## 11 Bands, Drum Corps to Highlight Parade at Firemen's Picnic Sunday

EVENT JULY 8-9 IN PARK;  
CONCERT BY BLATZ BAND

The annual Kewaskum firemen's picnic will be held in the village park this Saturday evening and all day Sunday, July 8 and 9, and this year's parade and picnic will be among the best ever held here.

Kewaskum firemen are noted for their excellent parades at their picnic and this year's parade will again be the highlight of the event. The monstrous parade will begin at 12:30 p. m. sharp on Sunday. The parade will form on the high school parking lot and athletic fields (entrants should be there by 12 noon) and will proceed along the village's streets to the park.

The parade will feature 11 bands and drum and bugle corps, outstanding among them being the famous Blatz American Legion band and internationally famous Continental Cadet band, both of Milwaukee. The nine other musical organizations will include the Buccaneers drum and bugle corps,

## Dynamite Blast Breaks Windows In 4 Local Homes

Nine windows in four neighboring homes were blown out or broken as a result of the repercussion from a dynamite blast in the village last Friday.

About 2 p. m. that day Marvin Hughes of Cascade dynamited the silo for removal on the Mrs. Walter Meilahn farm on South Fond du Lac ave. The repercussion was so great it broke windows in the following surrounding homes: three at the Walteer Braun home, 1095 Fond du Lac ave., one at the Ed Schaefer home, 1102 Fond du Lac ave., two at the David Brown home, 1118 Fond du Lac ave. and three at the Cornelius Beisbier home, 1089 Fond du Lac ave.

Mrs. Meilahn reported the incident herself to Chief of Police Roland Pledl. Although Hughes does not carry insurance to cover the damage, Mrs. Meilahn has a policy that does.

Chief Pledl ordered Hughes to discontinue dynamiting in the village. It was a little early to celebrate the Fourth of July and besides there is an ordinance which prohibits the shooting of "firecrackers" in the village. The fireworks weren't scheduled until Monday night.

L. W. Lackore of Madison, executive director of the Madison Chamber of Commerce, was elected to the board with Reigle.

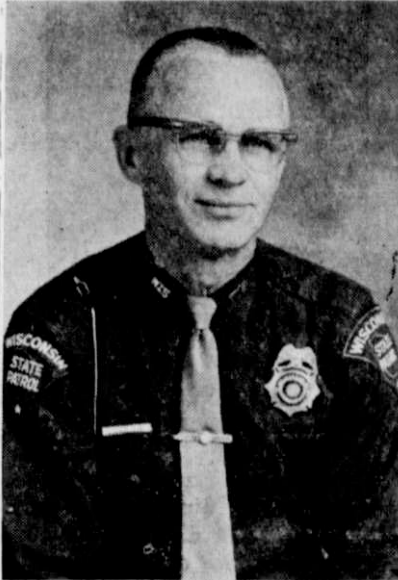
### WATER AT LOCAL BEACH IS SAFE FOR SWIMMING

## Five Candidates To Seek 2 School Board Posts Here

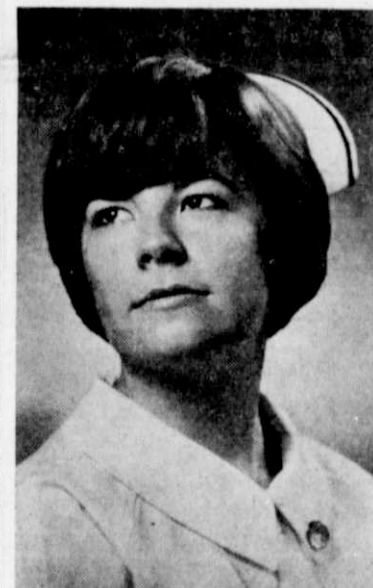
MEMBERS WILL BE ELECTED FOR 3-YEAR TERMS JULY 24

Five candidates for the Kewaskum school board, to fill two vacancies, filed declarations of candidacy with John A. Jadro, district clerk, prior to the deadline. The annual election will be held on Monday, July 24, the same day as the annual meeting for the school district, from 1 to 8 p. m. in the cafeteria room of Kewaskum Community High school.

Qualified electors of the district are eligible. Two persons will be elected to the school board of the district for three-year terms. Incumbent members whose terms expire are Harry Oelhafen and Zona Miske, both of whom are candidates for re-election. Other candidates are Thomas Gundrum, Gerald Secor and June E. Berg.

Kewaskum Community Schools, Joint District No. 2 includes the village of Kewaskum, towns of Kewaskum, Barton, Farmington and Wayne, Washington county, towns of Ashford and Auburn, Fond du Lac county, and towns of Mitchell and Scott, Sheboygan county.

She is expected to arrive in New York Aug. 14 and will attend Kewaskum Community High school as a senior.

