Annual School Meeting to Be Held on Monday

2 OF 5 CANDIDATES TO BE ELECTED TO BOARD

The budget to be presented to the electors of the Kewaskum school district at the budget hearing immediately preceding the annual meeting Monday, July 24, has been summarized. The hearing will be held in the new multi-purpose room at the high school at 8 p. m.

As announced previously, five candidates have filed for two vacancies on the Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2 school board. Incumbents whose terms expire are both candidates for re-election. They are Mrs. Zona (Edgar) Miske and Harry Oelhafen of the town of Wayne. The other candidates are Mrs. June (Elwood) Berg, R. 2, Kewaskum (town of Kewaskum); Thomas Gundrum, R. 6, West Bend (town of Farmington), and Gerald Secor, R. 1, Kewaskum (town of Farmington).

The election will be held from 1 p. m. to 8 p. m. Monday in the cafeteria room at the high school.

The school board's proposed budget will require a mill rate of \$19.87 per thousand of equalized valuation. This is 5 cents a thousand more than the previous levy which will amount to a \$1 increase for a \$20,000 property. Property values in the school district have risen approximately 5 per cent in the past year.

A detail of the proposed budget is available at the business office of the school district located in Room 600 at the high school. Total proposed expenses are \$1,143,901.68. Total anticipated receipts are \$292,392.83. Estimated local levy is therefore \$851,508.85.

The 1967-68 school year calendar was announced in the school's Newsletter. It will open with teacher-in-service Aug. 22-24 and the first day of school will be Aug. 25. Last day of school will be May 29.

For the assistance of voters, following is a list of the qualifications of the five candidates for the school board:

MRS. JUNE E. BERG: Graduate of Lutheran High, Milwaukee, and has two years of college education at the University of Wisconsin extension. She is the mother of six children.

Mrs. Berg says: "I wish to be part of a growing and progressive community with the concern of the education of the young and adult in mind."

THOMAS GUNDRUM: Married, resident of the Town of Farmington and a graduate of West Bend High school. He has taken the Farm Short Course at the University of Wisconsin at which time he was part of its new staff. He has also done part-time teaching in the West Bend High school.

Gundrum says: "I am a candidate because I am interested in keeping the standards of our schools at their highest without unnecessary expenses. As a full-time farmer and doing custom work, I come in contact with many people and hear their views on many issues, including our schools. This along with the experience of

Firemen Win Big Money at Badger Tourney

KEWASKUM DEPARTMENT WALKS OFF WITH \$90

Kewaskum firemen walked off with some of the big prize money at the 76th annual Badger Firemen's association tournament held at Jackson over the weekend. Many hundreds of persons attended the picnic celebration, which marked the 75th anniversary of the Jackson department, and huge parade on Sunday.

The tournament contests were held Saturday evening and Kewaskum was one of the top winners with a total of \$55 in prize money. Contest results were as follows:

Four man hose layouts—1. Kewaskum; 2. Germantown; 3. Brown Deer; 4. Newburg; 5. Boltonville.

Individual bucket contest—1. Ronnie Krell, Newburg; 2. Paul Behring, Boltonville; 3. Frank Krueger, Kewaskum. There was a three way tie for fourth place between John Kudek, Kewaskum, Fred Wolff, Brown Deer, and Ed Wilger, Newburg.

Gas mask rescue—1. W. Seyfert, Germantown; 2. Bob Staehler, Kewaskum; 3. Richard Becker, Newburg; 4. Donald Jones Boltonville.

Firemen marching in the parade Sunday, also credited in the tournament, were awarded prize money according to the number of firemen participating and Kewaskum won \$10 in this event. The results: Slinger 26, Germantown 24, Cedarburg 21, Kewaskum 17, Newburg 15, Mequon 11, Thiensville 11, Boltonville 8, Belgium 7, Fillmore 7 and Jackson 5.

The Kewaskum American Legion drum and bugle corps, which also marched with the firemen in the parade, together with their color guard and majorettes, was awarded \$25 by the Jackson department, bringing the total prize money won by Kewaskum to \$90. The drum corps received a fine cvation all along the line of march. In all Kewaskum was represented by more than 50 persons in the parade.

