





### Safety Program Given at Woman's **Club** Meeting

Patrolman Merl Neuman Richfield, a one-year veteran of the Wisconsin Highway Patrol, was the guest speaker Saturday, May 20, at the Kewaskum Woman's club meeting. A movie entitled "Guardians of the Road" was shown to illustrate the training program and duties of a patrolman.

The highway patrol started unofficially in 1927 with 46 men. It became an official organization in 1939 and today has a force of 300 men, just about one half of what is needed. During the years more authority was given to the patrol, but restrictions and lack of personnel still hamper effective control in some areas.

From 1956-64 60% of the drivers killed in Wisconsin had been under the influence of alcohol. In 1966 22% killed were between the ages of 16 and 20 although this age group comprises only 42% of the drivers. 92% of the driver training course. 700,000 have never taken a driver's test and 25% of the vehicles on the highway do not meet safety standards.







The provisions of this amended Rule of Order shall not apply to per-sons presently on the County Board of Public Welfare but shall apply to any persons elected hereafter.

2. A paragraph entitled "Bargaining Committee" shall be inserted between the paragraphs of Section 18 entitled Salary Committee and Education Committee, to read as follows:

BARGAINING COMMITTEE — Whenever any county de-partment properly petitions for negotiations of wages, hours and conditions of employment under the terms of Sect. 111.70 of the Statutes, the Chairman of the Board shall appoint a bargaining committee consisting of five persons, including the head of the department involved, the District Attorney, and three Board members, one of whom shall be the Chairman of the Committee presently designated to handle the affairs of the particular coun-ty department, which bargaining committee shall have authority to negotiate with representatives of the employees with reference to wages, hours and conditions of employment; the said com-mittee shall be the sole committee entrusted with the power and authority to negotiate with the employees as aforesaid and shall have authority to enter into a binding agreement thereon with the properly qualified representatives of the employees, said agreement to be signed by the Board members of the said com-mittee; any rules of this Board which are in conflict herewith are hereby amended so as to comply with the intent and purpose of this rule. The Chairman shall appoint a bargaining committee at the organizational meeting of the Board for those county de-partments in which negotiations have taken place in the past; a bargaining committee may be appointed for any other depart-ment as uch time as it is needed.

### REPORT No. 14 **Annual Report** Washington County Board of Supervisors 1966 University Extension

### Washington County

The Washington County University Extension agents hereby present a combined report of their activities for 1966. Further information on any of the listed projects is available upon request.

The activities of the Extension agents are listed under five main headings.

### **Production and Management**

Production and management are still of major interest to all agriculturists. For the most part, the activities within this cate-gory were the cow testing association (D.H.I.A.), the dairy breed associations, fruit growers association, swine breeders, soil test-ing, the farm management association, field days on farms, weed control information, and information made available on the varied questions concerning weeds, insects, and diseases.

The livestock projects in the 4-H Club department are con-cerned primarily with the dairy business; however, there is also interest in swine, sheep, and coming to the fore in 1966 was a genuine interest in the horse project.

### Marketing and Utilization

Of major interest in Washington County in this category have been the dairy promotion activities, both by 4-H Clubs and by the general public. The agents, working with local leaders and or-ganized groups, have been able to develop new projects and new ideas to call attention to the dairy business during the course of the vear. of the year. **Home Economics** 

- Cleaned up a beach for swimming.

- Cooperated with the fire department to plant flowers, shrubs, and other plants around the fire department building.
- Started a nature trail through their forest. - Each 4-H family planted a tree, shrub, or a package of flower seeds
- · Made litter bags.

### **Community Resource Development and Public Affairs**

Activities in this category have been concerned with con-servation of natural resources, with the emphasis on soil con-servation; small market fairs were craftsmen are given an op-portunity to show and sell; planting of 300,000 trees in 1966; continued work in the Dutch elm disease program; and a com-munity beautification project developed through the 4-H Clubs of the county.

The Kettle Moraine of southeastern Wisconsin is the young-est geological phenomenon known today. It is the result of a glacier that covered an area from Hudson Bay to about Chicago, and from New York to Montana. This glacier had a far-reaching effect upon the topography of this area. The land forms that exist include moulin kames, drumlins, eskers, terrance escarpments, varving, crevasse fillings, drainageways, and others.

There has been a great deal of interest in the last ten years in trying to understand the Kettle Moraine. A project has been developed with the use of slides, lectures, field trips, and printed material, that is made available to schools and other groups that would like to understand more about the Kettle Moraine.

#### MERGER

During 1966 a merger took place at the University of Wisconsin, combining the Cooperative Extension Service, the University of Wisconsin Extension Division, and the radio and television departments, into "University Extension."

The Agricultural Committee will still be the director of the Extension programs in counties, although there will be some changes made as a result of this merger. Programs can now be widened to take in a variety of subjects, as needs are identified by people.

