech, public address, extemporaneous speaking, play acting, declamation, reading of prose, reading of poetry.

Kewaskum students who competed are Anne Edwards in four minute speech, Linda Wulff in original oratory, and Neal Hirsig in interpretative reading of prose.

Two of the above Kewaskum students received "A" ratings in the state forensic finals. They are Anne Edwards with her original four minute speech on "The Abandoned Illegitimate Children of American Servicemen" and Neal Hirsig in the prose reading category in which he read from "The Man Who Knew Coolidge" by Sinclair Lewis.

Appraisal of All Property in Village Started

**WORK BY DOANE SERVICE
TO EXTEND INTO AUGUST**

The Doane Appraisal Service of St. Louis, Missouri, has started work on the appraisal of all property taxable by the Village of Kewaskum. The purpose of this program is to bring assessed values up to the standards set by the State Department of taxation. This does not mean that taxes will be raised, for the tax rate will be adjusted to keep the taxes approximately the same according to the needs of the village.

This work is being done by Larry Ellingson who is from central Iowa. Due to the nature of this work, Ellingson will not be able to give advance notice of when he will be visiting each home. Ellingson plans to start work in the

northwest part of town working south toward Roseland Hills. He will then work east and north, finishing in the northeast part of town. You can watch for Ellingson working in your area, he will be driving a light green 1965 Oldsmobile with Tennessee license plates.

Ellingson is asked to make an interior inspection of all property in Kewaskum and to measure those of which he doesn't already have the dimensions. The interior inspection is to determine the quality and grade of the building as well as its condition.

If Ellingson works the whole projects alone, he expects to finish in early August. At this time there will be hearings to which the property owners who feel the appraisal of their property is too high as compared to the market value may come and explain to the appraiser why he feels the value is too high. After this there will be the regular Board of Review hearings held by the Village of Kewaskum.

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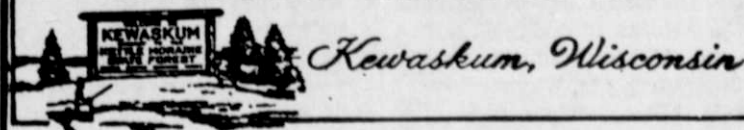
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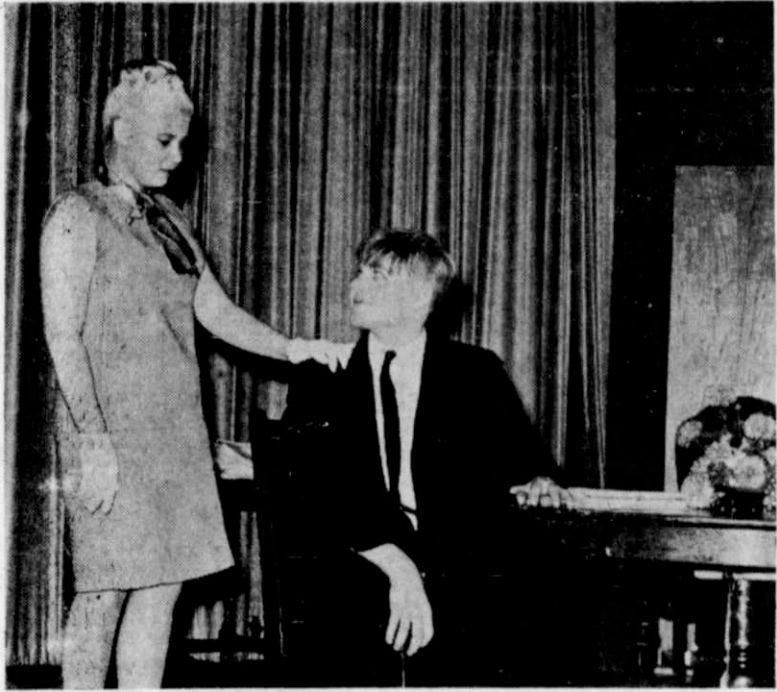
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High School Comedy 'Harvey' is Success

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Jr. Woman's Club Hears Talk on Mental Health

CHAIRMAN OF GUIDANCE CENTER GUEST SPEAKER

Mrs. Gertrude Risse, chairman of the Washington County Guidance Center, was the guest speaker at the April 13 meeting of the Kewaskum Junior Woman's club. Along with Mrs. Risse, as her guest, was Mrs. Elizabeth Kutcheid, historian for the Washington County Guidance Center.

