2 Local Girls Leaving for Stay In Europe Under WSA Program

WILL FLY TO PARIS, FRANCE, ON MONDAY

Miss Jean Schuppel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Schuppel, Jr. of R. 1, Allenton, and Miss Jeanne Felix, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Felix, Kewaskum, will leave Saturday, June 24, for a two and a half month stay in Europe.

The girls took advantage of a program which offers work or study abroad. The program, called WSA, offers students the chance to see Europe at a minimum fee, which would be impossible with any other mode of travel. The girls will take advantage of the work program and have been assigned to Butlin's Holiday Resort in Minehead, England, on the Bristol channel.

On Monday, June 26, they will meet in New York with students from all over the United States, who are also participating in the program. All the students will then fly, via World International Airlines, from New York to Paris, France. The students will spend two days in Paris, where they will take part in an orientation program. Officials from WSA and the U. S. Department of State will preside at this program.

Following their brief stay in Paris, each student will fly to the country where he or she will study or work. They will remain in that country until September, when they will again meet in Paris for the flight back to New York.

Miss Schuppel graduated from a 12 month course at St. Vincent's Infants hospital in Chicago. She was presently employed as a nurse's aid at Central Wisconsin Colony & Training School near Madison. Miss Felix has been attending the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Both are 1963 graduates of Kewaskum High school.

Four Teen-Agers Hurt in Mishaps

Four teen-agers, three of them from Kewaskum, were injured in two separate accidents over the weekend. One other mishap was reported in the village in which no one was hurt.

James Korth, 18, of Kewaskum and Miss Jacqueline Volk, West Bend, were injured at 7:20 p. m. Sunday when Korth's motorcycle, on which Miss Volk was riding, left a Hwy. 67 curve in the town of Osceola. The crash occurred near the north end of Long lake when Korth's motorcycle reportedly got onto loose gravel on the shoulder of the momentary road and he lost control momentarily. The bike struck a sign post at the edge of the road and was thrown into a ditch.

Korth suffered a fractured hip and possible cracked knee cap, while Miss Volk escaped with bruises. Both were removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the Campbellsport ambulance. Korth submitted to surgery at the hospital Wednesday to place a pin in his fractured hip.

Two Kewaskum youths were injured early Sunday when a car driven by Dennis D. Backhaus, 16, of Kewaskum left Hwy. 28 west of the intersection of the Paradise rd. when Backhaus braked sharply as he came up behind another vehicle and apparently lost control and the car veered into the ditch and struck a sign post, telephone pole and tree. Injured were Edward Weddig, 16, Kewaskum, who incurred bruises, and Charles Bunkelman, 17, Kewaskum, who suffered a bump on the head.

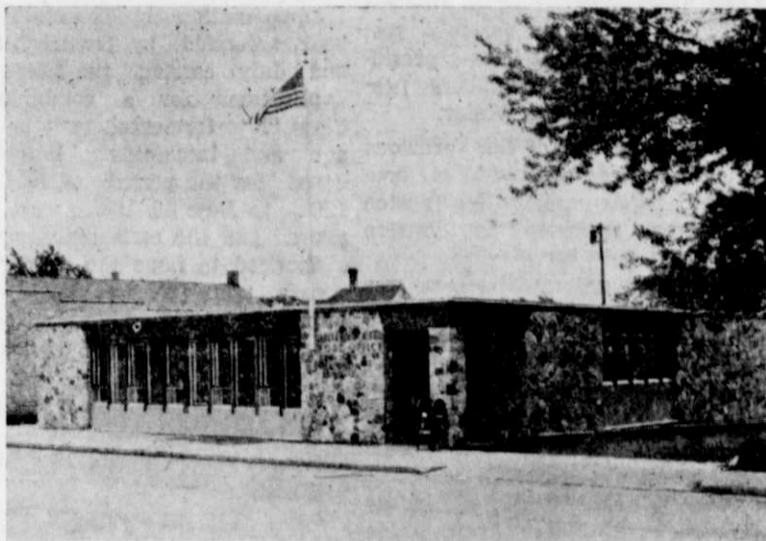

New Post Office to Be Dedicated



A special dedication ceremony and program to commemorate the opening of the new post office building in Kewaskum will be held at 2 p. m. Sunday, June 25, according to Harry E. Koch, postmaster. The new post office is located at 347 Main st., just west of its former location.