There are many new ideas being developed to facilitiate the teaching of new information that results from research: closed circuit FM radio, area agents who have a particular interest that will serve only a few counties; direct line telephone communica-tion; and package programs. These are but a few of the many techniques now perfected that could become a part of a teaching program. Time alone can tell its effectiveness, and how it will be used in any county within the state.

Of major interest in the 4-H projects this year were teenage needs, and an entire project was developed in this category.

Approximately 1125 4-H Club members are being directed in various projects and activities by 335 adult volunteer leaders.

Within the past few years the entire country has become concerned about the beauty of our land. With national emphasis on natural beauty, the 4-H Clubs of Washington County decided to give special emphasis to the program in 1966. Club activities as reported to the Extension office:

- Cleaned up the debris along the fenceline of a cemetery.
- Cooperated and worked with the local PTA, the school board, and the school faculty, to landscape a school. Continued working on their own wayside.
- Bought a rubbish container to be placed on the village street.
- Planted flowers in flower boxes.

Mr. Jerry Gundrum, a citizen from the Village of Slinger, was called upon to explain a project that he was interested in. He stated that Washington County had many possibilities for attracting tourists, and industry, and he suggested that the coun-ty board make a contribution toward the printing of a leaflet advertising the scenic spots and historical areas in our county. He felt that a pamphlet of this type would do much for the develop-ment of interest in our county. Moved by Mr. Schmidt, seconded by Mr. Kuhn, that this matter be referred to the Industrial De-velopment Committee for study and recommendation. Motion carried. carried.

Father - to have his family together with him to avoid the extra hours necessary in traveling and to provide a whole-some family atmosphere.

Infant - security of the attentions, love, and care that only parents can provide

A wheelchair was obtained for the mother to aid her in moving about the house. Through the women of a local church, her mother and mother-in-law, a schedule was set up to provide the care and help necessary while the father was gone. Being in her own home, relieved emotional tensions and provided suffi-cient outlets for activity, so that the need for injections was reduc-ed and oral Rx substituted.

The arrangements were, of course, temporary, because the mother's condition will deteriorate. But happiness was theirs for a longer time than was possible under conditions existing prior to the Public Health Nurse's visit.

The community has become aware and concerned and will continue to be a source for emotional support when future prob-lems arise . . . in this case, as in many, the desire to be helpful needs some direction.

#### CASE II

Referred by the family physician - a middle-aged grand-mother with a Cardiovascular disease. Cared for in a hospital and nursing home. Now able to be home with daughter and her family. Home visit made to determine her needs:

- Physicial Therapy and routine of exercises to be done to maintain present amount of range-of-motion and hopefully, to increase independence.
- Morning care and exercise routine to be done by someone outside the family to relieve young mother during her busiest hours preparing breakfasts and getting children off to school and little ones settled for the day.
- 3. Reassurance to daughter that the weeping spells her mother had were due to her Cardiovascular disease, not unhappiness with her daughter.
- Financial arrangements to meet cost of care

5. Plan of care presented to physician for approval.

Financial arrangements made through the Public Welfare Department. Physical Therapy evaluation (Division of Chronic Disease and Aging) to verify Public Health Nurse's recommen-dations of physical therapy needs. He also suggested minor aids to help the individual get in and out of bed more independently. Arrangements made with local Physical Therapist to give neces-sary therapy weekly. A nurse in the general vicinity agreed to give the morning care, range-of-motion exercises, and generally supervise individual's recovery. Field Worker for Department of Versting and Adult Federation and Public the visit and Vocational and Adult Education and Rehabilitation to visit and arrange for crafts instructor to give instruction in the home.

Progress toward total rehabilitation is slow. The individual needs much moral support and to be reminded of progress made. The sooner rehabilitation is begun, the better the results. It is just as important that there be no lapse of care between discharge from hospital or nursing home and administration to Public Health Nursing Service. Once defeat and disillusionment are ac-cepted at home, remotivation to continue exercises and self-care activities become a difficult time-consuming process. activities become a difficult, time-consuming process

GENERAL HEALTH SUPERVISION is, as the statistics point out, more often concerned with children. It means working with the parents, usually the mother, to help plan to understand and meet total health needs for the family.

This might involve adequate rest plus nutrition (many chil-dren are sent to school with too little sleep and no breakfast). Or, amazing as it may seem the obese child who usually has the potato chips, candy bars, cake and cookies, with possibly one sandwich and no fruit in his lunch.

The child may appear listless and anti-social at school or in the neighborhood. Often times, this is the child who had no pre-school physical and has not seen a physician since infancy. If physical proves negative, then more visits are necessary to help parents understand a child's normal development and needs. Sometimes it's as simple as just planning to give him 15 minutes of parents' time each day, or helping him select and perform worthwhile duties at home to build up his self-confidence . . . . along with the performance must come expressions of apprecia-tion for a job well done — his reward. There may be a marital conflict or personality problems within the family that require the help of a specialist. Then the Public Health Nurse must help family to feel comfortable in seeking the help necessary. It may be something outside the home, a bully in the neighborhood that the child has been afraid to talk about, or a teacher-student per-sonality conflict, or the like.

