## Winner of Local District Contest Chosen State Alice in Dairyland



### County Entrant, 'Kris' Williams, New Title Holder

#### COLGATE GIRL WILL REIGN FOR YEAR OVER DAIRYLAND

Miss Kristin Williams, 21, of Colgate in Washington county, a senior coed at Oshkosh State university, who was chosen the winner and a finalist in the Alice in Dairyland contest at the District 5 contest held in Kewaskum on Saturday, May 20, became the new 1967 "Alice" last Saturday when she was selected as the state-wide winner of the annual event at the Brown County Memorial Arena at Green Bay.

Following the district contest held here, we predicted in print, "Miss Williams is a sweet and charming brunet with an abundance of personality and background. She is a typical Alice candidate and should be a very worthy representative and leading contender in the state finals at Green Bay June 8-10 to pick a successor to the current reigning Alice, Jo Ann Cupery of Markesan." Evidently the judges in the state contest thought along the same lines as they selected Miss Williams as the new Alice in Dairyland.

The Washington county entrant in the state contest, Miss Williams is one of twin daughters of Mr. and Mrs. R. Philip Williams of Colgate in the town of Richfield.

She is the first twin ever to win the Alice contest. The vivacious brunet with brown eyes was crowned by her predecessor, Miss Cupery. Miss Williams plans to teach English and speech when she completes degree requirements. A graduate of Washington High school at Germantown, she was a member of the Future Teachers of America and active in 4-H club work while in high school. She is five feet six inches tall and weighs 122 pounds. Her measurements are 34-25-37. She is interested in crafts, sewing and lettering.

The first Alice in Dairyland winner from Washington county, Miss Williams' eyes filled with tears when her victory was announced by Donald N. McDowell, state agriculture department director. She will become a full-time, \$4,800 a year, plus traveling expenses and wardrobe, promotion specialist in the department for the next year, plus many extras. She will do much traveling and make numerous appearances during the year. Miss Williams intends to resume her practice teaching requirements upon completion of her year's work toward receiving her degree at Oshkosh university as an education major.

The first runner-up selected in the Green Bay contest was Beverly Stezel, 20, of Dorchester in Clark county and second runner-up was Miss Barbara Anne Berg, 20, of Plain in Sauk county. Both are Eau Claire State university students.

The Rev. John T. Budde, pastor of Holy Trinity Catholic church, Kewaskum, will celebrate the silver jubilee of his ordination with a 12 o'clock noon solemn Mass of Thanksgiving at Holy Trinity church on Sunday, June 18. Father Budde also serves St. Bridget's congregation, a mission to Holy Trinity.

The noon Mass will be followed by a one o'clock dinner in the parish hall, prepared and served by the women of both congregations. From 3 to 6 p. m. there will be an open house for all who want to come.

Assisting at the Mass will be the celebrant's brothers, the Rev. George Budde, chaplain at Notre Dame convent, Elm Grove, as deacon; the Rev. Raymond Budde, pastor of St. James church, Mukwonago, as subdeacon. A son of Holy Trinity parish, Frater Cyrus, O.F.M., Cap. will be master of ceremonies. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Miles Campbell, R. 2, Kewaskum. Rt. Rev. Msgr. Frank Schneider of Milwaukee will preach the sermon.

Father Budde, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John M. Budde, is a native of Beaver Dam. He attended St. Peter's school there and studied for the priesthood at St. Francis Seminary, Milwaukee. Ordained on Feb. 2, 1942 at St. Adalbert church, Milwaukee, he offered his first solemn Mass on Feb. 8, 1942 at St. Peter's church, Beaver Dam.

He served as assistant at St. Killian's church, Hartford, until May, 1954; was assistant at St. Agnes church, Milwaukee, until June, 1958 and then came to Holy Trinity.

In addition to the reverend brothers mentioned above, Father Budde has five brothers, all living at Beaver Dam. They are Lawrence, Felix, Henry, Richard and Leo.

At Holy Trinity, Rev. Budde serves slightly more than 300 families; at St. Bridget's, 46 families for a combined total of some 1,300 souls. Recently completed is an \$80,000 second-story addition to Holy Trinity school.

## Kewaskum Landmark, Old North Western Depot, Being Torn Down

### BUILT BEFORE TURN OF CENTURY, STRUCTURE ONE OF FIRST DEPOTS IN AREA

Another area landmark will soon be only a memory as the old Kewaskum depot of the Chicago and North Western railway is being torn down. Workers began removing the roof section on Saturday, June 3, and by Wednesday of this week only a skeleton of the historic 97 foot structure remained as the razing neared completion.