Miss Doorenbosch's father is a sales manager in diet meats in The Netherlands. Besides her parents, she has one sister at home and one brother who is in the military service.

Johanna has had five years of English and speaks German, French and Dutch as well. She is interested in all sports. After her year in Kewaskum she will return to her native land and study at the Academy of Physical Training.

Miss Doorenbosch indicated that one of the main reasons for her coming to this country is to find out how people in the United States think about the current subjects and questions which occupy the entire world. She would also like to see if life in the U. S. is greatly different from theirs in The Netherlands and if so to live in this different society for some time.

Johanna studied ballet for 11 years, plays hockey and skates regularly. She belongs to a hockey club and soos club. The latter is a club where young people between the ages of 16 and 20 can dance every Friday and Sunday evening.

**Bonnie Kern Elected FHA State Officer**

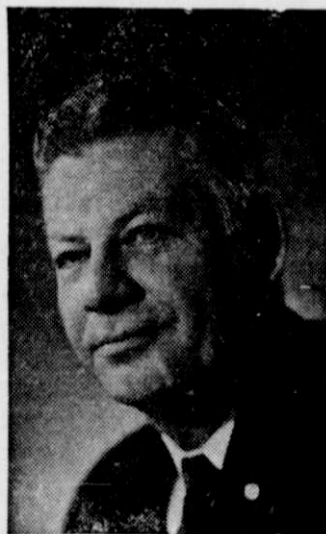
**TO ATTEND LOS ANGELES NATIONAL CONVENTION**

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### Red Cross Annual Dinner Cites Local Awards

In the observance of the 50th anniversary of the American Red Cross, the West Bend Chapter honored many of its faithful volunteers at its annual dinner held on June 27 in the church hall of Holy Trinity church at Newburg. Albert Schroeder, treasurer of the chapter and chairman of the event, praised the township of Trenton for being the host to the membership. Mr. Schroeder, newly-elected town chairman, spoke with pride of the beautiful and peaceful atmosphere and the cooperative citizens of the township.

Highlight of the annual meeting was the presentation of an award from the National Red Cross to Harry Gill and his son Patrick in recognition of their life-saving services. Previously recognized by Gov. Warren Knowles for life-saving honors, Harry and Patrick Gill received certificates of merit and honorary pins for quick and effective action in saving the life of daughter and sister Geraldine. National Red Cross awards are rarely made except for recognized use of life-saving technique as taught by the Red Cross and utilized for all mankind. The West Bend Chapter observed the event with much pride. A special award from the local chapter was made to Norman Riessen, leader of the United Fund, for his dedication to community service. The award was accepted for Mr. Riessen, who was out of town, by Mr. Fred Heidtke of Jackson.

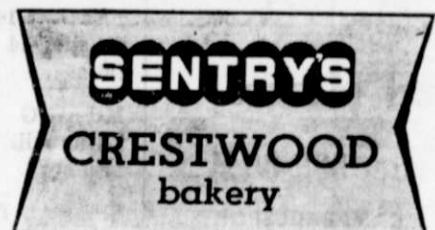

Here is your chance to vote on something.

Did you enjoy celebrating Independence Day on Tuesday this week?

Or did you wish it had come on Monday, giving your family a long, three-day vacation?

The Statesman, in cooperation with the Wisconsin State Chamber of Commerce, is conducting a survey on the Uniform Monday Holiday Plan. Above is a ballot for your use.

Briefly, the plan calls for Independence Day to be celebrated on the first Monday in July each year. This would give American families a three-day weekend every year, rather than a single holiday in midweek as so often happens.

The plan would create two additional long weekends by having Memorial Day and Thanksgiving

also celebrated on Mondays. Some advocates suggest that Veterans Day and Washington's Birthday also fall on Mondays. All of these traditional days or dates have been changed before, most notably Thanksgiving, which was shifted by Congress as late as the 1930's.

The Uniform Monday Holiday Plan does not change Christmas or New Year's. It concerns non-religious holidays only.

The plan would also establish the Monday holidays nationwide, not on an individual state basis. Two such bills have been introduced in Congress.

Reasons given in favor of the plan are as follows:

1. It would aid Wisconsin families by giving them a chance to relax with up to five three-day vacations a year.
2. It would help Wisconsin's e-

conomy by cutting down on absenteeism at work. Split-week holidays also drive up production costs.

3. It would cut down traffic fatalities. The National Safety Council "convicts the one-day mid-week holiday as having the highest highway kill rate."

4. The plan would help Wisconsin's tourist industry, leading to more jobs.

As one Wisconsin newspaper said in a recent editorial, "Every time Independence Day falls on Tuesday, it should win more friends for the cause." Mid-week holidays are bad and make it extremely rough for newspapers to publish on schedule.