### Handicaps that require our services primarily for children include: Hearing, Vision, Dental, and Orthopedic.

The financial burden for sudden medical care can create a financial burden for many families who otherwise meet their needs adequately. E. i., five children in a family needing Vision exams and corrective lenses could mean going into debt further or prolonging remedial care. A family may not have felt that routine **Dental** care is important. Suddenly it seems, the older children are devolping toothaches in permanent teeth and the smaller children's primary teeth are in even worse condition. Remedial work must be done without delay if the teeth are to be saved. A child is tested and discovered to have a marked **Hearing** loss. 150 audiograms to determine hearing loss, with results sent to the family physician, were done. Exam by a specialist is necessary to determine treatment: corrective surgery? preferential seating in the classroom? hearing aid? lip reading? speech seating in the classroom? hearing aid? lip reading? speech therapy? Each year his new teacher must be made aware of his current needs if he is to perform adequately in the classroom.

No agency can meet total needs independently. In the past year, the Public Health Nursing Service has cooperated with ... Welfare department ... probation officer ... juvenile officer

**Red Cross** . . . reimbursed instructors to teach home nursing and first-aid courses in some schools. They also organized and oriented school aids for one area.

Emma Kuehlthau Trust Fund . . . has provided medical and dental care for children in Washington County in need of care that parents cannot provide who are not eligible for help from other accurate other agencies.

Washington County Dental Society ... This group has devised a program by which dental care will be provided at reduced cost for low-income families. A number of children received help through this plan.

We also wish to acknowledge the special help certain indivi-duals have contributed by furnishing transportation, neighborly help and concern, wise counsel and advice, and moral support and interest. I am sure they wish to remain annonymous, but a hearty "Thank You" to each.

### **REPORT No. 21** Family Health Supervision

Population: 34,619 (excluding the City of West Bend)

47 individuals were seen concerning health problems during the past year

To serve their needs, 116 visits to our office and  $410\ \text{v}$  isits to the individuals were made.

9 more visits were made to provide demonstrations in health care

420 trips to resource agencies and personnel were made to discuss and plan to meet the needs of our 447 case load.

What does the Public Health Nurse do during these office, field, and behalf of visits? We have picked two cases hoping to illustrate total Public Health nursing care. The two cases cited are included in the total numbers under NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES, on page 8.)

#### CASE I

- Mother Chronic disease which is progressive. She is unable to care for her infant. Is in bed at home of her mother. Infant cared for by her mother who has her own large family.
- Father young lad, good income, in debt for new home built to meet wife's handicap. Bills for medication now make it difficult to meet general family needs and house payments. Alternates between sleeping in his empty home and that of his parents'

Infant - healthy, normal infant

- Referred by family Public Health Nurse visited families in-volved, contacted physicians and religious counselors involved.
- Needs Mother someone to help care for infant and home while father is working. Also, someone to administer injections for pain. -- 83 --

Welfare department . . . probation officer . . juvenile officer . . . mental health clinic . . . district veterinarian . . . extension office . . . probate court . . . veterans service . . . and local health officers, district and state agencies.

The family physician is responsible for the family's care. The Public Health Nurse works in close cooperation with him.

The Washington County Public Health Nursing Service .... participated in the organization of the Washington County Mental Health Association.

Without the voluntary, philanthropic organizations of Wash-ington County, the Public Health Nursing program would be most handicapped. These are the groups who find the finances, trans-portation, etc., necessary to help families follow-through.

Washington County Easter Seal Society . . . During the past year, the Loan Closet met the needs of wheelchairs, beds, walkers, and crutches for about 80 individuals. This group also sponsored 15 handicapped children and 3 handicapped adults to Camp Waubeek.

Lion's Club . . . throughout Washington County paid for vision exams for all who were referred and all blind children to a session at Camp.

Kiwanis . . . authorized 2 children for diabetic camp and con-tributed to Easter Seal's camp fund.

The Cancer Society . . . furnished dressings for all cancer patients who requested them.

P.T.A. and the Homemakers groups .... furnished volunteers for vision screening

Migrant Ministry. Inc. . . . met social and educational needs for migrant families staying the winter and organized Head Start programs, with Federal funds, for children of migrant families. Their social worker and nurses help families to meet their medical needs.

Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association . . . skin-tested and paid \$5.00 toward each X-ray of persons with positive skin tests - 600 workers at one industry.

I, the undersigned Sheriff of Washington County, hereby submit to you the report of the Washington County Sheriff's Department for the period commencing October 1, 1965 through September 30, 1966.

The total number of prisoners registered in the County Jail was 722 (an increase of 132 over the previous year.) Of this num-ber 567 were male adults, 15 female adults, 115 male juveniles and 24 female juveniles. The total number of meals served to pri-soners was 13,691 meals an increase of 2,282 meals.

