

Mrs. Wm. Butts Killed, Children Hurt in Mishap

Mrs. William (Dorothy) Butts, 32, of 731 James court, West Bend, was fatally injured near Lake Forest, Ill. Tuesday morning in a two car collision at the junction of Illinois Hwy. 60 and I-94 in Lake county while returning with her three children from the home of her parents in Gary, Ind. Mr. Butts is employed at Regal Ware. Inc. in Kewaskum and they have been members of Hon-E-Kor Country club for several years.

Mrs. Butts is the second member of Hon-E-Kor to die this season, Paul Althaus, 41, of 1716 Eder Lane. West Bend, passed away on May 14 after a lingering illness. His wife is the former Marjory Koch of Beechwood.

The three Butts children, James 10, who received a broken leg and collar bone; Barbara 8, who suffered facial lacerations, and Beth 21 months, were reported later in statisfactory condition in Lake Forest hospital.
