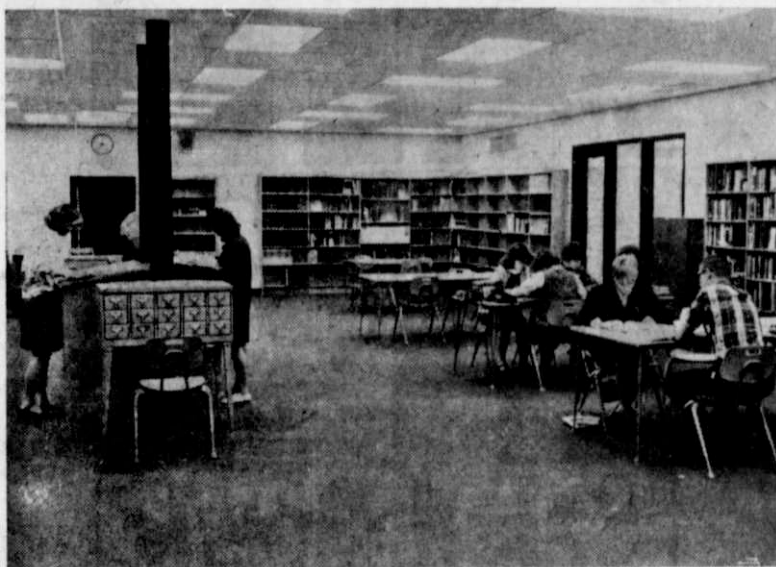
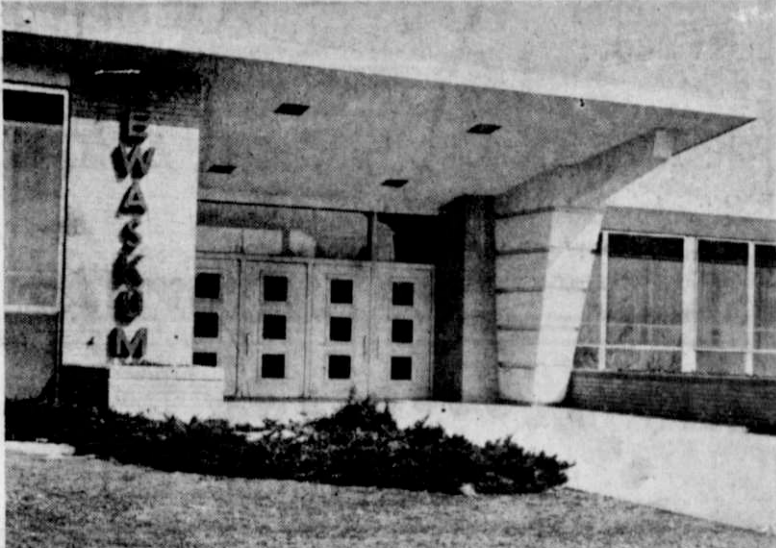
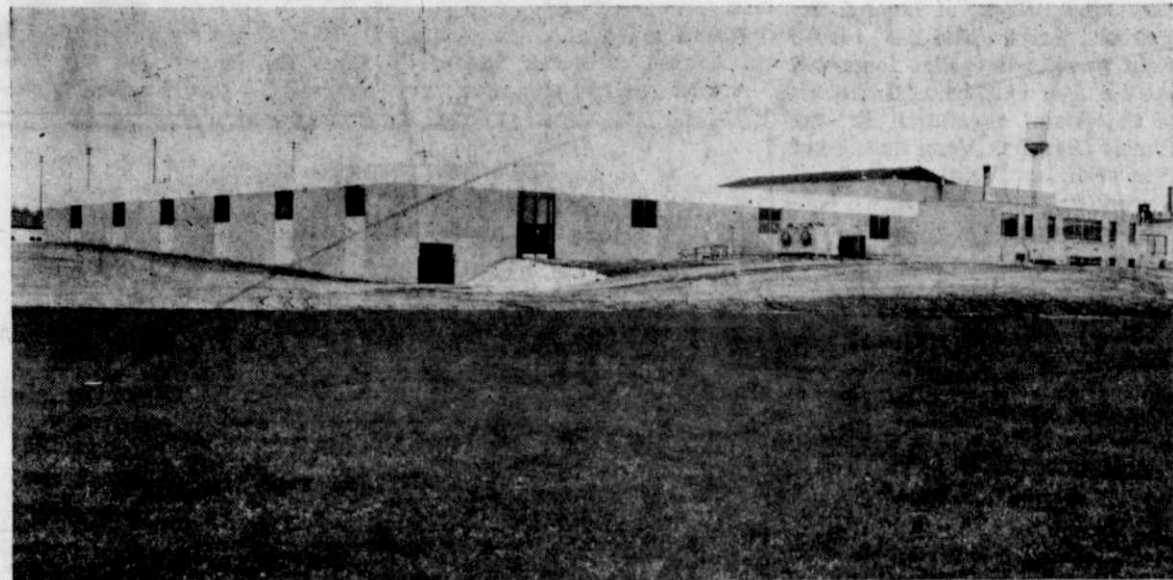