Sixty five prisoners served time under the Huber Law. The amount of their earnings was \$18,437.60. \$5,906.25 was turned over to the County Treasurer for board, \$1,933.00 was paid for support of dependents and the balance was turned over to the prisoner upon his release.

upon his release. One Thousand Four Hundred Eighty-two Civil Processes were served for a total of \$5,268.10. Four Hundred Sixty-nine copies of accident reports were sent out for a total of \$938.00.

The radio dispatchers answered 17,320 night watchman calls from industries in the City of West Bend, 8,760 calls from City of Hartford, sent and received 111,346 radio messages, sent 4,238 and received 7,139 teletype messages, answered 54 fire calls, 97 rescue calls and received 2,560 complaints of various incidents.

The Traffic Patrol traveled a total of 408,970 miles, investi-gated 781 accidents and conducted 542 escorts.

(5) For the purchase of machinery and for machinery repairs, sum of Seventy-Five Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$75,-00). the sun 000.00).

(6) For administration, including salaries, per diem, office and travel expense of the County Highway Committee, the County Highway Commissioner, his clerks and assistants not paid from construction or maintenance funds, the sum of Thirty Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$30,000.00).

(7) For Snow Removal and Snow, Drift and Ice Prevention on the County Trunk Highway System, the sum of One Hundred Twenty Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$120,000.00) Total Authorized in the Section \$455,000.00

**SECTION IV.** WHEREAS appropriations are made herein, in addition to the amounts to be received from the State and available for work in the County under Section 20.420 of the Statutes.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the County Board does hereby levy a tax on all of the property in the County to meet such appropriations as follows:

(1) For the various purposes as set forth in Section III hereof the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty Five Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$455,000.00)

WARNING: It is directed that provision for this levy shall be made in the county budget, but that this levy shall not be duplicated.

**SECTION V.** WHEREAS the various highway activities for which provision is made in this resolution are continuous from year to year, and the exact cost of any work can not be known at the time of making the appropriation therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this Board does hereby direct that any balance remaining in any appropriation for a specific highway improvement after the same shall have been completed may be used by the County Highway Committee to make up any deficit that may occur in any other improvement, which is part of the same item in the county budget, for which provision is herein made, and any balance remaining at the end of the year in any highway fund shall remain and be available for the same purpose in the ensuing year.

**SECTION VI.** WHEREAS the exact amount of the funds that will become available from the State for highway purposes in the county under Section 20.420 of the Statutes will not be known until on or after June 30, 1967

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to make payments for the purposes for which such funds are to be used, as hereinbefore authorized, from any funds in the county treasury that are not required for the purpose for which appropriated prior to August 1, 1967 and to reimburse such funds in the county treasury from the sums received under Section 20.420 of the Statutes.

SECTION VII. WHEREAS the County Highway Committee and the County Highway Commissioner are charged with the duty and responsibility of carrying out the construction and maintenance of highways for which provision is made, and other related supervisory and administrative duties.

BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Commissioner shall have the authority to employ, discharge, suspend, or rein-state any such personnel as he deems necessary for such purposes, provided, however, that the County Highway Committee may by action recorded in its minutes determine the number of per-sons to be hired and may also at any time by action so recorded order the County Highway Commissioner to employ, discharge, suspend, or reinstate any such person. The term "personnel" or "person" shall include all patrolmen, laborers, foremen, clerks, stenographers or other employees necessary to carry on such activities.

SECTION VIII. WHEREAS for the construction and main-tenance of highways, including the removal and control of snow and ice, it becomes necessary from time to time to purchase equipment, the nature of and necessity for which can not be accurately anticipated,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the County Highway Committee is hereby authorized pursuant to Section 83.015 (2) of the Statutes, to purchase without further authority, and to the extent that revolving funds accumulated for such purpose or ap-propriations made for such purpose are available, such highway equipment as they deem necessary to properly carry on the work, and to trade or sell such old equipment as may be considered to be for the best interests of the county.

From October 1, 1965 to October 1, 1966 we had 1,579 veterans or members of their families visit our offices at West Bend and Hartford. There were 110 contacts made outside of our offices.

As of October 1, 1966 our office had processed forty (40) compensation and pension cases. As your Service Officer I made six (6) trips to the V. A. Regional office for approval of some of these cases. I also made thirteen (13) trips to the Wisconsin De-partment of Veterans Affairs, at Madison, to have Second Mort-gage Loans approved gage Loans approved.

Seventy-six (76) trips were made, in which one hundred four (104) veterans were transported to Wood Hospital for medical care and treatment. One veteran was transported to the V. A. Hospital at Tomah, Wisconsin.

From October 1, 1965 to October 1, 1966 our office processed forty-two (42) W.D.V.A. Second Mortgage Loans. These loans totaled \$674,460.00 in actual sale price. Since January 1, 1959 our office has processed one hundred ninety-seven (197) W.D.V.A. Second Mortgage Loans for a total sum of \$680,315.00 second mortgage money. At the present time our office has in process eleven (11) W.D.V.A. Housing Loans and seven (7) Economic Assistance Loans.