Mrs. Risse has been active with the Mental Health Clinic in West Bend for the past six and a half years. She is very active and dedicated to improving the care and treatment of the mentally ill and to promoting sound mental health. Mrs. Risse's theme was "My cup runneth over with love for fellow man." A few of her comments were as follows:

"A child needs to know he is loved at all times—no matter whether he has been good or bad. Love of parents is unconditional and a child should be able to count on this. Security is vital also. Home should be a safe place, to fall back on and a place from which to start. Researchers have proven that children, when between the ages of six months to three years, have a working mother, they will be effected emotionally.

"An important thing to remember about mental illness is that it is an illness. And, with proper care and treatment, the mentally ill can recover and go on to lead full and happy lives."

She told the club members of the official symbol of the National Association for Mental Health is a bell. This symbol represents an actual bell, the Mental Health Bell, which was cast in 1953 from chains and handcuffs and other metal restraints formally used to bind mental patients. The bell bears the inscription, "Cast from shackles which bound them, this bell shall ring out hope for the mentally ill and victory over mental illness."

The association will hold its annual Bell Ringer March, a door-to-door drive for funds for the association. The money collected will be used for many services including supporting research to find

the cures for mental health illness and ways to prevent it; to mentally ill, such as information services on where to get treatment; volunteer services for mental hospital patients; rehabilitation services to help the discharged patients find friends, a place to live and a job, and to receive follow-up medical care; and to help create treatment service in the community for children and adults suffering from mental illness, so that everyone who needs treatment can get it quickly instead of waiting for months or not getting it at all.

The members were urged, as well as anyone in Washington county to volunteer their services. You can do this through transportation, a service activity with a patient, such as taking them along shopping, to a movie, visit them, or invite them to your home. There are non-direct services for agencies in which you can help with the mailing, repairing toys, clerical work, etc. Telephone answering services and the Listening Ear are other volunteer services. Contact the service committee of the association by writing Box 461, West Bend, Wis. or by phoning the Guidance Center 334-5610.

The Washington County Health association provides speakers, films, literature information on emotional problems. It provides help with emotional and mental problems, major support by county and state. No one is refused service, if unable to pay. The staff consists of psychiatrist, psychologist and psychiatric social workers. The association provides long term care without major treatment, plays for group programs, high school guidance counselors, school psychometrist for listing, school psychologist or social work-

er, classes for mentally retarded children, work for mentally retarded, which is Sheltered Workshop (Threshold).

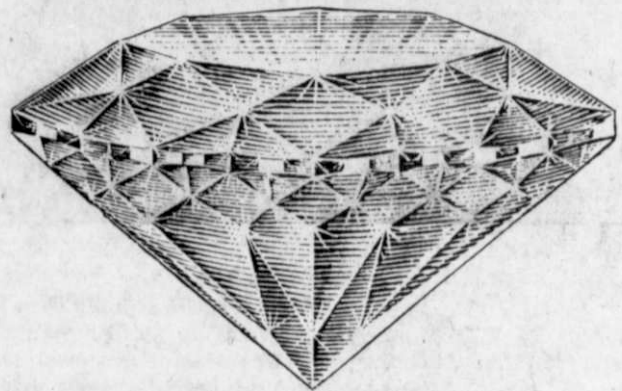

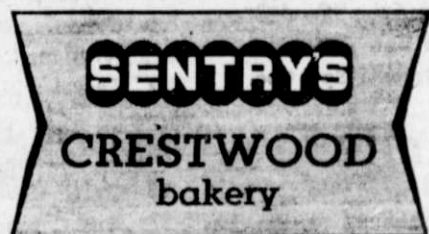