The Glacier Inn and Keller's Tap float, which appeared in the Kewaskum parade the week before, was also entered in the Jackson parade and won a \$5 prize.

Second Millionth Mess Kit Made By Regal Ware

On July 10, 1967, Regal Ware's Buckeye plant in Wooster, Ohio, announced the production of its second millionth stainless steel mess kit for use by our military forces. The cookware firm was awarded the government contract in 1966 after competitive bidding. Production began last August and continues until December of this year.

The kit itself is much the same as those used by our fighting men during World War II and the Korean conflict according to company officials. Many of the present kits are now being used in Vietnam.

Local Student in Peru Writes of Trip, Life There

GEORGE MARTIN SENDS LETTERS TO PARENTS

Following are excerpts from letters the Marvin Martins of Kewaskum have received from their son George, who is in Lima, Peru, where he is spending the summer as part of the local foreign student exchange program:

"As you know I left O'Hare field at 6:15 p. m. and arrived at Miami at 10:00 p. m. There I met the students from the East who were also going to South America. We left Miami at 2:15 a. m. June 30 and had half hour stops at Panama, Quito and Guayaquil, Ecuador, and finally arriving at Lima at 12:30 p. m. Lack of sleep and airsickness overtook me. This lasted only for the day. My family was at the airport to meet me. It was an hour's drive to the home. Driving here is very different. As long as you don't hold up traffic you can drive as you please; go through red lights, stop signs, any speed and the horn is used all the time.

"On Saturday I went with my family to the opera 'Luisa Hernandez'. Sunday we went to Club Regattas which is a large athletic club. I've also been swimming in the Pacific Ocean. On July 4th I went to Plaza de Armas, which is said to be the finest public square in the Americas, and Plaza San Martin. That evening my mother had a little party for me because it was our Independence Day. I also saw the changing of the guards at the government palace. In the Cathedral of Lima I viewed the remains of Pizarro which are in a glass coffin. After this we went to the church of San Francisco to see the catacombs, the place where the poor were buried in olden times.

"I am attending school, an all-Catholic high school called Our Lady of Carmen. The students wear uniforms. They have 12 different subjects in a year. Military training is required. There are 5 exchange students attending this school.

"Now I'll tell you about my home here and my family. My father, Juan Zela, is a banker, my mother Rina, brother Juan, 16, Jose, 15, and Rosanna, 9. The home has 5 levels and 6 bathrooms. They have 2 maids and 3 cars.

"I'm not able to write everyone so you'll have to get the information about me from my mother and dad."

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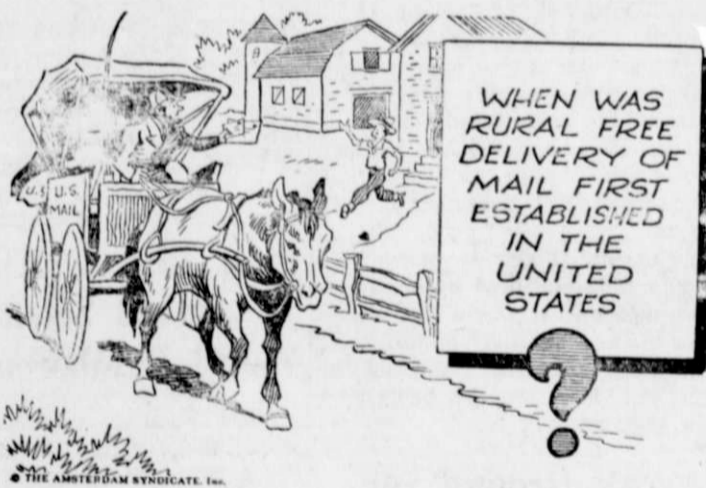
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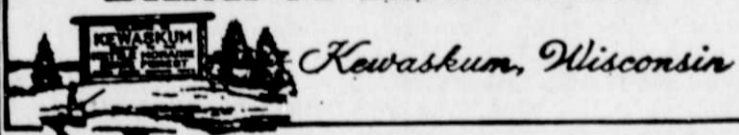
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Mary Cole to Wed David Swarthout

Jim Butz Attending National Institute At Northwestern U

James Butz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Butz, 1325 Park View dr., Kewaskum, is one of 120 high school students attending the National High School Institute this summer at Northwestern university, Evanston, Ill. Butz will be a senior in September at Kewaskum Community High school.