Open House at New High School Addition Sunday



Cost \$646,500; Adds 30,000 Sq. Ft. and 17 Teaching Stations

The public is invited to attend an open house program at the newly enlarged Kewaskum Community High school this Sunday, May 14, from 1:30 to 4 p. m. National Honor society members will serve as host guides and will explain the functions of the various rooms. Coffee and coke will be served in the new multi-purpose room.

The 1966-67 addition to the school has added 30,000 square feet to the instructional area, plus storage rooms, a garage, wrestling room, and a future (now unfinished) locker and shower area for a future physical education station, plus remodeling of various parts of the existing structure. The addition, with equipment, will cost \$646,500. The building project was approved by the electors

in a referendum in January 1966. The project had been defeated by electors in two previous referendums. The addition raised the number of teaching stations (classrooms and special purpose rooms) from 22 to a maximum of 39.

Although the addition (shown in the top photo) has been in use since January, 1967, some equipment including lockers had not arrived. Some rooms are scheduled for equipment this summer.

The school's main entrance (shown in center photo) now opens into an expanded facility and educational program. The original building, built in 1956-57, was designed for 400 students. Enrollment next year is expected to near the 600 mark.

A new, carpeted library (shown in lower photo) is now available to students. The old library held 3,000 volumes and seated 35 students. The new library will hold about 8,000 volumes, will seat 80 pupils when completely furnished,

and provides study rooms, an office, a publications room and a periodical room to be equipped with microfilm readers.

Arts and crafts courses, previously unavailable to Kewaskum students because of lack of facilities, have been in full swing since the second semester began. An interesting feature in all the new rooms are floor to ceiling bulletin boards.

A language laboratory for the improved teaching of foreign languages has been added. A four year course in Spanish is available to students and next fall German will be added to the curriculum.

The addition included extensive remodeling and equipment purchase. A metals and machines shop is in an area that previously was a drafting room and a wood storage area. A new drafting-graphic arts area has been provided.

A room, formerly used for typing has been converted to a reading laboratory which was furnished with Title I funds.

The facility provides an opportunity to students to correct reading deficiencies and to improve good reading habits.

The 30,000 square foot addition was designed by Schutte, Phillips and Mochon, Architects. The prime contractors were: D. M. & C. M. 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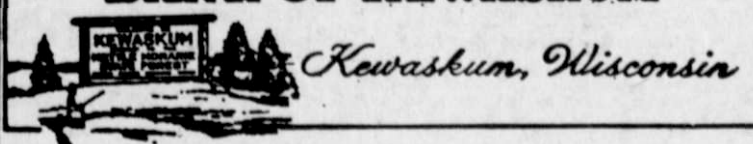

Mr. Vorpahl was born Apr. 9, 1889 in the town of Farmington, Kewaskum rural route, a son of the late Louis and Minnie Plitzkow Vorpahl. He was married to the former Minnie Nelson at Breed, Wis. Jan. 29, 1925.