Constructed before the turn of the century, the depot was once a busy place and a gathering site for area residents who congregated to watch train arrivals and departures, especially on weekends. This was in the years B.C. (before cars) when everyone traveled by train and all the news could be picked up simply by waiting at the depot for the trains to arrive and leave. In later years, while still in use, old time residents still visited the depot regularly to meet old cronies and exchange gossip. The structure is one of the original depots of the railroad in this area.

Gone are the bustling days when almost everything was shipped by rail and depots bulged with freight, when the arrival of trains stirred up excitement among the populace, shied horses and caused them to "run away," when scores of people gathered at the

depot, mainly on Sunday evenings, to watch the natives return home from the weekend and greet and say goodbye to visiting relatives, when large excursions, with bands and all, came from the cities for regular picnics in our north and south side parks and enjoy a 5 cent schooner of beer, when the frequent bums traveling the railroad right-of-way frightened residents, camped outside of town, even drank diluted canned heat, and were given a place in our one cell jail by Marshall Brandt and Deputy Kippenhan, when the sight and noise of section crews under foreman August Buss busy "working on the railroad" was a daily occurrence, when cattle were shipped by rail and the old cattle yards still stood adjacent to the tracks, when gate-tender for many years, Jake Rimmel had his little tower high above the tracks at the Main st. crossing, lowered and raised the gates when trains passed through and held a "stop" sign high in one hand to warn people of switching engines while the kids got kicks out of giving him a "bad time," when dozens of horses and sleighs with kids "hitching" rides waited on both sides of the tracks for trains to pass through, and genial, busy station agent Tony Schaeffer was always on hand with a friendly word. 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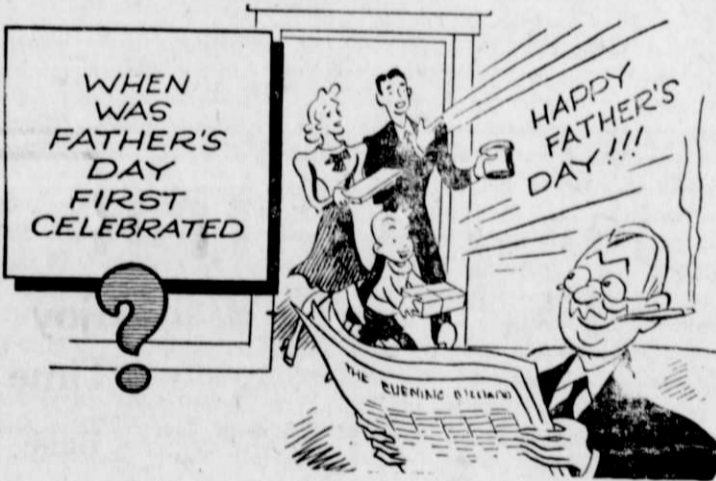
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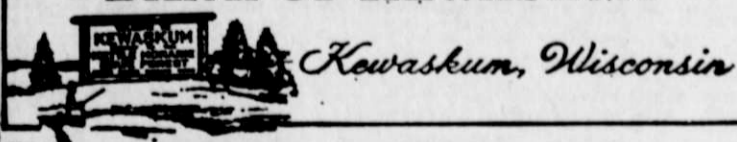
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## Auto Plunges Into Lake, Local Youths Injured

SEVERAL OTHERS ARE INJURED IN CRASHES

Two Kewaskum youths and one from rural West Bend were injured Saturday night in a mishap at Lake Bernice in the town of Ashford which occurred at 10:50 p. m.

Hurt were Kenneth Biertzer, R. 6, West Bend, possible dislocated shoulder; Debbie Schlosser, Kewaskum, cuts and bruises, and Antonia Key, Kewaskum, bruises. They were passengers in a car driven by Richard Laubach, Kewaskum, which left the road at a T-intersection, struck a guard rail, crashed on through it and plunged into the lake, according to reports.

The auto, a 1964 convertible, sank over its top in the water but fortunately submerged slowly so that all occupants were able to escape through the windows before it went under. Two local skin divers went to the scene of the accident Sunday afternoon and after clearing away the muck from the bottom of the car were able to fasten hooks to the vehicle so that it could be towed out of the lake by two local wreckers.

Three persons were injured in a two car crash at the intersection of State Trunk Hwys. 28 and 144 west of Kewaskum at 2 p. m. Sunday. The mishap occurred when a light convertible operated by Kathleen A. Pyfferoen, 19, Milwaukee, made a right turn onto 28 from 144 and her car collided with an auto driven by James W. Giese, 17, Kewaskum, which was stopped at the intersection. The Pyfferoen vehicle struck the Giese auto in the left side.