Nine (9) W.D.V.A. Medical Grants and Rehabilitation Loans were made through our office.

Our office has also processed twenty-four (24) applications for the Peacetime Veterans' Program of Education, and six (6) applications for V. A. Housing Loans, plus forty-seven (47) W.D.-V.A. applications for Reimbursement of Part-Time Study Courses.

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The chair informed the Board that the Insurance Committee did hold a meeting prior to this session, for the purpose of exam-ining bids submitted on term life insurance to be considered as a fringe benefit for all of the employees of the county. 

The Civil Service Commission hereinafter provided for is requested to consider the service of war veterans making application hereunder. For eligibility a rating of 70 per cent is required of all applicants, but hon-orably discharged war veterans have five points added and need earn a rating of only 65 in the written examination only.

#### SECTION IV

At all places in the said Ordinance No. 1 where the phrase "deputy sheriffs" appears there shall be added thereto the phrase "jailers and radio operators".

#### SECTION V

This ordinance shall be in force and effect upon passage and publication. All other ordinances and resolutions or parts of ordinances or resolutions in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

### ORDINANCE No. 5

### An Ordinance to Regulate and License Hay Racks and Sleigh Rides in Washington County

The County Board of Supervisors of the County of Wash-ington do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. The owner of a vehicle to be operated upon a highway in this county for the purpose of transporting persons for hire in what is commonly known as a hayrack ride, a sleigh box sled or bob sled, or a ride of similar nature, and every person who is to operate such a vehicle shall obtain an annual license from the County Board before operating such a vehicle.

SECTION 2. The authority and obligation for the issuance of such license is hereby delegated to the County Clerk.

SECTION 3. The County Clerk shall not issue a license for any of the vehicles mentioned in Section 1 until the applicant exhibits proof that he is a person of good moral character and produces a certificate of insurance as proof that liability insurance will be in force for the protection of his passengers in the mini-mum amount of \$10,000.00 for any one passenger and \$50,000.00 for any single accident. Sect. 204.30(4) of the Wisconsin Statutes is applicable to the insurance required under this section, whether the vehicle is a motor vehicle or is propelled in some other manner.

SECTION 4. No vehicle licensed pursuant to this section shall be operated upon a highway for the purpose of transporting persons for hire unless it is equipped with at least one red reflec-tor at each of the two rear corners of the vehicle and with at least one reflector at each of the two front corners of the vehicle and at the front of the pole or tongue. All such reflectors shall be of the type approved by the Motor Vehicle Department.

SECTION 5. No person shall be issued a license to operate any vehicle in Section 1 unless such person shall hold a valid Wisconsin Driver's License.

SECTION 6. The owner or operator of any vehicle operated in violation of any provision of this ordinance may forfeit not more than \$100.00.

SECTION 7. The County Clerk shall charge a fee of \$1.00 for each license issued

SECTION 8. The County Board may, after notice and hearing accorded the licensee, revoke any license issued by it or its delegee pursuant to this section whenever, in its judgment, the public safety so requires.

SECTION 9. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

The Insurance Committee Washington County Board West Bend, Wisconsin

#### Gentlemen:

The members of the Washington County Underwriters Asso-ciation, through the undersigned committee, are pleased to pre-sent for your consideration our annual report of insurance cov-erage for the County. To assist County officials, we wish to do this efficiently and economically.

As in prior years, we have used as a basis for our report the 1958 appraisal as made for the County by the Rau Appraisal Company covering the County buildings. The buildings included in their appraisal report are the Court House Annex, Historical Society and Civil Defense Building, County Hospital and Auxiliary Buildings, County Home, West Bend Highway Shop and Slinger Highway Shop, and 4-H Club Barns. The value of the new Court House and Jail was taken from figures supplied by the Office of the County Clerk.

The writing of the insurance under this plan has not only provided better coverage but has also resulted in a considerable premium saving to the County.

Builders Risk policies provide coverage on the Home and Hospital (The Samaritan) now under construction. These policies insure against the hazards of fire, lightning, and vandalism and malicious mischief, and extended coverage.

A separate policy provides coverage on the Slinger Oil Tank Station. This policy written in the amount of \$15,000.00 uses the Oil Distribution Station form which provides coverage to "real and personal property both above and below ground including underground tanks, contents of tanks, piping and connections, petroleum products, awnings, signs and metal smokestacks".

### **Public Liability Insurance**

This coverage is written on a comprehensive policy form. It includes Contractors' Liability covering highway operations; Owners' and Tenants' Liability on all County real estate, build-ings, elevators; and Automobile Liability with the following lim-its:

We are happy to call to the attention of the County Board that there is a considerable saving on the renewal liability pre-mium due to the good experience enjoyed.

