## Large Barn, 200 Tons of Hay Lost in Fire at Stoffel Farm Early Thursday

### FIREMEN FIGHT BLAZE THROUGHOUT THE DAY

A costly fire at the Gerald Stoffel farm on Hwy. 28 about two miles west of Kewaskum early Thursday morning destroyed a large, 36 by 80 foot metal hay barn, its contents of 200 tons of hay and a hay dryer in the building.

Kewaskum firemen were called to the scene at 5 a. m. when Stoffel discovered the fire while doing chores on the farm. The firemen were still fighting the blaze and wetting down other nearby farm buildings at this writing Thursday afternoon and expected it would be necessary to remain at the scene throughout the remainder of the day and into the night.

The Kohlsville fire department was also summoned and arrived with their tanker to assist the Kewaskum tanker in hauling water from this village to the farm continuously all day so there would be no shortage of water in fighting the blaze. Until it was time to go on his milk route, Loran Backhaus also hauled water in his bulk milk tank truck. Washington county sheriff's department deputies directed traffic at the scene throughout the day. The Stoffel family and neighbors kept firemen supplied with sandwiches and refreshments.

Fortunately the hay barn was constructed of metal which mostly contained the burning hay until the fire was under control. Had the building been of wood construction almost surely a nearby large cattle barn and several adjoining sheds and smaller barns would also have been destroyed. Firemen played several streams of water on the surrounding buildings to prevent them from catching fire as well as on the burning barn. The firemen and neighbors also braced the metal barn with long sections of piping to keep walls from collapsing and the flames from reaching other buildings very close by. The structure finally fell apart from the fire and heat but by that time the blaze was under control. There was a brisk wind blowing Thursday.

Stoffel stated that he had just finished filling the barn with the last three loads of hay on Wednesday. Cause of the fire could not immediately be determined but it could possibly have started from a light bulb, wiring or combustion in the hay. The Stoffels have a very large farm with numerous buildings on the premises. No immediate estimate of the damage was made.

### ANSWER TWO OTHER CALLS

The firemen had a busy week, answering two other calls. At 5:30 p. m. Saturday they were summoned to the L. Rosenheimer Malt & Grain Co. during an electrical storm when a transformer on a pole near the building caught fire. It is believed lightning or a short caused the blaze. By coincidence the firemen again were summoned at 2:50 a. m. Wednesday when another fire started on the same electric pole near the malt house during another electric storm. There was only minor damage in each blaze.

## Crash Near Dundee Kills Illinois Man

A Wilmette, Ill. man died in St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, at 5:30 a. m. Saturday as a result of injuries sustained in a one-car crash three hours earlier near Dundee.

Jerome McCarthy Jr., 22, was taken to the hospital by Campbellsport ambulance, suffering broken legs and internal injuries, following the mishap at 2:15 a. m., three quarters of a mile north of Dundee on Hwy. 67.

McCarthy was a passenger in a car operated by James Quick of Palatine, Ill. According to the Fond du Lac county traffic patrol, the driver said he lost control going into a curve and skidded 87 feet broadside before colliding with a tree. Quick sustained cuts about the face and bruises and also was taken to the hospital.

## George Martin Writes More About Peru

Here are more excerpts from recent letters George Martin of Kewaskum has written from Lima, Peru, where he is spending the summer as part of the local foreign student exchange program:

"To my friends and anyone interested in my activities here:

"Now I am really enjoying and appreciating Peruvian customs. I'm beginning to understand the language better and getting used to some of their traditions. The Fathers and Brothers at school help us with our problems. They are very understanding. There are five exchange students from the states in my school. We students met the mayor of Lima. After that we toured the Municipal Palace.

"On Saturday we went to two museums. One was the Museum of Anthropology, which dealt with ancient civilizations of the Indians. The other was the home of Simon Bolivar. After this we took a ride around the beach on a road used for racing. This was like in the movies, narrow roads, twisting cliffs, ocean beneath us and a tunnel.

"Brother Charlie, the music teacher at school, took us five to a few places where the ordinary tourist couldn't go. The first place was Torre Tagle Palace, built in the 17-18th century. Then we went to three very beautiful old churches built in the 1600's. They were the San Pedro, Santa Domingo and La Mercede.

My school hours are 8:30 a. m. to 3:16 p. m. We have lunch time and also a 15 minute recess. The teachers are five Fathers and a Brother (Charlie) and some lay people.