Highlights of the program will include addresses by Melvin E. Nelson, postal service officer, and William A. Steiger, sixth district congressman from Oshkosh, who will also present Postmaster Koch with a flag which has flown over the United States capitol building at Washington, D. C. The Kewaskum High school band will provide music for the occasion and Charles Miller of Kewaskum will be master of ceremonies. State Senator Frank E. Panzer of the 13th district and Assemblyman Frederick Schroeder of Washington county have also notified Koch they will attend and if it can be fitted into his schedule it is possible that U. S. Senator Gaylord Nelson may be present. Visiting postmasters and postal officials will also be on hand for the event.

An open house and inspection of the building for the whole family and friends will follow the program at about 4 p. m. Refreshments will be served. Mrs. Wm. Butts Killed, Children Hurt in Mishap

Mrs. William (Dorothy) Butts, 32, of 731 James court, West Bend, was fatally injured near Lake Forest, Ill. Tuesday morning in a two car collision at the junction of Illinois Hwy. 60 and I-94 in Lake county while returning with her three children from the home of her parents in Gary, Ind. Mr. Butts is employed at Regal Ware, Inc. in Kewaskum and they have been members of Hon-E-Kor Country club for several years.

Mrs. Butts is the second member of Hon-E-Kor to die this season. Paul Althaus, 41, of 1716 Eder Lane, West Bend, passed away on May 14 after a lingering illness. His wife is the former Marjory Koch of Beechwood.

The three Butts children, James 10, who received a broken leg and collar bone; Barbara 8, who suffered facial lacerations, and Beth 21 months, were reported later in satisfactory condition in Lake Forest hospital.

Butts was informed of the tragedy while at work at Regal Ware shortly after it happened and then left for Lake Forest. Friends reported that Barbara had been visiting at the home of her grandparents in Gary.

Details concerning the mishap and circumstances surrounding it were not immediately available. However, it was revealed that Mrs. Butts was making a left turn just prior to the crash with the other vehicle.

Born Nov. 16, 1934, Mrs. Butts was married to William Butts on June 12, 1954, at St. John's Lutheran church at Gary. Survivors, in addition to her husband and three children, include two sisters, two brothers and her parents, the Henry A. Jacobsens of Gary.

Visitation at the Lach Funeral Home, Gary, was from Thursday afternoon. Funeral services today (Friday) will be at Hope Lutheran church at Portage, Ind. about 10 miles east of Gary.

Village Board Approves Eleven Liquor Licenses

Regular Meeting
June 5, 1967

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Tessar presiding and all board members present except Trustee Wietor.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented upon motion by Trustee Herriges, seconded by Trustee Kral and duly carried.

The first order of business was the public hearing on the applications for Class "A" and Class "B" malt beverage and intoxicating liquor licenses. There were no appearances for or against any of the applicants, so the public hearing was declared closed.

Roman Kral appeared before the board to object to the grade level and the poor workmanship of the blacktopping of the alley abutting his property.

Clark Werner, Kenneth Erickson and Village Engineer Robert McMahon discussed with the board the possible relocation of a proposed street in the Wilmer Ramthun area in the northeast area of the village.

Health Officer R. G. Edwards appeared before the board to express his views with reference to the addition of more police help and to the salaries paid for such services.

The board decreed that anyone requesting snow removal service will be charged the following

rates: Michigan front end loader with operator, \$14.00 per hour; grader with operator, \$14.00 per hour.

Germantown shut out its last two opponents in one-sided contests. They blanked Campbellsport, 6-0, and snowed under North Fondy, 21-0. Thursday, June 29, the Indians travel to Grafton.
