Appraisal of All Property in Village Started

WORK BY DOANE SERVICE TO EXTEND INTO AUGUST

The Doane Appraisal Service of St. Louis, Missouri. has started work on the appraisal of all property taxable by the Village of Kewaskum. The purpose of this program is to bring assessed values up to the standards set by the State Department of taxation. This does not mean that taxes will be raised, for the tax rate will be adjusted to keep the taxes approxmately the same according to the needs of the village.

This work is being done by Lar ry Ellingson who is from central Iowa. Due to the nature of this work, Ellingson will not be able to give advance notice of when he will be visiting each home. Eltingson plans to start work in the