"The driving age here is 21. We have no school now until August 13. On July 28th is their Independence Day. The students have been practicing marching for then.

"The Peruvian youths imitate the Americans and follow them closely in style of clothes. Clothes are very expensive here. The families here fly to the States at least once a year to buy clothes. They graduate one year earlier from high school than we do. All the subjects they take are required by the national government. None are electives. These national requirements aren't enough to get a boy into a university. They must first attend an academy.

"I spend as much time as I can at Club Regattas playing basketball and soccer.

"I enjoy trying all the unusual foods here. Some are very delicious. The meals are always big meals. The main dinner at 8:00 p. m. always is at least a four-course meal.

"We also had it explained to us that the type of people we live with are mostly descendants of Spanish aristocracy but must now work for a living. They spend all their money on beautiful homes and on furnishings. Most people have no savings. If the father loses his job they lose their home.

"This is another unusual thing. In Latin American law peo-

"We are not handing them a scholarship for spending three months with us. They are given constructive, challenging jobs that demand initiative and responsibility."

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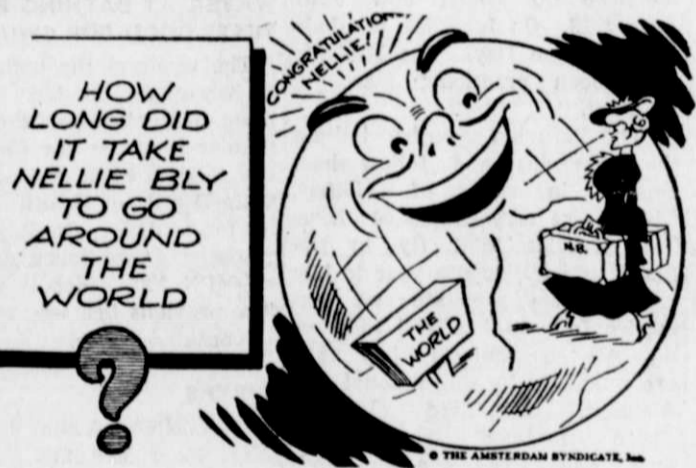
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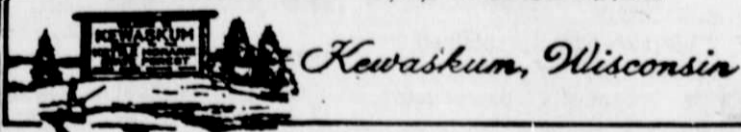

Twenty-one Washington county residents are among the approximate 870 Wisconsin residents hired by the U. S. Bureau of the Census as interviewers for the Home Fallout Protection Survey which the bureau is conducting throughout the state for the Wisconsin Bureau of Civil Defense.

All interviewers wear official red, white and blue badges identifying them as U. S. Census Bureau officials. The badge bears the interviewer's signature and certifies that she or he is authorized to perform the duties of a census interviewer and as such has sworn to keep confidential all census information you give her or him. (See sample badge printed below).

Householders, both renters and home owners, of all one, two and three family houses are asked a few easy-to-answer questions about their homes are built such as: How many people usually live in your household? How many floors does your house have? What type of roof? Do you have a basement or cellar under your home? If you

do, what are the basement walls made of? And what is the height of each basement wall above the outside ground level?

And, in a way, they are working with one of the marvels of our electronic age. The newest, most modern computer at the Census Bureau takes the information a householder gives about his dwelling, analyzes it, and if the dwelling has a basement, calculates the degree of protection against fallout that basement affords. The computer's figures are mailed directly to the householder, so that he and his family know the amount of protection their home basement offers. He receives, also, a booklet prepared by Civil Defense suggesting ways to improve the protection in basements.

Householders without basements receive another type of Civil Defense booklet with extensive information about ways they might protect themselves against fallout.

At the completion of the survey, totals will be provided for the state, each county, and each municipality. Together with similar figures for previously designated public fallout shelters, they will provide a complete picture of available shelter space, information needed by state and local officials to plan fallout protection for every resident.

Guy A. Lutz, director of the Census Bureau regional office in St. Paul, Minn. asks householders to welcome the census interviewer and give her or him full cooperation in getting accurate answers to all questions.