Hurt were Miss Pyfferoen, who suffered a brain concussion and multiple bruises; Giese, who incurred side injuries, and Richard Marx, 17, Kewaskum, who sustained injuries to his left shoulder and hands. Miss Pyfferoen was charged with driving too fast for conditions.

Three persons were taken by private ambulance to St. Joseph's Community hospital. West Bend, after being involved in a two-car collision near the Parkway parking lot in West Bend last Wednesday at approximately 12:45 p. m.

According to West Bend authorities the accident happened when a car, traveling south on Main st. and driven by John P. Norton, 30, of 1219 Roseland dr., Kewaskum, collided with a northbound vehicle driven by Dolores C. Mickelson, 34, of R. 4, West Bend, who sustained abrasions to both knees and complained of a pain in the back. Also hurt were LaCindy Mickelson, 9, with possible elbow and nose fractures and a lacerated right leg, and Retha Mickelson, 21 months, who incurred a

possible concussion and abrasions to the head. Both were passengers in Mickelson's vehicle. Norton was advised to contact a physician concerning abrasions and swelling of the right arm.

West Bend police reported that as Norton was proceeding south he noticed a vehicle pulling out from the Parkway parking lot into his lane of traffic. He swerved to the left to avoid the vehicle and in doing so crossed over the center line and collided with the Mickelson car. The driver of the car entering Norton's lane, John Engelhardt, 37, R. 1, West Bend, was cited for failure to yield the right of way.

Two persons were injured at 3:46 p. m. last Tuesday when a car driven by Barbara A. Krahn, 20, R. 2, Kewaskum, collided with the rear of a vehicle operated by Frank E. Szymczak, 72, West Bend, as the latter slowed down for traffic ahead on STH 33 about a half mile west of West Bend. The Krahn vehicle skidded 39 feet when the driver braked, and struck the Szymczak car. Injured were Szymczak, who complained of back pains and Florence Kutz, 42, West Bend, a passenger in the Krahn auto, who suffered a right ankle injury.

(Continued from page 1) are any longer with us and neither are most of those who remember those days. If you remember, it's later than you think.

The railway company sought bids for the removal of the old weathered structure after the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin granted permission for its removal "after June 1 but before Sept. 1." There was four bidders, according to Harold Degner, West Bend station agent and former agent here, and the contract was let to Ronald Hartmann of rural West Bend. Local residents had petitioned for its removal because it had become an "eyesore." Degner said it is yet uncertain how the vacant lot will be used. Removal of the depot leaves only the West Bend depot on the railroad between Milwaukee and Fond du Lac. With only one train making daily (except Sunday) stops here for passenger and mail, the depot was seldom used. The warehouse portion had been rented for storage

purposed by a local farm supply firm.

The services of an agent were discontinued here in September, 1965, and Degner, then agent, was transferred to West Bend. In his capacity he is one of the few remaining agents along the line. Dener, who serves what is known as the Air-Line subdivision of the North Western railroad in this area, services all the station areas out of West Bend which once had their own agents. This area includes Rockfield, Jackson, West Bend, Kewaskum, Campbellsport, Eden and Marblehead. Degner is busy with the paper work, ordering of freight cars and handling of traffic.

### RUTH BATTAGLIA GRADUATE OF ST. MARY'S SPRINGS

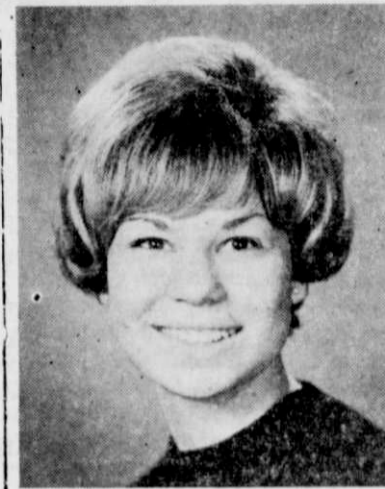

More than 3,600 students were scheduled to file across the commencement platform to receive diplomas, but since the UW commencement at Madison is held as final semester examinations come to a close and before all final grades can be compiled, it is possible that some students who were candidates for degrees may not have actually completed all of their scholastic work by commencement day.

Bachelor degrees were scheduled for about 2,400 students, while about 1,000 were scheduled for higher degrees and 240 for law or medical degrees. The 1967 June commencement brings to almost 166,000 the number of degrees granted by the University of Wisconsin at Madison during its 118 year history.

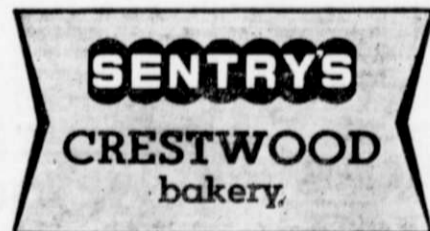