He was the father of 10 children, four of whom, two sons and two daughters, preceded him in death. Surviving are his widow, four daughters and two sons, Beatrice (Mrs. Ben Fellenz) of West Bend, Lois (Mrs. Lee Breikreitz) of Allenton, Miss Doris Vorpahl of Kewaskum, Louis, Jr. of West Bend, Charles of Forest lake and Anna (Mrs. Marvin Berndt) of Cedar lake; 14 grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Joe Koelsch, of West Bend; three brothers living, William Vorpahl of rural West Bend, John of Kewaskum and Andrew of rural Kewaskum, and many other relatives.

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Rash of Mishaps Occur; Car Driver, Pedestrian Hurt

2 HIT-AND-RUN CRASHES TAKE PLACE IN VILLAGE

Traffic officers were kept busy the past week as a rash of auto accidents occurred in Kewaskum and surrounding area. A total of eight mishaps were reported in which one car driver and a pedestrian were injured.

Car Crashes Into Tree, House

Orrin H. Carter, 39, R. 1, Campbellsport, was taken to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, at 7:13 a. m. Friday with a severe head injury following a one-car accident in which his auto left the road, sheared off a 10-

inch tree and struck a home on County Trunk V about two miles north of Kewaskum.

Carter was headed south on V and he passed a car going in the same direction. After returning to his own lane of traffic the car left the road, veered through a ditch, continued on across the edge of a field for some distance, then hit and clipped off the tree in the yard of the Alvin Panzer property and struck the north side of the Panzer home. Panzer recently purchased the property from the Kehn Brothers (John, Vincent and William) who with their sister Heldegard still occupy the house.

Two windows were broken in the home and the northeast corner of the building was damaged. No one in the home was injured. The auto also caught fire and the Kewaskum fire department was called. They responded with two fire trucks and the ambulance, which removed Carter to the hospital. Spectators at the scene shoveled dirt onto the burning car motor and one tire and had the blaze pretty well under control when firemen arrived to finish the job with extinguishers. The car was demolished by the crash and fire.

Pedestrian Hit by Car, Hurt

Mac Schumacher, Kewaskum, suffered bruises when he was struck by a car while walking along Hwy. 28 about one quarter of a mile east of Kewaskum at the Art Ramthun farm at 10:45 p. m. Friday. He was removed to St. Joseph's Community hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance, where he was still confined this week.

Schumacher was walking east on the highway when he was hit by an auto driven by Mrs. Joe Enright, R. 1, Kewaskum, which was traveling in the opposite direction. According to police, two cars were parked along the highway at the scene, facing east with their lights on. Schumacher was walking around the cars when he was struck by Mrs. Enright, who claimed she was unable to see him because of being partially blinded by the car lights facing her.

Car Runs Into Semi-Trailer

An auto driven by Leo Wiedmeyer, 54, R. 2, Kewaskum struck a semi-trailer driven by William Timblin, 32, R. 1, Eden, at the intersection of Fond du Lac ave.

and Main st. at 10:15 p. m. Monday.

Police reported that Wiedmeyer was driving west on Main st. when he failed to make a complete stop at the intersection. He drove out onto the highway and struck the side of the Timblin tractor, which was traveling north on the highway, running into the saddle gas tank of the tractor. The front end of Wiedmeyer's car was damaged and minor damage was also caused to the Timblin truck. Wiedmeyer was charged with arterial highway violation.

Two Hit-and-Run Mishaps

The left rear and side of an auto owned by William Key, Jr., 49, 509 Main st., which was parked at the curb, were damaged when the vehicle was struck by a hit-and-run driver at 4:05 a. m. Sunday.

The hit-and-run auto was traveling east on Main st. when it struck the parked Key car. The driver failed to stop and continued east out of the village on Hwy. 28. After making an investigation throughout the day Sunday, local police picked up the hit-and-run driver the same evening. He is a 16-year-old rural Kewaskum youth (names of juveniles arrested cannot be published) and was ordered to appear Monday morning at the Kewaskum police station, where he was charged with hit-and-run driving-jvenile. The right front of the hit-and-run car was also damaged.

In another mishap in which the driver was charged with failure to report an accident occurred between 8 and 9:30 p. m. Monday, May 1, on School st. in front of Kewaskum High school. The left side of a car owned by Glen J. Klug, 17, R. 1, Kewaskum, which was parked in front of the school, was damaged when it was backed into by an unknown vehicle.