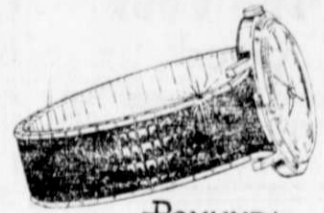

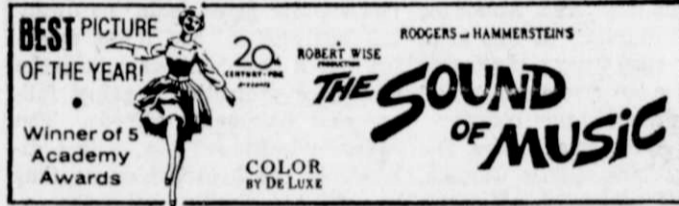

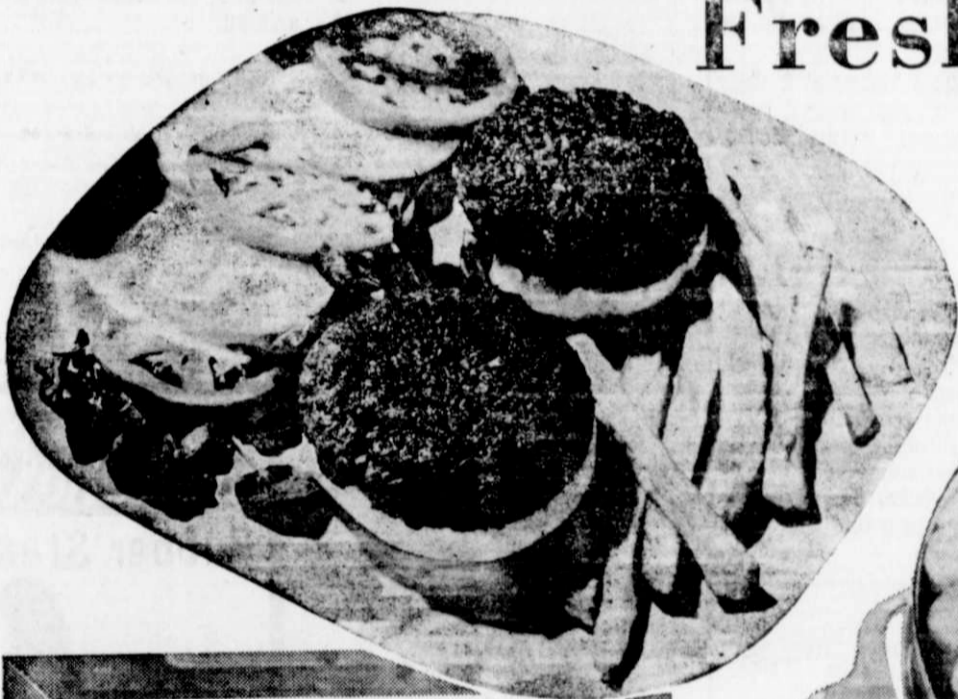

**RESOLUTION NO. 4**—Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that the school year be set at nine and one-half months or 192 days.

Discussion with regard to the starting date of school was held and it was pointed out that this resolution was not connected to that particular date. Roger McKenna moved to accept Resolution No. 4, Harvey Janssen seconded. Unanimously carried.

**RESOLUTION NO. 5**—Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that the school board of this district be and they hereby are authorized to make such temporary loans as may be necessary to pay expenses until funds for the payment thereof are realized from the current levy or investments.

Leo Bingen moved to accept Resolution No. 5, John Battaglia seconded. Unanimously carried.

**RESOLUTION NO. 6**—Be it resolved by the electors of Kewaskum Community Schools, Jt. School District No. 2, that a tax

be levied on all taxable property of the district for operating expenses for the school year commencing in 1967 and ending in 1968, in the amount of \$721,470.76.

Desmond Smith moved to accept Resolution No. 6, Dean Roe seconded. Unanimously carried.

Discussion regarding the opening and closing dates of the school were discussed. It was pointed out that the 1967-68 school year dates could not be changed because of staff contracts, however the School Board could be advised to consider opening at a later date for the 1968-69 school year. Mr. Fred Thomas moved and Mrs. Ronald Reigle seconded that the electors advise the School Board to start the 1968-69 school year after Labor Day. Richard L. Edwards, Chairman, asked for a show of hand vote. Voting results: YES—24; NO—78. Motion defeated.

Elroy Egerer moved that free milk be provided for K-6 students of the district at the milk break and that an additional \$1,400 be budgeted for this purpose. Robert O'Reilly seconded. The motion was defeated in a hand vote—YES—21; NO—74.
