The railway company sought bids for the removal of the old weathered structure after the Public Service Commission of Wisconsin granted permission for its removal "after June 1 but before Sept. 1." There was four bidders, according to Harold Degner, West Bend station agent and former agent here, and the contract was let to Ronald Hartmann of rural West Bend. Local residents had petitioned for its removal because it had become an "eyesore." Degner said it is yet uncertain how the vacant lot will be used. Removal of the depot leaves only the West Bend depot on the railroad between Mil-

waukee and Fond du Lac. With only one train making daily (except Sunday) stops here for passenger and mail. the depot was seldom used. The warehouse portion had been rented for storage