Klug reported the incident to police, who began investigating and searching for a red car, the color of which was determined by the paint marks on Klug's auto. While on patrol duty two nights later (Wednesday) Officer Marriener Frank discovered a red car with minor damage and investigated. The car was owned by Marie B. Weeks, 31, 251 Clinton st., Kewaskum, who admitted that she struck another vehicle at the high school but did not report it because she did not believe there was sufficient damage to necessitate reporting it.

Car Runs Into Ditch

William Candee, 17, R. 2, Campbellsport, escaped injury in a one-car accident four miles southwest of West Bend at 9 p. m. Saturday.

He told Washington county authorities that he was blinded by the lights of a vehicle stopped for a stop sign at the junction of CTH NN and a town road. He drove into the ditch. He said he was not familiar with the road.

Two Hurt When Car Rolls Over

Charles Smith, 17, R. 1, Campbellsport, and his passenger, Steven Beck, 14, Campbellsport, were hurt at 1:15 p. m. Saturday on Hwy. 67 in the town of Auburn when Smith's car ran off a curve and rolled over, causing the driver to be thrown from the auto. Smith was taken to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, for treatment of head cuts and leg and arm injuries. Beck sustained minor bruises and was not hospitalized.

Other Accidents Occur

Kewaskum police reported another minor crash in the village which occurred this week in which there was only slight damage.

Two mishaps in the Waucousta area were also reported by Fond du Lac county police.

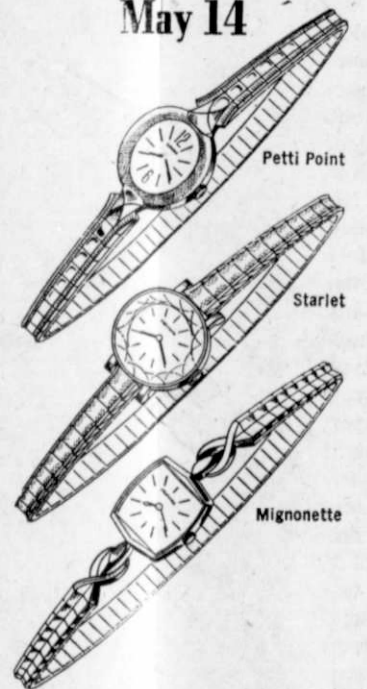

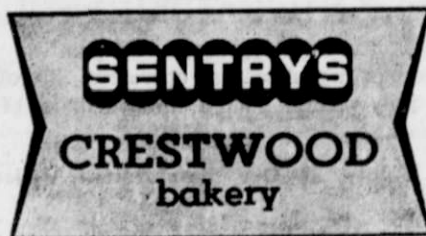

Mr. Larry Ellingson of the Doane Appraisal Service explained to the board the scope of the work he will be doing in the coming months in making the appraisal of all property for the Village of Kewaskum.

ORDINANCE NO. 67-1
AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO FINES FOR DISORDERLY CONDUCT AND OBSCENE LANGUAGE

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin do ordain as follows:

(1) Repeal and recreate Sections 9.04 (1) (2) (3) (4a) of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum, relating to the amount of fine to be imposed in reference to DISORDERLY CONDUCT AND OBSCENE LANGUAGE.

(2) Fines 9.04 (1) (2) (3) (4a) delete the wording "...a fine of not less than one (\$1.00) dollar nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars,..." and in its place substitute "...a fine of not less than one (\$1.00) dollar nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars,..."

(3) This ordinance shall be in effect and in full force upon passage and publication as provided by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 67-2
AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO SIDE YARD RESTRICTIONS
The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

(1) Repeal and recreate Section 10.05 of the Municipal Code of the Village of Kewaskum relating to side yard restrictions in SINGLE AND MULTIPLE FAMILY RESIDENCE DISTRICTS.

(2) 10.05 Sideyards: For buildings not over 1½ stories high, the sum of the widths of the required side yards shall not be less than 15 feet and no single side yard shall be less than 7 feet in width.

(3) This ordinance shall be in effect and in full force upon passage and publication as provided by law.
