Local Student in Peru Writes of Trip, Life There

GEORGE MARTIN SENDS LETTERS TO PARENTS

Following are excerpts from letters the Marvin Martins of Kewaskum have received from their son George, who is in Lima, Peru, where he is spending the summer as part of the local foreign student eexchange program:

"As you know I left O'Hare field at 6:15 p. m. and arrived at Miami at 10:00 p. m. There I met the students from the East who place at Peace United Church of were also going to South Ameri-Christ in Kewaskum. He preceded ca. We left Miami at 2:15 a. m. June 30 and had half hour stops at Panama, Quito and Guayaquil, Ecuador, and finally arriving at Lima at 12:30 p. m. Lack of sleep and airsickness overtook me. This lasted only for the day. My family was at the airport to meet me. It was an hour's drive to the home. Driving here is very different. As long as you don't hold up traffic you can drive as you please; go through red lights, stop signs, any speed and the horn is used all the time.

"On Saturday I went with my family to the opera 'Luisa Hernando'. Sunday we went to Club Regattas which is a large athletic club. I've also been swimming in the Pacific Ocean. On July 4th I went to Plaza de Armas, which is said to be the finest public square in the Americas, and Flaza San Martin. my mother had a little party for me because it was our Independence Day. I also saw the changing of the guards at the government palace. In the Cathedral of Lima I viewed the remains of Pizarro which are in a glass coffin. After this we went to the church of San Francisco to see the catacombs, the place where the poor were buried in olden times.

"I am attending school, an all-Catholic high school called Our Lady of Carmen. The students wear uniforms. They have 12 different subjects in a year. Military training is required. There are 5 exchange students attending this

"Now I'll tell you about my home here and my family. My father, Juan Zela, is a banker my mother Rina, brother Juan, 16, Jose, 15, and Rosanna, 9. The home has 5 levels and 6 bathrooms. They have 2 maids and 3

"I'm not able to write everyone so you'll have to get the information about me from my mother






