Honor Mitchell For 25 Years of School Service

PROGRAM, RECEPTION HELD; TEACHERS AND ALUMNI PAY TRIBUTE; GIFTS PRESENTED

C. Ernest Mitchell was honored Sunday for 25 years of dedicated service to Kewaskum High school. A committee from the school and community headed by Mrs. L. N. Peterson arranged for a two o'clock program and reception.

Mitchell joined the faculty here in September, 1942, and before being named principal in September, 1966, taught in the science department, was guidance director and coached football, baseball and basketball.

Walter Bade of the high school faculty in paying tribute to "Ernie Mitchell—the teacher, counselor, coach and the man" commented on "the sense of unselfishness" that is a part of Mitchell's life. "In the classroom or on the athletic field, it's been his way of doing things," Bade said.

Supt. of Schools Marshall Boyd spoke of "the sense of respect" which others hold for Mitchell, adding "he has a reputation for fair play and honesty and both have been his guiding light."

Two plaques were presented to Mitchell symbolizing 120 football victories and 253 basketball victories during his impressive coaching career.

Alumni reminisced about games won or lost—Ralph Koth of Kewaskum, one of then coach Mitchell's "first footballers;" Bob Miller of Kewaskum, home on furlough from the U. S. Army, who was a member of Mitchell's last football team in 1964, and John Tessar, Jr. of Kewaskum, active in sports in the years between. There was a tribute from K. A. Honeck, Jr., Kewaskum's sports-minded, sports-backer.

The 1,430 who graduated from the Kewaskum High school in the span of years from 1943 to the present were contacted by letter inviting them to share in an "anniversary gift." This was presented by F. Lyn Peterson of New York City.

Other gifts were presented by Kenneth Erickson for the Kewaskum Teachers Association; Roy Esser, the Kiwanis Club; R. L. Edwards, the Board of Education; Mrs. Norman Held, the Kewaskum Woman's Club. A letter was read from former AFS student Walborg Pettersene Krosshaug of Norway in which she described Mitchell as "helpful and understanding—always wanting to do the best for his students."

Mrs. L. N. Peterson, speaking in behalf of the local AFS chapter, read a poem titled "A Dedicated Man." When Mitchell rose to speak, he was given a standing ovation.

Rev. John Budde of Holy Trinity church gave the invocation; Rev. Dan Schowalter of Peace United Church of Christ the benediction. There was a selection by the high school band under the direction of Clyde Brehm and a vocal solo by faculty member, Gary Gerhartz. Village President Wayland Tessar read a proclamation recognizing the day as "C. Ernest Mitchell Day."

Police Officer Marriner Frank, 40, Dies Suddenly

COLLAPSES WHILE ON DUTY AT MEMORIAL DAY PROGRAM

Marriner Roy Frank, aged 40 years, a Kewaskum police officer, who was also employed as a custodian at the Kewaskum Elementary school, collapsed and died suddenly while on duty at the Memorial Day exercises at the Legion Memorial building grounds on Tuesday morning, May 30. He had not been ill.

A short time before, Officer Frank and other local police officers had directed traffic during the Memorial Day parade. While the exercises were in progress at the Legion grounds he had been conversing with Chief of Police Roland Pledl and Officer Kenneth Neldner on the sidewalk and as he walked away he suddenly collapsed and fell unconscious to the ground.

Some members of the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad who had participated in the parade were watching the program at the time. While they were being notified of what had happened by another fireman who saw Frank collapse, and ran to his aid, Chief Pledl called if there was a physician present in the audience. One member of the rescue squad immediately gave Officer Frank mouth-to-mouth resuscitation until others who went for the ambulance, arrived with the resuscitator. At the same time Chief Pledl rushed with his squad car to bring a local physician, who then took over. After giving Frank treatment and an injection but being unable to revive him, he was pronounced dead at the scene by the physician and removed by ambulance to Miller's funeral home.

Officer Frank and his family had recently purchased a home in the village and it was reported that they had intended to move into the house from their present home on the same day he succumbed.

Mr. Frank and his family had been residents of Kewaskum for the past seven years. He was born Sept. 2, 1926, at Sheboygan, a son of the late Raymond and Amanda Krpnic Frank, and resided in that city until 1958 when he moved to Random Lake. After making his home at Random Lake with his family for two years, they moved here in 1960 and Officer Frank had been a member of the police force since that time.

His marriage to the former Alice Lintner took place in Sheboygan on June 10, 1950. She survives, together with four children. Colleen, 15, a sophomore at Kewaskum Community High school, Michael, 14, an eighth grade student at the Kewaskum Elementary school, Debra, 11, a sixth grader, and Karen, 9, a fourth grader in the elementary school. He also leaves three sisters. Plan Trial Tornado Warning Signal for County on Saturday

Civil Defense Director for the village of Kewaskum, Washington County, announced after a meeting of the Washington County Fire Chiefs association and Civil Defense directors for the townships, villages and cities, that they have agreed on a tornado warning signal for the county.

The trial warning signal will be given by all municipalities on Saturday, June 3, at 12:30 p. m. and the first Saturday of each month during the tornado season.

A few municipalities may not be able to take part in the first test as their siren controls need some mechanical changes.

The signal will be a fire siren sounded at top speed for 50 seconds and dropped for 10 seconds and up 50 seconds and down again for 10 seconds and ending with a 50 second continuous blast, the whole cycle to take 3 minutes.

This type of signal was suggested by Civil Defense director for the city of Hartford, John Fulwider.

County co-ordinator, Paul Humbel, indicated that more information in regard to tornados and their development will be given to the public as soon as a folder can be prepared in a form easily understood.

Humbel wants to thank the Washington county fire chiefs and Civil Defense directors for their cooperation in preparing the warning system.

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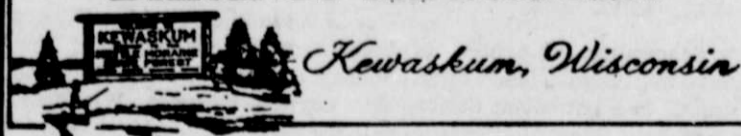

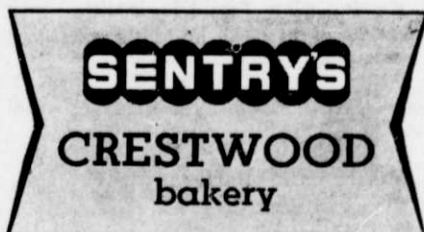