The present liability limits appear to be adequate for most claims. We do know that claims are becoming more numerous since the waiver of immunity from tort liability on the part of municipal corporations with the emphasis being placed on in-creased liability limits for insurance coverages written on govern-mental units. We recommend an umbrella liability policy which would provide liability coverage up to \$1,000,000.00 in addition to the above listed limits. This latter policy would also pick up many other liability hazards in cases where the primary coverage is inadequate or contains exclusions for a specific claim or inci-dent. This coverage is usually written with a \$25,000.00 deductible. We would be very happy at your request to have insurance com-pany engineers make a survey of the County exposures and submit a quotation for your consideration. We recommend that the Board avail themselves of this additional protection.

#### Workmen's Compensation

The County, to date, has again elected to provide their own workmen's compensation and employers' liability coverage.

The increased number of employees of the County over the years, may result in an increase in the number of claims. It is suggested that consideration again be given to having such coverage provided by a private carrier.

#### **Boiler** Explosion

All boilers and compressed air tanks are insured in the amount of \$100,000.00 for damage to County property and the property of others, and for personal injury to the public, exclud-ing employees who are covered under Workmen's Compensa-tion. Credit has been allowed for seasonal use of such equipment that qualifies.

#### Automobiles And Trucks

The County's investment in passenger cars is covered for full value under the comprehensive form. Trucks are fully cov-ered against loss by fire only. Windstorm and hail damage may be added, if desired, at a rate of 10c per \$100.00. This coverage applies regardless of where the loss occurs. County owned cars have Comprehensive coverage. There is no collision insurance on any of the County's cars or trucks. The total insurance on the automobiles and trucks is in the amount of \$423,175.00.

#### Other Highway Equipment

This equipment is fully covered under a floater policy against loss by fire, lightning, windstorm, flood, collapse of bridges, col-lision, etc. regardless of location. This equipment is insured for \$723,470.00. Theft is covered subject to a \$25.00 deductible clause. Collision or upset is covered subject to a \$100 deductible clause.

#### Radio Equipment On Cars - Guns - Cameras

There is a floater policy covering radio equipment in the amount of \$25,915.00 on sheriff's and police cars as well as 8 mobile radios of the Highway Department for full value, sub-stantially as above. The radio tower and equipment in the con-crete block control house are included in the floater policy. There is also a floater policy covering guns of the sheriff's department in the amount of \$795.00. Camera equipment of the sheriff's de-partment is insured for \$535.00 under the floater policy.

#### Bonds

Bonds for all County officials and employees are properly filed. It is suggested that the bonds for the Clerk of Courts and other qualified officials, whose offices are now handling addi-tional funds, be increased to statutory requirements.

#### Money And Securities

Money and securities of the County are now covered in the amount of \$3,000.00, with a limit on money alone of \$2,000.00 while in the premises or being carried by a messenger and a limit of \$4,466.00 for money and securities and \$3,466.00 on money out-side of the premises. During the month of March these limits are increased to \$8,000 with a limit on money of \$7,000 to meet the additional needs during tax collection time.

It is a pleasure to work with your Committee. It is always our desire to give the County Board the best insurance service possible.

With reference to the 1958 appraisal, we feel it was good judgement on the part of the members of the County Board to have had this appraisal made as it helps to determine the replacement and net sound values of the respective County build-ings. We again suggest that serious consideration be given to have a new appraisal made to bring values of County properties up to date. Such an appraisal could be used as a basis for bringing insurance coverages to value.

Comparative Cost charts as furnished by Engineering De-partments of Insurance Companies show that building costs have increased approximately 1.09% since our last report. There is no apparent indication of a reversal of this advance in the coming months. We feel that the insurance presently carried complies with the insurance requirement as revealed in our analysis of building costs building costs

The appraisal referred to above did not include valuations of contents located in any of the above buildings listed. We again suggest that the various department heads report to your Com-mittee as to the value of contents of the various departments located in the respective buildings so that the proper insurance be provided.

The insurance applying to the County building and contents was rewritten as of December 1, 1962, under the Public and In-stitutional Property plan. The coverages provided insure against the hazards of fire, lightning, extended coverage, vandalism and malicious mischief, subject to a \$100.00 deductible applying to all losses other than fire and lightning claims.

The total insurance amount is blanket on all real and personal property of every description owned by the County; on personal property of others for which the Insured assumed liability prior to loss; on the Insured's liability imposed by law for loss to per-sonal property of others, and on the Insured's interest in personal property belonging in whole or in part to others.

The building and contents "Statement of Values" are filed annually with the Fire Insurance Rating Bureau and is also used as a basis for the insurance. (A copy of the latest filing is attach-ed.)