Now in its 15th year, the National High School Institute of the

university's Technological Institute, gives talented high school students from all over the United States a chance to sample college life. 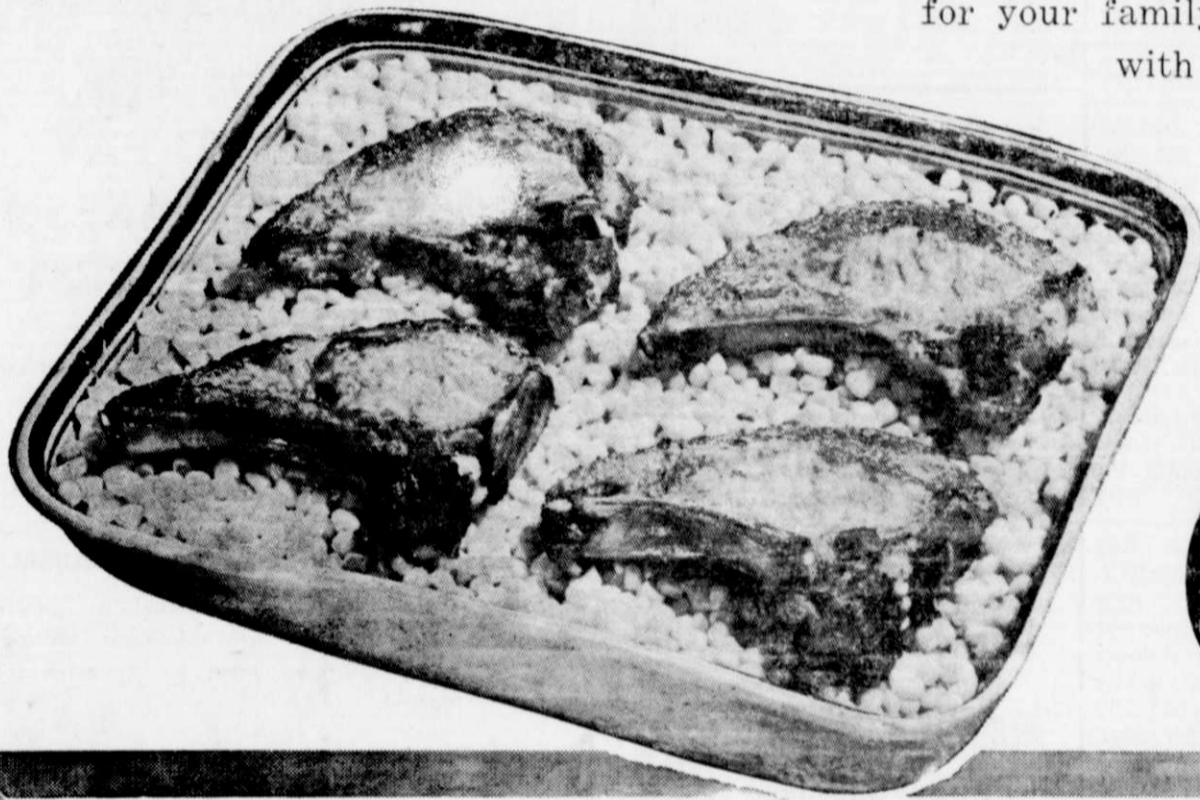

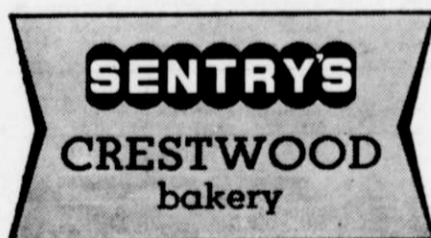

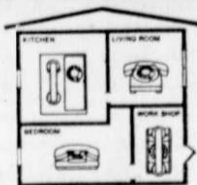
