## Open Recreation Program for Summer on Mon.

**LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL WILL ALSO BE ORGANIZED**

A summer recreational and Little League organized baseball program for village children will get underway on Monday, June 12. Children from ages 8 through 14 who are residents of the village of Kewaskum may sign up at the Kewaskum Elementary school on Monday between the hours of 9 a. m. and 3 p. m. Tom Larsen has been engaged as recreation program director for the summer.

There will be a variety of games and activities for all participants. Charles R. McClain, 1265 Brooklane dr., will also be giving free tennis lessons to all interested tennis prospects. These lessons will be held at a later date in the evening hours.

There will be a charge of \$1.00 per person for insurance which should be paid on Monday, June 12.

Requirements for Little League organized baseball are as follows:

Any boy who will attain the age of 9 years before Aug. 1 and who will not attain the age of 13 years before Aug. 1 of the year in question shall be eligible to compete in Little League organized baseball. This means that a boy who will be 13 years old on Aug. 1 or later is eligible to play that year, a boy who will be 13 on July 31 or earlier will not be eligible for either local league play or tournament play at any time during the calendar year in question.

Note: It is strongly recommended that the league shall not accept as a candidate or continue as a player a boy who participates in another organized baseball program.

Tentative daily schedule, June 12 through 16:

Morning, girls ages 8 through 11—9:00-9:15, exercises; 9:15-10:15, softball; 10:15-11:15, badminton; 11:15-12:00, organized games.

Morning, boys ages 8 through 11—9:00-9:15, exercises; 9:15-10:15, badminton and volleyball; 10:15-11:15, softball; 11:15-12:00, Little League baseball practice; 11:15-12:00, organized games.

Afternoon, girls ages 2 through 14—1:00-1:15, exercise; 1:15-2:15, softball; 2:15-3:15, volleyball and badminton; 3:15-4:30, organized games; 4:30-5:00, cleanup.

Afternoon, boys ages 12 through 14—1:00-1:15, exercises; 1:15-2:15, basketball, volleyball and badminton; 2:15-3:15, softball; 3:15-4:30, organized play; 4:30-5:00, cleanup.

All Little League organized baseball games will be played on Friday morning.

### CALL OFF TORNADO ALERT TEST IN AREA

A test tornado alert, scheduled for 12:30 p. m. last Saturday was called off because this type of alert was in conflict with the national warning system and due to circumstances beyond the control of area Civil Defense officials.

The Kewaskum village beach will open for swimming on Monday, June 19. Two lifeguards will be on duty. Red Cross swimming lessons will be given from 9:00 to 12:00, Monday through Friday. Public swimming is from 1:00 to 5:00 every day, plus 9:00 to 12:00 on Saturday.

The first four-week session of swimming lessons will last from June 19 to July 14, and the second session from July 17 to Aug. 11.

**PRIVATE CAMPING AREA LOCATED NEAR KEWASKUM**

Kettle Park, a private camping area located about 2½ miles southwest of Kewaskum, which is available for picnics, swimming, camping, hiking and fishing, will open to the public on Saturday, June 10, according to Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Ellefson, who own and operate the park at R. 2, Kewaskum, on land that was formerly part of the Ed Schaefer farm.

The park contains an artificial lake and island as well as a beach and enclosed play area for little tots. The lake and park are situated on a 40 acre tract including 20 acres of wooded areas for hiking and recreation. The lake is spring fed and has been well stocked with fish. A store has been built on the premises to supply picnic supplies, groceries, etc. and bath houses and modern lavatories are also under construction. The park is located west of Hwy. 45 and took 2½ years to build.

The Ellefsons are natives of Appleton and later residents of West Bend, which is Mrs. Ellefson's home town. The park is a spot for fun for the entire family and the Ellefsons invite the public to stop in and get acquainted. The park is open all summer.

**Fire Damages Fellenz Home**

Kewaskum firemen had a very short run with their equipment at 12:55 p. m. Friday when they were called to the Lee Fellenz home on First st. located next door to the fire station.

The fire started around electric wiring in a small, crawl space attic between the ceiling and roof over the kitchen. The kitchen portion of the house is of frame construction located at the rear of a brick building. The blaze was discovered by a neighbor, Mrs. Jackie Heinbigner, who turned in the alarm.

The flames had a good start and

had spread through joists, timbers and the roof when firemen arrived. Firemen soon had the blaze under control but not until most of the joists and timbers in the attic were burned and charred. Two holes also burned into the shingle roof and there was much water and smoke damage.

It is possible that the fire may have been caused by faulty wiring but the exact cause could not be determined.

The firemen answered another call at 6:55 p. m. Sunday to put out a grass fire in an area between the railroad tracks and County Trunk Hwy. V about a half mile north of the village. A small patch of grass burned over and there was no damage. Possible cause of the blaze may have been sparks from a passing train or a cigart thrown from a car.

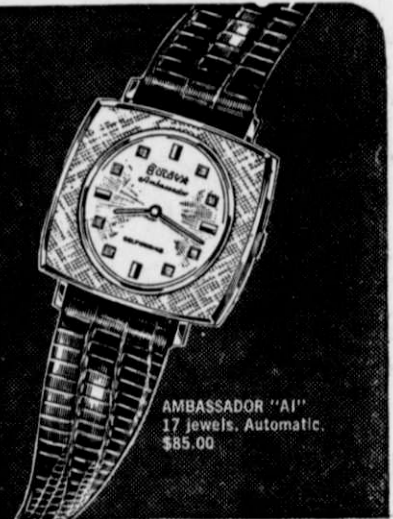

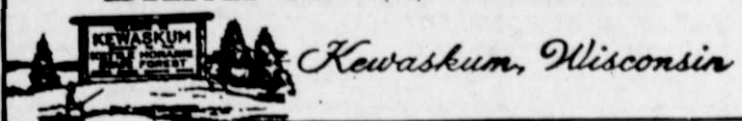

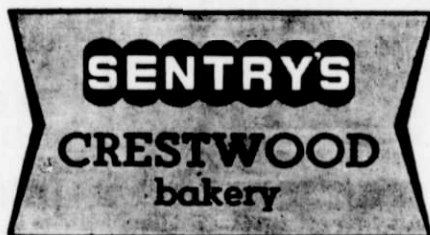