## A Resolution Creating a County Park and Planning Commission

WHEREAS, there is a need for the creation of a County Park and Planning Commission under Chapter 27 of the Wiscon-sin Statutes and under Section 59.97 of the Wisconsin Statutes;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of Supervisors of Washington County that;

### SECTION 1. Establishment

There is hereby established a County Park and planning Commission for Washington County in accordance with Section 27.02 of the Wisconsin Statutes to replace any other park, plan-- 152 -

ning or zoning agencies existing or heretofore created by the County Board in all matters pertaining to county zoning under Section 59.97

### SECTION 2. MEMBERSHIP

ATION 2. MEMBERSHIP a. The County Park and Planning Commission shall consist of seven (7) members. Two members shall be county Board Supervisors and five members shall be citizen mem-bers of recognized experience and qualifications appointed by the County Board Chairman, subject to confirmation by the County Board of Supervisors. The Supervisors shall be members only while they hold office as County Board Super-visors. Said appointments shall be made in writing and filed in the office of the County Clerk.

b. **Ex-officio Members.** The County Zoning Adminis-trator and Highway Commissioner shall serve as ex-officio non-voting members of the Commission.

c. Term of each member shall be for seven (7) years commencing on July 1, 1966 except that the first seven mem-bers shall be appointed respectively for such terms that on July 1 in each of the seven years next following the year in which they are appointed the term of one member will expire. Replacements shall be appointed by the Chairman of the County Board subject to confirmation by the County Board of Supervisors, annually in the month of June to succeed the member whose term next expires on July 1.

d. Officers. Officers shall be the Chairman and Secre-tary. The Chairman shall be selected by the Commission members at the annual meeting in July for a term of one year. The Secretary shall be elected by the Commission members at the annual meeting in July for a term of (1)

Official Oaths shall be taken by all members in accor-dance with Section 19.01 of the Wisconsin Statutes within ten (10) days of receiving notice of their appointments.

Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as appointments or elections for the full term but a member so appointed shall serve only for the duration of the term of the member he replaces.

### SECTION 3. Organization.

a. The County Park and Planning Commission shall convene at the Courthouse within thirty (30) days after their appointment and shall organize and adopted rules for its own government in accordance with the provisions of this Resolution.

b. **Meetings** shall be held monthly at the call of the Commission Chairman or a majority of the full Commission and shall be open to the public.

c. Standing and Special Committees may be appointed by the Chairman.

d. Quorum shall be four (4) commissioners, and all ac-tions shall require approval of a majority of the full Commis-sion except a motion to adjourn.

e. A Written Record shall be kept showing all actions taken, resolutions, findings, determinations, transactions, and recommendations made; and a copy shall be filed with the County Clerk as a public record.

### SECTION 4. Powers

The County Park and Planning Commission shall have such powers as may be necessary to enable it to perform its functions and duties and promote rural and park planning; and such powers shall include the following:

a. To Make By-laws, use a common seal and choose from its members all necessary officers.

b. To Appoint such agents and employees as may be necessary to carry out is functions.

c. To Have Charge and Supervision of all county parks and county reservations subject to the County Board's super-vision and regulations as prescribed in Section 27.05 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

d. To Make Reports and Recommendations on any phase of planning to the County Board.

### SECTION 5. Duties.

The County Park and Planning Commission shall have the following functions and duties:

a. To Make A Thorough Study of the county with ref-erence to making reservations and acquisitions of lands there-in for public uses and improvement of such lands for parks, playgrounds, forest reservations, parkways, and boulevards and report the same to the County Board.

b. To Make Surveys, Maps, and Plans of a compre-hensive county park system and report the same to the Coun-ty Board.

c. To Make Surveys, Maps, and Plans of a county sys-tem of streets and parkways and report the same to the County Board.

To Draft a Proposed Zoning Ordinance for the County 's consideration in accordance with Section 59.97(2) Board's consideration in of the Wisconsin Statutes.

e. To Make and Recommend a County Street and Highway Map to the County Board in accordance with Section 80.64 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

f. To Prepare and Recommend Land Division Regula-tions to the County Board in accordance with Section 236.45 of the Wisconsin Statutes.

g. To Recommend any Changes or amendments to the County Board that they deem necessary or desirable con-cerning the county park system plan, county system of streets and parkways plan, county street and highway map,



Mr. Curt Schmidt, a represen-tative of the Schmidt Ambulance Service and Mr. Harvey Techt-man of the Techtman-Myrhum Ambulance Service and Mr. Richard Burg of Dick's Ambulance Service were present and expressed themselves in accord with these requirements.

Mr. Hathaway, Counsel for Dick's Ambulance Service, was given permission to speak briefly on his reaction to Resolution No. 56 as amended. Mr. Hathaway stated that he was not in accord and stated that his client would withdraw from ambulance service rendered to Washington County as of this date if the amendments would stand. He expressed himself in opposition to the 6 month requirement in paragraph No. 2.

### RESOLUTION No. 56

A Resolution Authorizing Payment for Emergency Ambulance Service WHEREAS, the Sheriff's Committee has been informed and has determined that persons injured in automobile accidents thereafter frequently fail to pay for ambulance services provided by private ambulance operators; and

WHEREAS, persons receiving such emergency ambulance service often are transients and thus make collection of indebted-ness for such service difficult or impossible; and

WHEREAS, failure to collect for rendering such ambulance services works a severe financial hardship on ambulance service operators and jeopardizes continuation of such service in this county.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Washington County that the County Clerk be, and he is hereby, authorized to pay for such emergency ambulance out of county funds provided that:

- the obligation arises out of an emergency call made at the the reguest of the Sheriff's Department or any established police department or fire department of Washington Coun-ty, or the Wisconsin State Patrol for services rendered in Washington County; and
- 2) the bill for such service has remained unpaid for a period of 90 days after due, and, further, provided that the am-bulance service operator made a good faith effort to collect same; and
- 3) the cost of such services shall not exceed the sum of \$50 per call but if, as part of the emergency call, it is necessary to transfer a patient to a hospital in another city, the following rate schedule shall apply:
  - \$1.00 per loaded mile traveled but not to exceed \$45 to Milwaukee; \$75 to Madison and \$50 to Fond du Lac; such charges also to apply for transfers from West Bend or Hartford; and \$1.00 per loaded mile traveled to any other destination
- 4) such obligation be assigned to Washington County with a view toward further efforts by the County Clerk in coop-eration with the District Attorney to enforce collection on behalf of Washington County; and
- 5) the minimum standards for equipment to be used in ambu-lance shall be as follows:

  - a) the vehicle shall carry clean linens
    b) 1 set of plastic splints
    c) oxygen and resuscitator equipment
    d) First Aid kit
    e) Body pouch

All ambulances shall be equipped with red light and siren and shall be covered by a policy of liability insurance for personal injury with limits of \$100,000 and \$300,000 for which a certificate of insurance shall be filed with the clerk and shall be operated with two attendants one of whom and shall be operated with two attendants, one of whom shall have been trained in advanced Red Cross First Aid.

6) The ambulance operator shall submit written verification by the Sheriff's Department or a police officer or fire department official that the emergency service for which claim is made, was in fact, provided.

## RESOLUTION No. 55 A Resolution Authorizing the Establishment of the Position of Investigator

WHEREAS, a need exists in Washington County to have available to the Sheriff and the District Attorney, an investigator qualified and trained in the conduct of investigations of criminal activities; and

WHEREAS, the current best estimate of cost of facilities to be provided by the County and City is about \$1,350,000 including approximately \$428,000 federal aid; and under current authoriza-tions the cost cannot exceed \$1,470,000, including about \$470,000 federal aid; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that the first round of the federal grant, based on the August 31, 1966 application, will be approxi-mately \$235,000 divided \$144,000 County and \$94,000 City (first round federal grant to the State for equipment purposes is about \$60,000); and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that a supplemental federal grant based on an application to be made August 31, 1967, will be made early in 1968 for the balance of \$193,000 to \$240,000 depending on the final costs; this supplemental grant would be divided 60%and 40% between the County and City respectively; or in a range of \$116,000 to \$144,000 to the County and \$77,000 to \$96,000 to the City; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that the funds provided by the supplemental federal grant would not be needed until about June 1968, and the State of Wisconsin Commission for Higher Education has told the local citizens' committee that there is "every reasonable assurance" that the supplemental federal funds described above will be available before June, 1968; and

WHEREAS, the City of West Bend has passed a similar reso-lution covering \$96,000 and that the Budget and Finance Com-mittee of the County will have an opportunity to review all bids before they are let; and

WHEREAS, in order to proceed, it is required that necessary funds are assured.

The rate for 1966 for the municipality (Washington County) was .0714 for Wisconsin Retirement plus .042 for Federal Social Security, or a total of 11.34%. The employee's and official's contribution was .045% for the Wisconsin Retirement Fund and .042 for the Federal Social Security, or a total of .087%.

During 1967, the rate for the municipality will be .0678 for the Wisconsin Retirement plus .044% for the Federal Social Se-curity or a total of 11.18%. The employee's and official's contri-bution will be .045% for the Wisconsin Retirement and .044% for the Federal Social Security, or a total of .089%.

The County Judge, as per state statutes, is included in a separate classification. If a county pays a supplementary salary to the County Judge, as Washington County does as per Resolution No. 39, effective December 31, 1963, then the County must include the supplementary salary upon the County report to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund. The County must make the employer contribution for the supplementary salary at the county rate of .0678%. The judges contribute 5% until their combined state and county salary reaches \$6,600.00. After the salary reaches that point, the county judge's contribution is increased to 7% to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund. The judges will contribute the maximum of \$290.40 in 1967 based on the rate of 4.4% of \$6,600.00 for Federal Social Security. Washington County will contribute 4.4% toward the first \$6,600.00 of the judges' combined state and supplementary salary. state and supplementary salary.

The Court Reporter, as per state statutes, is included in a separate classification. If a county pays a supplementary salary to the court reporters, as Washington County does as per Resolution No. 40, effective January 1, 1964, then the county must include the supplementary salary upon the county report to the Wisconsin Retirement Fund. The county must make the employer contribution for the supplementary salary at the county rate of .0678%. The court reporters contribute .045%. The court reporters will contribute the maximum of \$290.40 in 1967 based on the rate of .044% of \$6,600.00. Washington County will contribute .044% toward the first \$6,600.00 of the court reporters' combined state and supplementary salary for Federal Social Security.
